CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Good morning. says good morning again. Good morning. I'm Council Member Andrew Cohen, Chair of the Council's Committee on Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, Alcoholism, Substance Abuse and Disability Services. The topic of today's hearing--today's hearing on Proposed Resolution 282-A and Proposed Resolution 410-A. The Proposed Resolution 282-A and Proposed Resolution 410-A call upon the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, Senate Bill 4748 and Assembly Bill 5565A. The first Resolution 282-A addresses the portion dealing with an increase in the income threshold for the Senior Citizens Homeowners' Exemption Program, also known as SCHE. The second Resolution 410-A addresses the portion dealing with an increase in the income threshold for the Disabled Homeowners' Exemption Program, also known as DHE. By way of background, New York State authorizes [door closes] the City of New York to

provide certain citizens and persons with

disabilities property tax and rent increase

2	exemptions that help them remain in their homes. The
3	Senior Citizen Rent Increase Exemption, SCRIE Program
4	was instituted to shield low-income seniors age 62
5	years and older from rising housing costs by offering
6	landlords property tax abatements in exchange for
7	freezing the rent of eligible senior tenants. The
8	Senior Citizen Homeowners' Exemption, SCHE Program is
9	a property tax exemption for those who are age 65 and
10	over, and who meet certain income requirements. The
11	Disability Rent Increase Exemption, DRIE Program,
12	exempts those that receive State or federal
13	disability related assistance from future rent
14	increases if they meet certain income requirements.
15	The Disabled Homeowners' Exemption, DHE Program
16	allows certain disabled owners of one and two and
17	three-family homes, condominiums or co-operative
18	apartments a reduction on the assessed value of their
19	home of between 5 and 50%.

More particularly, the problem

necessitating today's resolutions is that the DHE and

SCHE programs' income requirements are not comparable

to those of DRIE and SCRIE, of the DRIE and SCRIE

programs. In fact, DHE and SCHE programs required

that the disabled or senior citizens homeowners'

2	income not exceed \$37,339. On the other hand, SCRIE
3	requires that citizensthat senior citizens' renter
4	income not exceed \$50,000 to be eligible for the
5	program. How this disparity arose is because the
6	state authorized local governments to expand the
7	eligibility requirements of the SCRIE and DRIE
8	programs in its 20142015 Executive Budget, but has
9	not provided for adjustments to the income
10	requirements of the SCHE and DHE programs. These
11	proposed resolutions seek to eliminate such
12	discrepancies by urging the passage of and the
13	Governor signing Senate Bill 4748 and Assembly Bill
14	5565, legislation increasing the income thresholds
15	for SCHE and DHE programs.

MOLLY KRAKOWSKI: Good morning.

CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Good morning. We appreciate you taking the time to come down and testify this morning.

MOLLY KRAKOWSKI: I'd like to thank the Committee on Mental Health, Developmental Disability, Alcoholism, Substance Abuse and Disability Services and Council Member Cohen for chairing today's hearing. Also thank you to Council Member Rosenthal and members of the City Council who are sponsoring Resolution 282-A. JASA is a non-profit agency serving the needs of older adults in the New York area. We have a whole range of programs and certainly benefits and entitlements and enrollment in SCRIE, SCHE and DHE. JASA supports Resolution 282-A calling on the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign S.4748 and A.5565A. This legislation will allow localities to raise the income eligibility limits for SCRIE, DRIE to any amount up to \$51,000 beginning in July 2016. The legislation also repeals the sunset provision, which is set to expire July 1st, bringing the income eligibility to

\$29,000. JASA believes the extension of parity and income threshold eligibility for the parallel program of Senior Citizens Homeowner's Exemption and the Disabled Homeowners' Exemption will also serve as important protection to vulnerable homeowners in New York. JASA's mission is to sustain and enrich the lives of older New Yorkers in the New York

Metropolitan area so that they can remain in the community with dignity and autonomy.

And at a time when New York City is increasingly unaffordable, older adults are particularly vulnerable. JASA advocates for many

particularly vulnerable. JASA advocates for many years—we've been advocating for many years for the expansion of SCRIE and DRIE and the income limits and eligibility. And we finally have this increased to \$50,000, which has allowed many older adults previously denied services to successfully freeze their rent. There are many more seniors who are eligible for SCRIE than are actually enrolled in the program. There's a need to expand the outreach to assist more New Yorkers in accessing the benefit and the return to a \$29,000 cap would be detrimental to many New Yorkers and disabled in New York City who are currently enrolled in their rent freezing

Expanding SCRIE and DRIE will allow older 2 adults and people with disabilities to remain in the 3 community and in their homes with affordable rent. 5 New York State can and should be a model for aging in place. As such, JASA strongly supports A.5565A and 6 S.4748 and the New York City Council Resolutions 282-A. And I would add the other resolution, which I 8 9 didn't have in front of me, but we're happy--we're happy to support the DRIE expansion as well, 410 on 10 11 record. 12 CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Again, thank you. We 13 appreciate--14 MOLLY KRAKOWSKI: [interposing] Thank 15 you. 16 CHAIRPERSON COHEN: --you coming and 17 testifying. Good morning. MARY ANN ROTHMAN: Good morning, Chairman 18 Cohen and members of the committee. My name is 19

MARY ANN ROTHMAN: Good morning, Chairman Cohen and members of the committee. My name is Rothman. I'm the Executive Director of the Council of New York Cooperatives and Condominiums a membership organization comprised of housing co-ops and condos located throughout the five boroughs of New York City and beyond. More than 170,000 Hew York families make their homes in our member buildings,

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2	which span the full economic spectrum from very
3	modest housing to some very upscale dwellings. Many
4	of the familythose families, of course, own their
5	cooperative condominium units. But many units are
6	also still held by renters who stayed on in their
7	apartments. So a little over a year ago, CNYC was
8	pleased to testify in support of the legislation that
9	raised the cap on SCRIE eligibility. And in our
10	testimony on the first of May last year, we
11	respectfully suggested that homeowners should have
12	parallel treatment, and here it is we hope.
13	Similarly, New York should be the best and most
14	wonderful place to live for everyone. So, yes,
15	individuals with disabilities in the city should also
16	have the income level raised for eligibility for this
17	very reasonable help in living in their homes. I
18	offer the strong support of CNYC and its members for
19	Resolutions 0282 and 0410, which calls upon the State
20	Legislature to raise the income ceilings for
21	eligibility for seniors and disabled persons to
22	quality for much needed relief from their housing
23	costs. And I thank you for this opportunity to
24	testify.

CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Thank you. Thank you 2 3 both. You know there are-there are jut two points. One, I have JASA center and--and senior citizen in my 5 Council District and I am acutely aware of the--the relatively poor participation rate in SCRIE in my 6 7 district. And maybe we could partner and at least try to get the word out. I've been trying to 8 brainstorm about trying to get greater participation. 9 And I also--I tell this story. My mother lives in a 10 co-op in Riverdale, doorman building, very nice 11 building. And one Passover I was working with the 12 Bronx Jewish Community Council delivering meals to 13 seniors, and these were seniors really in poverty. 14 15 And I got a package to deliver to my mother's 16 building. I think this was odd. I don't know what's going on, but I went to the building and what I found 17 was a senior who was a rent-controlled tenant pre-18 conversion who had been there for 50 years, 19 literally, I believe 50 years. And, you know, and 20 was a senior living in poverty right, you know, in--21 in a building I think that, you know, is--is a very 22 23 nice building. Like I said, it's a doorman building. And so, you know, you just don't know where you're 24 25 going to find it. And these programs have very broad
