First Anthony Maisano. Anthony wrestles at 132 although he looks a little heavy today. But he won the City Championship. won the Mayor's Cup this year for 132. We also have Angela--Angela who won the Wingate Award for Golf, which literally means she is the best golfer in the City of New York. [cheers/applause] It literally means that. helped cement its reputation. Each one has excelled
in sports for many years garnering multiple New York
City championship trophies, and setting one record
after another; and

Whereas, David Roman, III, a senior
wrestler at Tottenville, stands out for his
undefeated record of 46 and 0. [cheers/applause] As
his unparalleled--in his unparalleled dominance among
New York--I'm sorry--among Staten Island's heavy
weight wrestlers. This year he was named most
outstanding wrestler for heavy weights at this year's
Staten Island Duals where he took--he also took gold

in the 285-pound weight class. He took part in the past city championship teams and went on to win the PSAL individual city championship; and

Whereas, Anthony Maisano, a pirate wrestler in the 132-pound weight class shattered the record of 108 careers wins, and reached 141 career wins. Having one every single tournament that he wrestled in this season, he was named the most outstanding wrestler overall in the Staten Island Duals where he also took gold in his weight class. Having already been a part of the past two city championship teams, Mr. Maisano went on to win the PSAL individual city championship. Mr. Roman and Mr. Maisano both won the prized Mayor's Cup in their individual weight classes, the highest honor available to a New York City Varsity wrestler; and

Whereas, Angela Masseria, a senior at

Tottenville High School has not only devoted the past
ten years to perfecting her golf skills, but has also
worked tirelessly to improve all those around her as
team captain leading her school's golf team to the

PSAL city championships in 2012, 2013 and 2015.

Since her freshman year, she has been selected
annually as a golf all star by the Staten Island

But as we work through this 2.3 process, no one currently incarcerated in our city's jails should be treated inhumanely or have a blind 24 eye turned to abuse they face. So definitely this 25

That law is designed as a law enforcement tool with no tolerance for discrimination in public life. 2005 Civil Rights Restoration Act provided that the Human Rights Law is to be interpreted liberally in order to fulfill the uniquely broad and remedial purposes of the Human Rights Law even where federal and state provisions have interpreted more narrowly, some courts have recognized and followed that vision but some have not. And so there are many areas of the law that still need to be interpreted that way. This law directs courts with exemptions from the Human Rights Law's general provisions be construed

narrowly, and cites three cases that are important
for understanding and interpreting the Restoration
Act and the law to make sure that courts apply the
liberal construction provisions in every case, and
with respect to every issue. So, for example, give
the broadest interpretation of phrases like marital
status or hire an employee, and recognize all the
very conduct that the discrimination inconnotes.
As for example when a covered entity selects people
for housing and employment because of their protected
class status is thought to make them vulnerable to
exploitation. The Speaker's leadership of this body
has really had as a hallmark strengthening the Human
Rights Law and the Human Rights Commission, and this
act is an important part of that. I want to say a
special thanks to the staff who did a lot of work on
this and the rest of the bills in this package
especially Caitlyn Caruso, Annie Decker, Juan Park,
Wesley Jones, Alisha Brown, Matt Gewalb and my
Legislative Director Ben Smith. I also note the work
of Craig Gurian in helping us continue to push
