5	CHAIRPERSON BARRON: Ready? [gavel]
6	Good afternoon everyone. My name is Inez Barron, the
7	chair of the Committee on Higher Education, and today
8	we will vote on Resolution No. 1559, which calls on
9	the New York State Legislature to pass Assembly Bill
10	6811/Senate Bill 5120, an act to establish a private
11	student loan task force.
12	According to the Federal Reserve system,
13	national outstanding student debt amounts to more
14	than \$1.4 trillion. In New York, as per the State
15	Comptroller, student loan debt more than doubled from
16	2006-2015 to \$82 billion and the number of student
17	loan borrowers rose by more than 41% to 2.8 million.
18	In New York City, the Federal Reserve
19	Bank of New York reported that 16.2% of consumers had
20	a student loan with an average balance of \$35,300 and
21	14% of those borrowers were at least 90 days late on
22	their payment. The high student debt that many New
23	Yorkers have to shoulder also affects the economy.
24	It should not come as a surprise that huge student

debt burdens force many to take two or three jobs,

often at low-wage positions to keep up with their

3 payment, delay having a family or even buying a

4 house, which has always been the fractured vision of

5 the so-called American dream.

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For many people, student loans create lasting financial difficulty that cannot be discharged by bankruptcy. The decision to go to college should never hinge on whether one can afford the payment. Failing to go to college in today's global economy is severely limiting one's social, economic and political potential. As many of you know, I have continued to stress the importance of a college degree in today's global economy. While I have not been alone in my vocal support for increasing access to higher education, too many of our policymakers have failed to do their best to ease student debt and make tuition affordable.

Back in 2015, in an attempt to mitigate the burden of growing student debt, former President Barack Obama issued a directive that capped borrowers' federal loan repayment to 10% of their income and would have forgiven debt after 20 years of payment. Effectively, it was an expansion of a program offered to borrowers with especially low

income and it was expected to benefit nearly six
million more Americans. Unfortunately, with more
concern for the banks and lenders, the Trump
Administration reversed President Barack Obama's
directive last March. However, Assembly Bill 6811,
sponsored by State Assembly Member Marcos Crespo and
the companion bill in the Senate, Senate Bill 5120,
sponsored by State Senator Jesse Hamilton, hope to
address the debt burden for New Yorkers with private
student loans. The bill seeks to establish a private
student loan refinance task force which would bring
together the State Comptroller, the Higher Education
Services Corporation and lending institutions in New
York that offer private student loans to study and
report on ways these lending institutions can be
incentivized to established student loan refinancing
programs. Though this is a small step toward
addressing an ever-growing problem, we must support
the State's efforts to address the student debt and
offer New Yorkers some relief.

This brings us to today's vote on

Resolution No. 1559 which calls upon the New York

State legislators to pass and the Governor to sign

A.6811/S.5120, an act to establish a private student

3	vote in favor of passing this resolution.
