24	subway access, as well as recommendations on a
25	strategy to ensure residents in these communities

2 have ample options for public transit. [background comment]

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I introduced this bill because there is a proven relationship between access to public transit and economic opportunities. Furthermore, areas in our city cut off from transit are more likely to have higher rates of car ownership, according to census data analyzed by the Tri-State Transportation Campaign.

Following the second annual Car Free Day

this past weekend, key aspects of this celebration

are thinking about how to reduce our city's reliance

on cars and the importance of investing in public

transit.

For parts of Queens, Brooklyn, the Bronx, and most of Staten Island subway stations are scarce; meaning, residents are left to purchase a car or rely on unreliable bus service.

This bill is about how highlighting these issues and strategizing about how we can deploy limited resources in the most cost-effective way, as well as where larger investments are needed to bring communities into the transit network, from enhancing
