CHAIRPERSON JOHNSON: Good afternoon everyone. My name is Council Member Corey Johnson; I am Chair of the Council's Committee on Health.

Today we're voting on proposed Int.

No. 440-A, a bill that I introduced that we originally heard on March 3rd as part of our joint hearing on Health Care Services in Jails with the Committee on Finance and Criminal Justice Services.

The people coming into the City's jails are overwhelmingly poor and overwhelmingly sick and are desperately in need of quality health care services. I am concerned that the contractor providing health services in many of our city's jails, Corizon Health, is not doing an adequate job. The allegations that have mounted over the years suggest that Corizon is failing to provide comprehensive and safe services to people under their care. These reports suggest that treatment provided to inmates may have been a factor in at least 15 deaths over the past five years and that these deaths may have been preventable.

A recent report by the New York State

Commission on Corrections investigating the death of

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Bradley Ballard, an inmate at Rikers, called the mental and medical care he received "so incompetent and inadequate as to shock the experience." We can't lose sight of the fact that many people in these facilities haven't been found guilty of anything. It mocks our justice system's principle of innocent until proven guilty if somewhere along the line you might die because you didn't get your medication in time or a follow-up exam or if the guard didn't take

your pleas for help seriously.

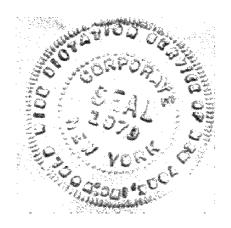
The first step in addressing these problems is getting a better picture of the adequacy of services being provided. Int. 440 would improve transparency by ensuring that the Council and public have access to the performance indicators that Corizon prepares quarterly for the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. It will apply also to any future provider of services at a city jail; we need to hold the providers and agencies that oversee them responsible for performance in keys areas like wait times, sick calls, access to medication, follow-up visits, and preventable hospitalizations.
