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CHAIRPERSON KOO: Good morning everyone. I'm Council Member Koo, Chair of the Subcommittee of Landmarks, Public Siting and Maritime Use. We are joined by Council Members Barron, Kallos and--and Palma, yeah. We will be holding a public hearing and voting on one item today, Land Use Item 383, the Land Use-the Landmark designation of the East New York Savings Bank. If approved, this application will affirm the designation of the East New York Savings Bank Building as a historic landmark. This building was originally built in 1928, and is located on the low east corner of the Eastern Parkway, and Utica--Utica Avenue in Council Member Cumbo's district. I will now open the public hearing for Land Use Item No. 383, and we have Michael Hogan and Lorraine George from the Landmark Preservation Commission to testify. [pause] Yeah, you may start after you introduce yourself.

LAUREN GEORGE: Pardon me. Thank you.

Good morning, Council Members. My name is Lauren

George, Director of Intergovernmental Affairs at

Landmarks Preservation Commission. I'm here today to

speak with you about the East New York Savings Bank,

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING 1 AND MARITIME USES which you just introduced, and as you said, it's 1117 2 3 Eastern Parkway at the corner of Utica Avenue in 4 Brooklyn as an individual landmark. On June 28, 2011, LTC held a hearing on this proposed designation of the East New York Savings Bank Building and the 6 7 related landmarks site. The hearing was advertised 8 in accordance with the provisions of law as usual. On person spoke in favor of this designation, a resident of the Historic Districts--Historic 10 11 Districts Council, and there were no speakers to attest. Council Member Laurie Cumbo has been 12 13 supportive, and sent a letter of support as designation of the bank. The Commission offers a 14 15 support letter from the New York a support letter 16 from the New York Landmarks Conservancy. 17 designation was approved unanimously by the 18 Commission at a public meeting on March 8, 2016. East New York Savings Bank Building is located at the 19 20 northwest corner of Eastern Parkway and Utica, Dempser (sp?) at the junction of Weeksville and 21 2.2 Brownsville in Brooklyn. Originally called the 2.3 Parkway Branch, it faces Eastern Parkway and New York's scenic landmark that runs from Grand Army 24 25 Plaza to Brownsville. As one of the most impressive

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING 1 AND MARITIME USES 5 structures along the parkway's tree-lined route, it 2 was short--it was built shortly after the opening of 3 4 the IRT Subway, which attracted considerable commercial activity to Utica Avenue. Construction began on November 20, 1927 and it was completed in 6 7 December 1928. At the time of construction, the structure would the bank's second and most ambitious 8 branch. It homes in Winslow when New York City architects specializing in bank design. The bank was 10 11 built in a neo-romanesque style with art decco 12 details display classical acts--effects such as the 13 use of symmetry and a prominent bracketed cornice. The design of this bank was influenced by the 14 15 landmarked Bowery Savings Bank on East 42nd Street in 16 Manhattan with a similar recessed archway. dramatic architectural feature served as the bank's 17 18 main entrance giving the branch an impenetrable fortress like quality. Rene Paul Chambellan who 19 created architectural sculptures for many New York 20 21 City landmarks including the Chanin and the Daily News Building as well as the fountains at Rockefeller 2.2 2.3 Center, designed our remarkable bronze doors that face Eastern Parkway as well as the commerce and 24 industry reliefs in the valiums (sp?) along the 25

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING 1 AND MARITIME USES 6 The east facade facing Utica Avenue is 2 facade. 3 decorated with bees and honey combs as well as 4 depictions of men hauling full satchels. In 1929, the Design Journal Meadowlark described the building 5 a delightful and one of the finest bank structures of 6 7 its kinds. After completion, a special appreciate 8 dinner was held to honor the 250 plumbers, masons, painters, contractors, architects and carpenters who participate in the building's construction. The East 10 11 New York Savings Bank is a grand building celebrating 12 Brooklyn's commercial past in an area with few 13 recognized individual landmarks. Accordingly, the 14 Landmarks Preservation Commission urges you to affirm 15 this designation, and I'd be happy to ask--answer any 16 questions you might have about the project. 17 CHAIRPERSON KOO: Thank you, Ms. George. 18 LAUREN GEORGE: Uh-huh. 19 CHAIRPERSON KOO: So my first question is 20 who is the occupant of this building, a popular 21 saving bank? 2.2 LAUREN GEORGE: Yes, it was Banco 2.3 Popular, and then it changed hands, and there will be a Modelle' in the space. 24
