9	Good morning. My name is James Vacca and
10	I am the Chair of the Committee on Technology and
11	we're here today to vote on Proposed Int. 1052-A, a
12	bill sponsored by Council Member Levin and myself
13	that would codify a City policy to ensure that all
14	data is erased from City electronics when we dispose
15	of them or transfer them to another agency.
16	Data breaches are unauthorized
17	acquisitions of computerized data that compromise the
18	security, confidentiality or integrity of personal
19	information and can occur with anything from a single
20	record to millions of records. Such breaches are not
21	just privacy concerns but can also be used to
22	facilitate fraudulent activity, such as identify
23	theft; this can have a devastating consequence for

individuals and has led to annual losses in the tens

of billions of dollars in the United States alone.

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In 2015, there were 979 data breach notifications sent to the New York State Department of State affecting 5.5 million New Yorkers.

Improper disposal of electronic devices and media that store private data is one of the ways that a data breach can occur. If a computer hard disc, thumb drive, mobile phone or optical storage media is disposed of without properly destroying either the device or the data through wiping physical destruction of some other method, then the data therein may be recoverable. This can cause serious breaches, such as, just recently, when a 30 gigabyte hard drive discovered at a recycling depot in Canada was found to retain the personal information, including security clearance applications, of defense personnel in the Canadian military. Locally, a CD containing the personal information of 15,000 New York City Transit Authority workers was found inside a refurbished computer sold by a retailer.

The Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications (DoITT) created a policy to address concerns about potential data breaches.

Proposed Int. 1052-A will go a step further to ensure confidential data of our City's residents is kept
