[gavel] Call the meeting of the Rules, Privileges and Elections to order. Good morning, and welcome to the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. My name is Karen Koslowitz and I am Chair of the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. Before we begin, I would like to introduce the members of this Rules Committee Present. We have Minority Leader Steven Matteo, Council Member Adrienne Adams. Council Member Margaret Chin, Council Member Robert Cornegy, Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Council Member Rory Lancman, Council Member Ritchie Torres and Council Member Mark Treyger is not here either. And of course, our wonderful Speaker Corey Johnson. I would also like to acknowledge Rules Committee Council Elizabeth Guzman. I would also like to acknowledge the staff members from the Councils Investigative Unit, Chuck Davis, Director of Investigations and Andre Johnson-Brown. First, we will consider and vote on the appointments of Mr.

We will conclude 4 5 with a vote on a resolution to ratify Council action 6 as a body in the filing of Council versus Carter, 7 filed April 17th, 2018. A case against the New York City Law Department Corporation Counsel filed under 8 the authority invested in this Speaker. I would now 9 like to call on Speaker Johnson to say a statement. 10 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you. Thank you, 11 12 Chair Koslowitz. I want to welcome our two fantastic candidates, Mr. Allen Cappelli who currently serves 13 on the New York City Civil Service Commission and now 14 15 has been nominated to serve on the New York City 16 Planning Commission. And Mr. Alfred C. Cerullo, III, 17 Fred Cerullo, as I call him. Who has been nominated 18 for reappointment to the City Planning Commission. I wholeheartedly support these appointments. Both men 19 20 have served New York City with honor, and dedication, and distinction. And are well qualified to serve on 21 2.2 the Planning Commission and I urge my colleagues 23 support these outstanding candidates and vote in favor. Both of these men are personal friends, and 24

that's not why they're being nominated today it's

I am grateful for their, and I don't say this to make them feel old, decades of service to New York City. And it's Staten Island Day here at the City Council because both men are from Richmond County. And both men, I really believe, are total mensch's and we are tremendously lucky that they have put themselves forward, Fred, and continuing to serve as he has for many years in the City Planning Commission. And, Allen, being nominated by the Mayor to serve as one of the mayoral appointees. So, I am really, really grateful and it's not often you get to sit in front of two well qualified nominees who are personal friends of yours. And they are people that I really admire, of their service in government and everything they've accomplished over the years. And they are people that have been incredibly kind and generous, and gracious to me. So I would ask all of us on the Rules Committee today to very forcefully and gratefully, vote in favor of their nominations. In addition to these two appointments, the Rules Committee will consider a resolution asking the Council, as a body, to ratify the filing of a lawsuit against the New

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS York City Law Department headed by Corporation Counsel Mr. Zachary Carter. The City Council, under my authorization and alongside Council Members Laurie Cumbo, Alicka Ampry-Samuel, and Ritchie Torres, seeks to preserve the power of Council Members to function as lawmakers. To act in their legislative capacities and to represent the interests of their constituents. The Corporation Counsel who serves at their pleasure of the Mayor, has taken the position that Council Members to not have the right to file amicus briefs in their capacity as elected officials. In support of claimants who disagree with the policies and practices of his boss, the Mayor, and the Mayor's Administration. I, along with my fellow legislators and colleagues, vehemently disagree with the Corporation Counsel's contention which seeks to usurp our powers as legislators and as representatives of our constituents. The principle of separation of powers in which the Executive and Legislative branches of government cannot infringe on the core functions of the other is well established, is a founding principle of our nation. And we believe is enshrined in the New York City Charter. The stance taken by the Corporation Counsel subverts our system

The case we have filed seeks to protect the independence of Council Members, our City's legislators, to speak in the public square and in our courts without restraint, for the people who have elected us to serve them and speak on their behalf. We will not be silenced by mayoral appointees. And we will fight for our legislative independence and our first amendment rights. This, again, is to allow Council Members in their legislative capacity to file amicus briefs on issues that we believe pertain to their functions and duties as elected representatives. And so I ask all members of this Rules Committee, and I'll ask it to the full body of the City Council later today, to please vote in favor of this as well. To support our colleagues in this body and it could be us in the future who seek to file an amicus brief on something that pertains to our legislative oversight, or local work that we do in our districts. And with that, I turn it back to the chair. And again I just, I have total glee seeing Fred and Allen sit in front of me. They are two of the best guys in New York City. Thank you, Chair Koslowitz.

federal court. We should not be silenced by the Mayor
or any mayoral appointee. It is also essential to
insist on maintain our rights as legislators under
separation of powers principles. I firmly believe

Minority Leader, Steve Matteo to say a few words.

CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Thank you. I'm going to call on my Counsel to read about the City Planning Commission.

COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Pursuant to the New York City Charter, the City Planning Commission consists of 13 Members. Seven appointments, which includes the appointment of the Chair, are made by the Mayor. One appointment is made by the public advocate, and one by each of the borough presidents. All members, except the Chair, are subject to the advice and consent of the Council. According to the charter, the members should be chosen for the independence, integrity and civic commitment. Planning Commission Members serve for staggered five year terms, except for the Chair. Who, as director of the Department of City Planning, serves at the pleasure of the Mayor. Planning Commission Members outside of the Chair are not considered regular City employees and there is no limit on the number of terms Members may serve. However, Planning Commission Members are prohibited from holding any other City office while serving on the Planning Commission. The

I was appointment the Chairman of the Unemployment Insurance Appeal Board at the end of his administration. I served on that board until I joined the staff of former Bronx Borough President Fernando Ferrer whom I served with for four years as one of his chief assistants until he left office in 2002.

ALFRED CERULLO: I will begin since I'm speaking from a place of currently sitting in that position. I think it's an excellent question, Mr. Speaker, I can say that I would hope that those who are appointing us are doing so for a variety of reasons. Obviously a sense of expertise in an area, a knowledge. I know that the Charter does not identify specific characteristics of a person, a career choice or experience, but that overall, people are nominated to a commission like this for reasons that would be broad enough and perhaps specific enough to have an understanding of general land use, and quality of life, and development issues. But that there is also a trust in the nominee by the person appointing, that they will approach the process, as you described. Which is open and thorough, someone who will do their homework, someone who listen both to the staff who very often presents the issues at the beginning of the process. But also to the community that is the most critical piece of the Land Use Review process. I think it's hard to say, this is how it works, because I certainly wouldn't want to be sitting here if I

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 23 believed that all I was contributing is the voice of a third party. Even if it's the person appointing me. I can tell you because for the past 14 years I've been a mayoral appointee, I've never felt a sense of pressure or undue influence in the process of my deliberations on issues. I have found the dialogue at the Commission level to be very open, and collegial, those of you, you all appear before the Commission at various times. You get a sense of the collegiality of the Commission and the respect between Commissioners. This is a new, obviously I'm here today as a nominee of the Staten Island Borough President, somebody who I know for 20 plus years at this point. Who I have the utmost respect for, and I hope that I'm here as his nominee because he has confidence in the process that I will go through to get to the best decision and the vote I can make. So, I think a lot of it, I can speak from experience, I haven't felt influenced by any Mayor that I've had the privilege of serving in this time. I expect that to continue in this new role as the Staten Island designee. But I do believe that communication is very important. As you know, many of you have positions where you appoint people to different things and so you get this from the

other side. I think as long as you are approaching it openly and keeping the lines of communication open, I think that the process works well. But I can assure you that if I felt that I was here for any other reason than to contribute my own sense of contribution to the process, I wouldn't enjoy this at all. So, I think that's the best answer that I can give. I think the proof will be in the pudding as we move ahead, but I welcome, always, the contribution of the Council Members and anybody who makes an appointment to the Land Use Process. Because we know it doesn't work without that.

ALLEN CAPPELLI: What Fred said. Actually,
I don't know the workings of the City Planning
Commission yet, but my experience in similar
situation, particularly the MTA, demonstrates a,
which I am no longer on. I've been off for two years,
which demonstrated my ability to A) get up to speed
as fast as I could on the issues involved so that I
couldn't be fooled or misled by staff who sometimes
have their own agenda in pursuing things. Working as
close as I could with the communities affected by
decisions we were making. I would often be at public
hearings until two o'clock, four o'clock in the

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 25 morning talking to people in the back of gymnasiums or public halls, learning about the importance of an across town bus route. And taking that information and going back and fighting for it inside the board, winning people over to the position. Pushing back against staff. And in many instances either being successful or when I ultimately couldn't live with the proposal, I would vote against something. And I would be out on the street with elected officials and riders alliance groups and strap hanger groups, protesting a decision that I believed was not in the City's or the community's best interest. I can be pretty persuasive internally. I will take the, hopefully Fred Cerullo approach of disagreeing without being disagreeable in dealing with my new colleagues, some of which I know. And hopefully I will get up to speed very quickly. I am accessible to talk about issues in general, virtually any topic involving government, but now particularly in terms of general topics involving Land Use issues in the City. I will try to maintain the reputation that I've had for 40 years in doing this.
