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CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Alright, good afternoon, everyone. I am Council Member Rafael Salamanca, the chair of the Subcommittee on Planning, Dispositions and Concessions. I would like to welcome everyone today's hearing. We are joined by Council Member Andy-Andrew Cohen, Council Member Mark Treyger, Councilwoman Mendez, Council Member Kallos and Council Member Levin. Today, we will hold hearings on five items. The first four items are applications for tax exemptions pursuant to Private Housing Finance Law. The fifth is an application for a mortgage loan pursuant to the Private Housing Finance Law. The first item on the calendar for hearing is LU 616 regarding a 40-year property tax exemption pursuant to Article 11 for property located at 911 through 917 on Atlantic Avenue and 1041 through 1047 Fulton Street in Brooklyn. This tax emption will facilitated the creation 114 units of affordable housing in two buildings at a range of AMIs. These developments represent the off-site affordable housing generated by the agreement between Hudson Companies, Inc. and the New York City Economic

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Development Corporation in connection with the 2015
disposition and redevelopment of the Brooklyn Public
Library in Brooklyn Heights. Although the site is in
Council Member Cumbo's district, the Brooklyn Heights
Library site also within Brooklyn Community Board 2
is located in Council Member Levin's district. I am
now opening up the public hearing on LU 616 and so

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speaker, as a speaker if you could introduce

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yourselves.

JORDAN PRESS: Hi, my name is Jordan I'm Executive Director for Development and Press. Planning in HPD's Office of Government Affairs. Use No. 616 consists of an exemption area containing the new construction of two buildings that will be located at 1043 Fulton Street and 909 Atlantic Avenue I Brooklyn Council District 35 known as the Brooklyn Public Library Offsite. This project is being developed under HPD's Inclusionary Housing Program, and generates inclusionary housing square footage to maximize the floor are ratio on its own site. Once completed, the project will provide 115 rental apartments with a mixture of units including 55 studios, 32 1-bedroom, 22 2-bedrooms and 5 3-bedroom apartments plus a superintendent's unit. Under an

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inclusionary agreement, 23 units will be restricted at 60% of AMI and 60 units will be restricted at 80% of AMI. Under a separate regulatory agreement, 31 units will be restricted at or below 125% of AMI. The sponsor will finance the project with private funds and all of the units will be permanently affordable. Today, HPD is before the subcommittee asking approval of the Article 11 tax benefit in order to facilitate the project and to maintain affordability of the residential units. My understanding is Council Member Cumbo has been briefed and has indicated her support for the project.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Alright, thank you. Council Member Levin.

much Chair Salamanca. I just wanted to thank HPD for working to get this very important part of this entire Land Use development package moving quickly and expeditiously, and so I—I support this—this Article 11 tax exemption as well being approved by my colleagues here at the subcommittee. This is the affordable housing that was part of the Brooklyn Public Library Land Use project that was in the 33rd

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District that we approved back in December of-of 2015 so for my colleagues' reference. Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Thank you. there any members of the committee that would like to speak? No. Are there any more members of the public who wish to testify? Alright, seeing none, I will close the public hearings on LU 616. The second item is the Lower East Side People's Mutual Housing Association, LU 615. This application is a partial tax exemption to preserve existing rental housing for low-income families in 18 multiple dwellings in the Lower East Side of Manhattan containing 210 dwelling units. The units are currently occupied. Units which become vacant will be targeted to households at an AMI of 80% or below during the exemption period 40 years retroactive to July of 2015. These buildings are in the districts of Council Member Mendez and Council Member Chin. I am now opening up the public hearing on LU 615. Mr. Speaker.

JORDAN PRESS: Land Use No. 615 consists of an exemption area that contains 18 buildings scattered throughout Council Districts 1 and 2 in Manhattan. These buildings were originally approved

for disposition by the Board of Estimate in 1990, and 2 3 City Council in 1991 and 1992 as low-income rental 4 housing known as Lower East Side People's Mutual Housing Association. [coughs] The properties are located at 168 Attorney Street, 45 Clinton Street, 15 6 7 Clinton Street, 28 Clinton Street, 165 Suffolk Street, 17 Avenue D, 136 Avenue C, 218 East Seventh 8 9 Street, 327 East Eighth Street, 169 Avenue B, 171 Avenue B, 173 Avenue B, 391 East Tenth Street, 166 10 11 East Second Street, 523 East Sixth Street, 295 East 12 Tenth Street, 539 East Eleventh Street, and 419 East 13 Twelfth Street. The combined portfolio contained one studio, 46 1-bedrooms, 104 2-bedroom, 53 bedrooms and 14 15 four 4-bedroom apartments plus five superintendent 16 units for a total of 210 low-income rental units with no vacancies. In addition to the residential units, 17 18 there are eleven commercial spaces. 19 household income AMIs are below 80% and rents range from \$489 for a studio to \$1,692 for a 4-bedroom 20 unit. Currently, the owner is experiencing financial 21 2.2 hardship as tax abatements and tax exemptions phase 2.3 out. Therefore, HPD is seeking approval for Article 11 tax benefits retroactive to July 1, 2015, which 24 25 will cover the period when the arrears began to

JORDAN PRESS: [off mic] Yes.

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COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Okay, and the Article 11 will be retroactive, is that correct?

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Okay. Yeah, these are about evenly divided in Council Member Chin's district and in my district.

JORDAN PRESS: [off mic] Yes.

There, you know, they're JORDAN PRESS: COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: [interposing] Well, I-I heard a couple of Clinton Streets and Suffolk Street. Those are Council Member Chin's district. That's alright. I got calls about the fire, which was in her district on Sunday [laugher] So, it happens all the time. It's a good thing we work well together. Anyway, we know this organization. It is essential they get these tax abatements so that they can continue to have the rent stabilized apartment. It is much needed in my district, and I know some of the tenants there who are still having even though these are affordable for my district, still having problems paying the-the rent in those-in some of those units. So, I want to thank HPD for working with PMHA, as we call it in the Lower East Side, and getting this tax abatement through thank you.

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GARY SLOMAN: Gary Sloman, Director of Operations, Housing Supervision at HPD. It's a-a

4 single entity, multiple buildings, a single entity.

COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: And if—if the tenants are protected by rent stabilization, why do they need the tax—what—what—why are we giving a tax abetment when we know that tenant is protected anyway?

GARY SLOMAN: It's not a question of protect the tenants. It's a question of keeping the rents at an affordable level, and the only way you can do that is provide a-

COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: [interposing] Thethe-the rents are set by Rent Stabilization. It
doesn't matter if rent-

GARY SLOMAN: Well, the problem becomes that eventually because of the Lower East Side and you know what's happened to real estate prices there, the rents are not sufficient to cover the taxes as the taxes go up. So, the purpose of this exemption is reduce the taxes initially and then to have a predictable increase in taxes over the life of the exemption so that the—the rents, which are controlled keeps—keep even with the taxes.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: So, it's-it's a

3 partial abatement in other words?

GARY SLOMAN: That's correct.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Can I say

6 something.

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COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: I can't tell you you can say something, but I'll bet the chair could. [laughs]

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Of course you

can.

want to elaborate a little bit. This is a not-forprofit housing organization, housing developer. They
took a lot of these buildings during the 1970s that
were empty and built them and made them affordable
housing because of rising real estate taxes and the
loss of J51 benefits, they've—the taxes have
increased and, in fact, they have been unable in some
buildings to pay their taxes, and we're going to—we
were going to lose those buildings as affordable
housing. We were able to work out with HPD whether
another, in—in two instances where another not-forprofit developer in my community was able to take

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over those buildings because the liens have been sold. So this is what we're trying to prevent here, you know, because otherwise they're not going to be

6 be sold. A new owner will purchase the building and

able to pay the taxes. The buildings, the liens will

7 then they will lose their rent stabilized status. So

8 that's the-what we're trying to prevent going

9 forward. So just wanted to put that on the record.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Alright, thank you. Any more questions from the Committee? Are there any members of the public who wish to testify? Alright, seeing none, I will now close the public hearing on LU 614 and we're going to take a twominute break. [pause for 2-minute break] Alright, so we're back. So, we're going to move forward on the third item on the calendar today is Presconsidered LU 163rd Street Improvement Council. This application is for a new 40-year tax exemption pursuant to Section 577 of the Private Housing Finance Law to facilitate that we have rehabilitation and preservation of four multi-family buildings totaling 73 units of affordable rental housing in Council Member Gibson's district in the Bronx. The prior tax exemption would be terminated as a new exemption. Ιt

CONCESSIONS 1 would result in additional units being set aside for 2 3 formerly homeless households with new rentals being restricted to no more than 80% of the AMI. I am now 4 opening up the public hearings on LU 638. Please 5 introduce yourselves. 6 7 ARTIE PEARSON: Artie Pearson, Director of Land Use from the Department of Housing, 8 Preservation and Development. JEREMY HOFFMAN: And Jeremy Hoffman, 10 11 Director of Participation Loan Program. ARTIE PEARSON: So, we're doing the 12 13 preconsidered item? Okay. 14 CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Yes, 15 Preconsidered Item 638. ARTIE PEARSON: It's Prescondiered--? 16 17 [pause] 18 CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: I'm sorry. So it's Preconsidered LU 163rd Street Improvement 19 Council. 20

ARTIE PEARSON: Okay, the preconsidered item consists of an exemption area made up of four buildings located at 1088 Washington Avenue, 1102 Washington Avenue, 494 East 167th Street and 382 East 168th Street in Bronx, Council District 16 and is

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known ad 163rd Street Bronx HDFC. The buildings were 2 3 originally approved for disposition by the City Council in June 1999, and were developed under HPD's 4 Special Initiatives Program. Under the Special 5 Initiatives Program, 60% of the units were reserved 6 7 for homeless families, and after the project reached 8 this homeless requirement the regulatory agreements mandated that 50% of the units remain available for homeless families for 15 years. After the 15-year 10 11 period units can be rented in accordance with the 12 project's income eligibility limits. As the 13 restriction period has now expired the buildings will 14 undergo refinancing and rehabilitation through one 15 HPS' Year 15 Preservation Programs. There are four 16 buildings in the portfolio and have a combination of 17 73 units with very few vacancies. There is a mixture of bedroom types including 1, 2 and 3-bedroom units. 18 19 The household incomes are below 80% of AMI with rents ranging from \$898 for a studio to \$1,078 for a 3-20 bedroom apartment. In addition to the residential 21 2.2 units, the project has a combined total of six 2.3 commercial spaces of which one is occupied by a delicatician-delicatessen. As previously mentioned, 24

the project is undergoing refinancing in order to

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facilitate much needed rehabilitation to correct 2 3 building conditions. The rehabilitation is designed 4 to meet Enterprise Green Community Initiatives to maximize efficiencies. The work will include window and skylight replacements, new kitchen and bathroom 6 fixtures as well as upgrades in light fixtures. 7 8 Additionally, new tile flooring in the common areas and new building entry doors will be installed. Furthermore, outstanding Housing Code violations will 10 11 be addressed during the rehabilitation. 12 relocation will be required as the renovations can be 13 done with tenants in place. In order to help 14 maintain affordability of the residential units, HPD 15 is before the Council seeking approval of Article 11 16 tax benefits, and Council Member Gibson has been 17 briefed on the project and has indicated support for

2865 Kings Bridge Terrace. This application is for a mortgage loan pursuant to Section 23 of the Private Housing Finance Law for properties located at Block 3256, Lots 156 and 75 in Council Member Cabrera's district in the Bronx. I am now opening up the public hearing on LU 639. Please introduce

ARTIE PEARSON: Artie Pearson, Director of Land Use from HPD and I'm joined by Gary Sloman. Land Use No. 639 concerns a Bronx Mitchell Lama cooperative known as Kingsbridge Arms located at 2865 Kingsbridge Terrace and 2801 Kingsbridge Terrace. The cooperative has a stand-alone garage for the benefit of the shareholders and is in extremely poor condition and requires -- I'm sorry, it is a liability for the corporation. The garage requires rehabilitation but HPD's typical long repair authorization do not cover this type of repair because the funds are non-residential. The funds are for their non-residential structure. However, Mitchell Lama Law Private Housing Finance, Article 2 Section 23 does permit such a loan. Accordingly, their housing company has applied to HPD for a loan from HPD pursuant to Section 23, which authorizes

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2 rehabilitation loans to Mitchell Lama Housing

3 companies provided such loans are approved by the

4 local legislative body. Therefore, HPD is before the

6 Kingsbridge Arms, Inc., and Council Member Cabrera

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Thank you. Any members from the committee. Alright, and just for the record we were notified by Council Member Cabrera that he is in favor of this project.

ARTIE PEARSON: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Alright, so we're just going to take— [background comments] I'm sorry, yeah, are there any members of the public who wish to testify? Seeing none, I will now close public hearing LU 639, and we will take a quick break. [pause, background comments] Alright, we're back. Thank you very much. So, the final item on the calendar for haring is LU 638 a tax exemption for the Lot Legacy Apartments. These are 21 multiple dwellings in the East Harlem and Upper East Side neighborhoods of Manhattan. The proposed 40-year tax

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exemption would facilitate the preservation of 359

units of affordable housing between 30% of AMI and

80% of AMI. Three of the buildings are in Council

Member Kallos' district and he is in support of this

application. Eighteen of these buildings are in

Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito's district and she is

in support of this application. I am now open up the

9 public hearing on LU 638.

ARTIE PEARSON: Thank you. Land Use No. 638 consists of an exemption area comprised of 111 to $117 \text{ East } 100^{\text{th}} \text{ Street}$, $107 \text{ East } 100^{\text{th}} \text{ Street}$, 1325Park Avenue, 177 to 179 East 111st Street, 178 East 101st Street, 1265 Park Avenue, 441 East 116th Street, 447 to 449 East 116th Street, 453 East 117th Street, 21 East 104th Street, 29 East 104th Street, 103 East 100th Street, 119 to 121 East 100th Street, 114 East 102nd Street, 116 East 102nd Street, 1553 and 1555 Lexington Avenue, 242 and 332 East 106th Street and 2051 Second Avenue in Manhattan Council Districts 5 and 8 and is now know as the Lot Legacy Apartments. In the early 1990s the City Council approved the disposition of the buildings under various HPD rehabilitation programs. The initial tax credit compliance period for the buildings in the-in the

project, which perceived—previously received credits 2 3 has ended and the project is undergoing a repositioning, which includes refinancing or moderate 4 5 rehabilitation under HPD's Year 15 Preservation Program. Lot Legacy is a portfolio of 21 buildings 6 7 with a total of 359 units including six superintendent apartments. Of the total of units, 8 343 are occupied and 16 are currently vacant. There is mixture of unit types throughout the portfolio 10 11 including studio and 1 to 4-bedroom units. current income targets for the rental units are 12 multi-tiered including 30, 60, 80 and 80% of AMI with 13 20% of the 80% AMI units reserved as permanently 14 15 affordable. In addition to the residential units 16 there are six commercial spaces of which four are 17 occupied. Rehabilitation of the properties include 18 roof and window replacement, recently repaired boiler 19 replacement, kitchen and bathroom upgrades, painting, 20 common area and flooring upgrades as well as new mailboxes and elevator modernization. In addition, 21 the work includes the installation of energy 2.2 2.3 efficient lighting and solar panels in four of the buildings located a 111 to 117 East 100th Street, 119 24 to 121 East 100th Street, 29 East 104th Street and 177 25

to 179 East 101st Street after an analysis was completed by Bright Power, given their size, location and sun exposure. In order to exist with maintaining affordability of the residential units. HPD is before the Council seeking approval of Article 11 tax benefits for a term of 40 years. Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito and I now understand Council Member Kallos has been briefed and have indicated support for the project. I appreciate both of their supports. Thank you, Chairman.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Thank you. I'm sorry. Can you just state your name for the record?

JORDAN PRESS: Yes. Jordan Press from

HPD's Government Affairs Unit.

Jordan. Any questions from members of the committee.

Council Member Kallos? No, alright thank you. Are there any more members of the public who wish to testify? Seeing none, I will now close the public hearing on LU 638. Today we will be voting on the items we just heard, which have the support of the local council members. We will also be voting on three more items that have already been subject to public hearings. Those are LU 604, the Conquest

4	Application, LU 617 and 619 both in the Morrisania
5	neighborhoods in the Bronx. The Concourse Village
6	West Application seeing a tax exemption for a period
7	of 40 years pursuant to Private Housing Finance Law
8	will facilitate the development of three multi-family
9	building totaling 265 units of affordable rental
10	housing. The project will target AMI bands ranging
11	from 30% of the AMI to 100% of the AMI. After
12	significant negotiations I am in support of this
13	application. The Dream Yards NEP application seeks
14	Article 11 tax exemptions for a period of 40 years to
15	facilitated the preservation of six multi-family
16	buildings a total of 127 units of affordable housing
17	on 168 th Street and six multi-family buildings
18	totaling 174 units of affordable rental housing on
19	University Avenue will be preserved. These
20	applications are in Council Member Gibson's district
21	and in Council Member Cabrera's district and they are
22	in support of these applications. We will now move
23	forward onto a vote to approve LU 615, LU 616, LU 638
