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CHAIRPERSON RICHARDSON: All right, good morning. First, I would like to acknowledge members of the Environmental Protection Committee who have joined us. Council Member Rory Lancman and Steve Levin. I am very grateful for them being here this morning.

Good morning, I am Chairman Donovan
Richards, Chair of the Environmental Protection
Committee, and today the Environmental Protection
Committee will hold a hearing, and vote on Resolution
No. 356 recognizing the dangers of climate change to
human health and the environment, and endorsing the
People's Climate March.

Carbon dioxide in the atmosphere currently measures at 396.50 PPM and it has increased by an average of 2.75 PPM per year over the last ten years. According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Annual Greenhouse Gas Index, the direct climate impact known as radiated forcing of long-lived greenhouse gases is up 34% from the base year of 1990.

The burning of fossil fuels including gas, oil and coal to meet basic human needs for

3 communication is the primary cause of elevated

4 greenhouse gas emissions.

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emitter of greenhouse gases in the world on an annual basis following China, who has the largest annual greenhouse gas emissions. However, the United States is by far the largest greenhouse gas emitter on a cumulative basis. Prior effects including international treaties meant to limit emissions have not been as successful as intended because large industrial countries like the U.S. either refuse to ratify it or later withdrew, and because exemptions allowed developing countries to delay taking strong action to curb emissions.

However, the Obama Administration is working to forge a sweeping international climate change agreement to compel nations to cut their planet-warming fossil fuel emissions without ratification from Congress. U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon has invited world leaders from government, finance, business, and civil society to Climate Summit 2014 this September 23rd, my mother's birthday—a shout out, mom—to motivate, galvanize,

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and catalyze climate actions. The U.N. Secretary has asked these leaders to both announcements and actions to the Summit that will reduce emissions, strengthen climate resilience, and mobilize political will for a

6 meaningful legal agreement in 2015.

Opportunity for leaders to champion an ambition vision anchored in action that will enable a meaningful global agreement in 2015. According to the United Nations, only an intensive push over the next 15 years will be able to bring emissions under control.

The People's Climate March, which will take place on September 21, 2014. It will be a mass climate mobilization of a coalition of diverse organizations just before the United Nations Climate Summit, and is intended to urge our world leaders to take serious and immediate steps towards addressing the climate crisis. Expected to be the largest march in support of the global environment in history, the People's Climate March will unite advocates from all over the world in a show of strength that clearly calls for protecting the earth, and all its inhabitants and subsequent generations.

The City Council is looking at a number of measures to address the reduction of greenhouse gases including installing solar energy systems on City buildings, wider implementation of geothermal energy use, reduction of fossil fuel exploration in New York, energy efficiency, improving air quality, and enforcement.

March, the UN Climate Summit, and the initiatives by President Obama to achieve a climate accord, which includes participation by the United States while there is still time to reduce or emissions. And transition our energy use to renewable and sustainable sources. I support this Resolution, and recommend a yes vote. So we will now call the vote unless any of my colleagues want to say anything.
