Good morning, and welcome to a Committee vote on the Committee of Veterans.

At this time, Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON HOLDEN: [GAVEL] Good morning.

I am Council Member Robert Holden, Chair of the

Committee on Veterans.

Resolution Number 157, sponsored by Council Member
Julie Menin, recognizing June 6th annually as D-Day
Remembrance Day in the City of New York in honor of
the courage and sacrifice of the Allied Soldiers on
the Normandy beaches in France, and it's 80 years
today, so it's very, very appropriate. This is the
most timely resolution we've ever had. The Committee
originally heard this Resolution on April 2, 2024.
Today is the 80th anniversary, as I said, of D-Day,
the largest amphibious assault in history, with 7,000
Allied ships supported by more than 11,500 Allied
aircraft. Together, with British and Canadian forces,
we landed at and secured Omaha, Utah, Sword, Juneau,

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and Gold Beaches. In fact, 24,000 Allied paratroopers, and my father-in-law was one of them, had already been dropped behind enemy lines to cut off any possible escape of the German soldiers from the Normandy shore. The Normandy Campaign was the beginning of the end for German occupation of France and, indeed, for German domination of Europe. Today, we especially remember our 2,400 U.S. casualties on Omaha Beach, which was the deadliest landing zone that day.

Now I would like to ask Council Member Menin to provide remarks on her Resolution.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you so much,
Chair Holden, and I honestly can't think of a more
fitting way for this Body to commemorate and honor DDay than what we're doing here today. It has personal
significance, I will say, for my family as a daughter
and granddaughter of Holocaust survivors, and my
grandfather. Many of my other relatives were
unfortunately killed in the Holocaust.

As the Chair eloquently said, 80 years ago today was D-Day, a fateful military operation that ultimately led to the liberation of Europe from Nazi Germany and marked the end of World War II. As

we mark the 80th anniversary of this fateful event,
it's just incredibly fitting and appropriate for us
to be doing a Resolution to commemorate and honor
that day, and I was actually surprised that it hadn't
been done earlier so I'm so pleased that we're doing
this today. As former President Barack Obama said in
2014, victory on D-Day dealt a significant blow to an
ideology that was fueled by hatred. I can think of no
better way to honor the legacy, the courage, the
fortitude, and ultimately the sacrifice of our armed
forces than having June 6th annually recognized as D-
Day Remembrance Day in the City of New York. I want
to thank the Chair for joining me on this Resolution,
and I want to thank the drafter, Regina Paul, for all
of her hard work and for my team, Jonathan Szott, my
Chief-of-Staff, and Brandon Jordan, my Legislative
Director. Thank you so much.

CHAIRPERSON HOLDEN: Thank you, Council Member Menin.

I'd like to recognize the Committee

Council Members here, Council Member Sandy Nurse,

Council Member Joann Ariola, and Council Member

Vickie Paladino.

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I would also like to thank my Staff as
well as the Committee Staff who worked on preparing
this legislation, including Daniel Kurzyna, my Chief
of-Staff, Regina Paul, to my right, the Committee's
Policy Analyst, who drafted the resolution, and Ross
Goldstein, the Committee's Financial Analyst.

I will now call on the Clerk to call the roll.

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- brave men stormed the beaches, the thoughts that must have been running through their minds and the prayers that they were reciting, knowing full well that this was, by far, could be their last and a suicide mission for so many. Prayers today for all those who were there, those who never came home, those who survived. God bless you all, and God bless America.
