CHAIRPERSON HANKS: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone. Another exciting day. Welcome to the meeting of the Subcommittee of Landmarks, Public Sitings and Dispositions. I am Council Member Kamillah Hanks, and I am the Chair of the

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Subcommittee. Today, I'm joined by my Colleagues,Marte, Nurse Salaam, Majority Leader Farías.

Before we begin with today's agenda, I will remind everyone that this meeting is being held in a hybrid format. For members of the public who wish to testify remotely, we ask that you first register online, and you may do so now by visiting www.council.nyc.gov/landuse to sign up and then sign into the Zoom and remain signed in until you have testified.

For anyone with us today in person and wishing to testify, if you have not already done so, please see one of the Sergeants to fill out a speaker's card, and we will call your name at the appropriate time.

On today's agenda, we have Land Use

Number 148, Landmarks Preservation Commission's

proposed designation of 1 Wall Street Banking Room

Interior in Council Member Marte's District in

Manhattan as a historic landmark as well as several votes.

We will now vote to approve Land Use Item
143, Malcolm Shabazz Harlem Plaza. This project is in
Council Member Salaam's District in Manhattan and
seeks to facilitate the construction of one new
mixed-use building, including two nine-story towers
containing affordable housing units through HPD's
Extremely Low and Low-Income Affordability program,
ELLA, and the new community facility space for

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existing African Vendors' Market. The proposed action involves the designation of an Urban Development Action Area, approval of an Urban Development Action Area project, and disposition of City-owned lots.

We will also vote on Land Use Number 144, the designation of Willoughby Heart Historic District in Council Member Ossé's District in Brooklyn.

I would like to call on Council Member Salaam for comments before the vote. Council Member.

COUNCIL MEMBER SALAAM: Thank you, Chair.

It is with great pride and anticipation that I sit here on the hearing for the Malcolm Shabazz Harlem Plaza. The proposed development represents more than just a new physical space in the heart of Harlem. It is a testament to our community's resilience, culture, and unwavering commitment to economic empowerment and social justice. The legacy of Malcolm X, a national and international treasure, continues to inspire generations and will be honored in every corner of this plaza. This project will serve as a vital hub for local businesses, entrepreneurs, and artists, ensuring that Harlem remains a beacon of black excellence and innovation. By providing muchneeded affordable housing, commercial opportunities,

and spaces for community gatherings, we are fostering
a future that reflects the brilliance and diversity
of Harlem's past while building new pathways for
success. As someone who has lived through the
transformative power of community support, I know
that this development will stand as a reminder of
what we can achieve together when we honor our
history and invest in our future. The Malcolm Shabazz
Harlem Plaza will not only offer economic
opportunities but also serve as a cultural landmark
that uplifts our people, keeps the spirit of Harlem
thriving for generations to come. Thank you to
everyone involved in making this vision a reality,
and let us continue to work together to ensure
Harlem's future as a rich, vibrant history. Thank
you.

MARGARET HERMAN: Good morning, Chair

Hanks and Subcommittee Members. My name is Margaret

Herman, Deputy Director of Research at the Landmarks

Preservation Commission. Thank you for the

opportunity to present our recent designation of the

1 Wall Street Banking Room Interior. Next slide.

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Completed in 1931, the Banking Room of 1 Wall Street was conceived by architect Ralph Walker and muralist Hildreth Meier as the impressive reception room and banking hall of the Irving Trust Company. This extraordinary, elaborately tiled space, known as the Red Room, was the first of several interior collaborations between Meier and Walker. LPC's designated interior landmarks are special places that must be customarily open or accessible to the public, and the Commission has only designated 123 interior landmarks throughout its history. At the public hearing on May 14, 2024, the building's owner and Community Board 1 spoke in favor of the designation, as did representatives of the International Hildreth Meier Association, the Art Deco Society, the New York Landmarks Conservancy, and the Historic Districts Council. No one spoke in opposition to the designation. Next slide.

1 Wall Street, a designated individual landmark, is located at the intersection of Broadway and Wall Street in the heart of Manhattan's Financial District. Next slide.

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The Banking Room occupies the north end of the first floor of the building. The landmark site is illustrated here, outlined in red. Next slide.

The 1 Wall Street building, originally

Irving Trust Company Building, now known as the Bank

of New York Building, was designated an individual

landmark in 2001 and sensitively converted to

residential and retail use in 2022. The stunning

former Banking Hall interior is the building's

original reception space and remains incredibly

intact. Next slide.

Ralph Walker, the architect of 1 Wall
Street, was a principal of Voorhees, Gmelin, and
Walker. Walker was one of New York's most noteworthy
designers of Art Deco high-rise buildings. Hildreth
Meier was a highly talented and accomplished muralist
proficient in a variety of mediums. Meier's
impressive body of work includes painted and mosaic
murals in churches and synagogues throughout the
country as well as the rondelles on the façade of
Radio City Music Hall. After 1 Wall Street, Walker
and Meer next collaborated on the AT&T long-distance
building lobby and later on several buildings for
other corporations. Next slide.

Construction of 1 Wall Street began in 1929 and was completed in 1931. The decorative concept was developed by Walker, who engaged Meier to work on the Banking Hall mural. Abstract designs were a departure from Meier's typically representative murals and mosaics. She collaborated with Perry Coke Smith to develop the color gradations and scale of the design. The aim of the designers was to create a room that was warm and inviting, contrasting with the cold marble of earlier banking halls. While there is a repeating motif throughout the room, its irregular shape means that each surface appears distinctive and unique. Each elevation was designated with an alphanumeric code that was stamped on individual tiles to indicate their installation location. Next

The Irving Trust and Bank Company and its successor firms occupied the building and continued to use the banking room until 2014. As you can see in these photographs, the room has had several different configurations over time. Next slide.

The banking room's undulating walls and ceiling gleam with mosaic tile in warm colors that begin in red near the floor and fade upward to orange

across the ceiling. These colored tiles are intertwined with gold patterns that create a striking verticality. The walls mimic the curved stone facades of the Art Deco skyscraper's exterior. Next slide.

The current owners undertook a full restoration of the former Banking Hall. The space is now being converted to retail use by the French company Printemps and is expected to open to the public in 2025. Next slide.

Representing the work of masters of their fields, the Banking Room of 1 Wall Street is a striking and rare example of an abstract mosaic interior by Muir and an elaborate stylistic departure from the typical stone-clad banking hall. Thank you.
