CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Can I can I start? Okay. Good afternoon. My name is James Vacca, and I'm the Chair of the Committee on Technology. We are here to-we are here today to consider Proposed Intro 1240-A, a bill sponsored by Council Member Danny Dromm that would enhance the language access of two types of important digital notifications issues by New York City, in one of the most diverse cities in the country, and it is important that everyone living in New York City have an opportunity to access the many services our local government provides. Two of those services are city issued electronic communications through wireless emergency alerts and Notify NYC notifications. Last fall we were able to use this technology to great effect. That morning the city issued a massive WEA that provided the name of the Chelsea bombing suspect. This test-text like message was sent to every cell phone using a cell phone tower in New York City. The suspect was in police custody three hours late. Police Commissioner James O'Neill describes these types of alert system as the future. We agree. Messaging services are not just useful for criminal threats, but also informing

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residents of life threatening weather events like tornadoes and hurricanes, missing persons and other major disruptions. Because these messages can relay information that require immediate action. It is our imperative view that every resident of New York City have the opportunity to access them. Presently, some Notify New York City messages provide limited language translations, but this is not enough.

Messages delivered through Notify NYC both and WEA, both of which New York City Emergency Management originate should have automatic translation features to more effectively reach people with limited English proficiency.

Proposed Intro 1240-A provides that opportunity that it be issued in two most commonly spoke language in New York which is English and Spanish. Further, the bill would require that Notify NYC subscribers have the option to receive all of their alerts in one of the City's seven most commonly spoken languages unless a real time translation of the general English notification is unavailable. I want to introduce my colleagues that have joined me here today. To my left is Councilwoman Palma. To my immediate right is Barry Grodenchik, and I want to

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COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you, Chair Vacca for the opportunity to speak. In times of emergency disseminating information as broadly as possible is critical to the safety of all New York City's diverse communities. Obtaining accurate information and following official instructions are vital steps to weathering emergency situations. Unfortunately, non-English speakers are vulnerable to situations where they receive incomplete or incorrect information. In some cases our immigrant neighbors may receive no relevant information at all. Given how critical this information can be with saving life and property, this situation needs to change now before the next emergency. Proposed Intro 1240-A tremendously expands emergency outreach efforts by requiring that alerts and notices be given in multiple-multiple languages. This legislation accomplishes two important goals. First, city emergency alerts issued through commercial cellular

services will need to be in at least the two most
