requirements would apply to human services
contractors, even if their services aren't provided
on City property. Each agency would be required to

security services at covered City buildings.

We will also be voting on two bills that will revolutionize the City's privacy policies. New Yorkers provide their personal information to the City every day with the expectation that it be kept confidential; that bedrock of trust that allows all New Yorkers, including immigrants, to feel sure that engaging with City agencies, schools, and law enforcement will not put them at risk. To protect those the City serves from undue intrusions of their privacy, Proposed Intro 1588-A and Proposed Intro 1557-A would minimize the identifying information the City collects and monitors to regulate the flow of information once it is collected.

Intro 1588-A, sponsored by Council Member

Jumaane Williams, would require City employees and

7	Proposed Intro 1557-A, sponsored by the
8	Speaker, will help us to refine this new privacy
9	framework through a comprehensive review of every bit
10	of personal information collected by the City and
11	whether we can do more to protect its information.

A lot of our constituents in our districts have family in Puerto Rico; the wellness check team that OEM has sent is still looking through over a hundred people that have yet to connect to their families here in New York. OEM team has now sent seven teams at two-week stints and team seven is on the ground right now preparing to give a final document to the San Juan Mayor's

Those are the things that New York is dedicated to, because that's who we are 6 7 as a city, but the stories that will be coming out, I 8 hope you listen to them, I hope you share them, I hope you find them yourself and talk about it and not allow this to die as a humanitarian crisis that it 10 11 is. With that, I don't know if you wanna say anything else. We'll keep the vote open for a few 12 13 more minutes.
