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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good morning. I am
Councilman I. Daneek Miller, and I am Chair of
Committee on Civil Service and Labor. And, I would
like to thank everyone for coming out this morning.
Today, we have a second hearing in voting on the
Resolution that Council Member Dromm and I
introduced at the most recent stated council
meeting. Resolution 189, I would call upon the
State of New York to pass legislation, authorizing
local governments to establish and enforce higher
minimum wages. Today, we vote on whether to send
this Resolution to the full Council.

We held our first hearing on April 29th. There were advocates, workers and experts, all testifying on the necessity for New York City to have the power to raise its own minimum wage. It is evident that for too long the State's Wage Law acted as a ceiling rather than the floor for hard working New Yorkers in a high cost area. With that in mind, I urge my colleagues today on this Committee, to vote yes, on this Resolution. So, before we take the vote, we have Council Member, Costa... (laugh) don't look at me like that...

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is on, but I got it right. I nailed it again. So, before we take a vote, we do have a quorum. I would like to hear from the bill's sponsor, Council Member Dromm.

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MR. DROMM: Well, thank you very much, Chair Miller. I really appreciate all you have done to work with me very, very closely on this. feel like we are partners on this bill. And, um, you know, I look forward to moving it forward. And, as you said in your opening statements, being able to determine our own minimum wage is very important to the City. In general, having control over issues in our own city is an important issue to me as well. But, in particular, on this issue, of the minimum wage, we need to raise that minimum wage and, ultimately, that's what I hope will come from this Resolution. It is a clear message to Albany that we want, not only to have the ability to raise our own minimum wage, but to actually raise it. And, so, with that, I also want to say, you know, I am going to vote positively on this, when we call it. Thank you.
