7	Vanessa Gibson, chair of the Committee on Public
8	Safety. I welcome each and every one of you to
9	today's important vote on a number of important
10	pieces of legislation as well as resolutions.
11	This morning we will be voting on
12	Proposed Intro 1724-A, which is relating to requiring
13	the Police Department to disclose gun violence
14	information to applicants for firearm licenses as
15	well as permits.
16	Resolution No. 1676, which opposes
17	current federal legislation known as the Hearing
18	Protection Act of 2017, as well as Proposed
19	Resolution 1677-A, which opposes pending federal
20	legislation known as the Concealed Carry Reciprocity
21	Act of 2017.
22	I am proud to co-sponsor each of these
23	pieces of legislation as well as the resolutions
24	along with our Speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito. All
25	three pieces of legislation and resolutions related

to gun safety. Almost every day in America in this
country someone is killed by gun violence; in fact,
the majority of these cases, unfortunately, do not
make the news because it's all too common to make it
worthy of news. Despite this being an almost every
day occurrence, our federal lawmakers have refused to
take sensible action on comprehensive gun control
legislation. We in the City of New York have one of
the strongest gun laws in this nation and we must
truly do everything possible to continue to pass
reasonable and practical legislation. In addition,
we continue to stand firm in opposing harmful federal
legislation that threatens to undermine all of the
great progress we have made in this city which
further keeps New Yorkers less safe and truly, truly
undermines our efforts to protect every New Yorker.

Resolution 1676 opposes the federal legislation that's known as the Hearing Protection Act of 2017. This deceivingly titled bill would eliminate the transfer tax on silencers and eliminate the months-long federal registration process. Many of the recent victims of the Las Vegas shooting were saved because they could hear the sound of gunfire. This loosening of restrictions on gun silencers would

Proposed Reso 1677-A will call upon Congress and the President to oppose the federal Concealed Carry Reciprocity Act of 2017. Committee heard and passed a resolution on a similar bill last May under the former federal administration. We continue to oppose this dangerous piece of legislation. This bill would allow a resident from one state who has a license to carry a concealed handqun to lawfully carry their firearm to a different state regardless of the licensing eligibility standards of the other state. New York City has one of the strictest licensing laws and our licensing division at the NYPD conducts a rigorous screening of each applicant prior to granting that The City does not recognize out-of-city license. permits, including those issued by the State of New York. This federal bill would undermine our ability to keep our fellow New Yorkers safe and it would also compromise our police officers' ability to safely police our streets.

Finally, Proposed Intro 1724-A relates to requiring the Police Department to disclose gun violence information to applicants for firearm licenses and permits. According to surveys, 63 percent of Americans believe that having a gun in their home makes them safer; however, many studies indicate guite the opposite. Homes with firearms have an increased risk of suicide; accidental shooting and death during domestic incidents. This bill would require the NYPD to provide a warning to applicants for firearm licenses and permits relating to the increased risk of owning a firearm. Just like the warnings that you see on the side of cigarette packs have changed the perception of smoking, these gun warnings are the first step to changing the public conversation. We would be one of the first major jurisdictions to enact this type of legislation.

I'd like to thank The Speaker for her leadership and sponsorship of today's legislation and resolutions and certainly the staff that have worked really hard on all of these bills before us. We truly continue to strive to pass legislation that keeps all New Yorkers safe. I hope all of my
