No. 0550-A closely follows the State code but 3 contains New York City specific amendments. Some 4 5 city specific amendments include requiring buildings in the city to use equipment such as air conditioners 6 7 that meet federal energy efficiency standards, reducing greenhouse gases by requiring lighting 8 within dwelling units to meet the same efficiency 9 standards as lighting outside of dwelling units, 10 providing tenants with control over their energy 11 12 usage by requiring sub meters to be installed in 13 newly constructed commercial buildings and ensuring 14 that once energy-efficient equipment is installed it 15 continues to work properly by expanding testing 16 requirements. When enacted, the code revisions in 17 proposed Int. No. 0550-A will yield an energy savings 18 of almost 18.2 percent to building owners across the 19 city. 20 We've been joined by Council Member Richards, who I believe, as I mentioned earlier, will 21 2.2 be giving an opening statement. So I'd like to call 23 on Mr. Richards, if he's -- Are you ready?

New York City as a whole takes more progressive steps

to ensure we are reducing energy consumption.

Just a few short weeks ago our Council passed legislation solidifying our city's commitment to the goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions 80 percent by 2050. While goals are great and so is ambition, the biggest question of concern is how and this is how; the passing of Int. 0550-A will help to increase standards to ensure that boilers waste less fuel in the winter, new buildings that are inspected to also ensure room air conditioners aren't constantly leaking air outside, a streamlined energy modeling process that makes industry compliance and DOB enforcement simpler and more cost-effective and the use of low-energy light fixtures in residential units. This legislation is another step in the right direction, holding buildings to the highest standards for construction and energy performance by making our city energy code more stringent than the State's energy code.

I would like to commend you for all your hard work and all of the other organizations who have helped get us here this day. Thank you.
