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CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much. Good morning everyone and welcome to a very important hearing about the committee on Cultural Affairs, libraries, and international intergroup relations. I'm the chair Jimmy Van Bramer and I am pleased to be joined by my colleagues, Council Member Steve Levin from Brooklyn, Council Member Helen Rosenthal from Manhattan, Council Member Peter Koo from Queens, Council Member Elizabeth Crowley from Queens and we are here today to vote and joined by Council Member Julissa Ferreras from Queens and Council Member Costa Constantinides from Queens and we are here today to vote on Intro 742A which is an amendment to the percent for art law which was passed in 1982 and has not been amended since then. The law which requires one percent of city budget for city funded capital construction projects be used on public artwork is an incredibly important law. We support public art and we believe in the power of the percent for art program. However it's been true that we could and should empower communities that have more of a say and more input and ore engagement in those public art

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES, AND 1 INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS projects that will become a permanent part of their 2 neighborhoods and it is essential that we do that 3 and it ultimately we will support public art, we 5 will support artists more when we engage the communities whose work they will be enjoying in the 6 process. This is public tax dollars that we're 8 talking about and the public should have a roll in 9 this process. They should have an opportunity to 10 meet the artists. They should have an opportunity to take a look at some of the plans that have input 11 and engage in a meaningful dialogue. That doesn't 12 exist but with this law that will exist and we will 13 14 have a stronger percent for art program in the city 15 of New York as a result. So I want to thank the 16 Department of Cultural Affairs, Commissioner Tim Finkelpearl for working with us on this 17 legislation, thank my colleagues, thank our staff 18 19 Aminta Killowan [phonetic] and Chloe Rivera from 20 the Cultural Affairs Committee Cody Writer, my Deputy Chief of Staff for helping to draft the 21 legislation with the Department of Cultural Affairs 22 and I hope everyone will support this legislation 23 and community empowerment and engagement as it 24 25 relates to public art and percent for art law in
