CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Alright. We are also joined by Council Member Bill Perkins from Manhattan, and thank you. Is who? [background comments] Is from Harlem. Excuse me. Alright, let's note that for the record. We, um, thank you to our Committee Counsel Elizabeth Guzman and thanks as always to Chuck Davis, Director of Investigations and Andre Johnson Brown and Joseph Anderson. They did a lot of investigative work on this week's appointments. Today, the Council will vote on two candidates Nasr O. Sheta for appointment to the New York City Board of Standards and Appeal as the engineer member to fill the vacancy and serve the remainder of six-year term that expires on January 1, 2023, and second Michael Rivadeneyra for appointment as the Bronx representative to Civilian Complaint Review Board just to succeed Yungat Yune (sp?) and serve the remainder of a three-year term that expires on July 4, 2019. We had a good hearing with both of them last week, and the committee members felt that

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 5 they were both highly qualified for these positions and that that Nara Sheta know a lot about geotechnical engineering, and the things that are needed in that, which is essentially a staff position. It's a board appointment, but it's a fulltime paid staff position as the engineer member on the BSA, a really important thing for the public to have because developers seeking variances often hire highly skilled and technical consultants to make claims about their need for more bulk or higher density and having a skilled engineer who can really review the drawings and the program and see whether that's actually needed or not is critical, and so we want to get him on there quickly. The one issue that was outstanding from that hearing is the question of Mr. Sheta's residency. Pursuant to Public Officer's Law Section 3, Mr. Sheta is required to be a resident of the city of New York upon appointment to the BSA. At the time of our meeting on August 2nd, Mr. Sheta had executed a lease to move from his-where he's lived in New Jersey to a residence in Astoria, Queens, and he informed us at that time he would provide an additional indices of residence by changing his driver's lice and voter registration to

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS the Astoria residents by today's confirmation hearing. Members, you'll be pleased to see that that evidence is provided in your packet. He's changed his voter registration. He's got a new driver's license, and an in addition, Council investigators performed a field residence check at the Astoria residence and Mr. Sheta was home in his Astoria apartment. So, we take the rules of the Charter and residency requirement seriously. I think a lot of this work is behind the scenes work that's always in these red binders, but I want to say that we always really value the work that Chuck Davis and his team do. [background comments] There was a question. Apparently he had also been looking at a home on Staten Island, but ultimately he chose to move to Astoria. There are some boards where you have to have one person from each borough or there's a borough residency requirement, but it's not a requirement of the charter that the engineer member of the Board of Standards and Appeals live in Staten Island. And I understand that there's plenty of demand for housing on Staten Island. So, you don't necessarily need him to-to live there. So, with that information, with all the additional evidence and
