CHAIRPERSON HUDSON: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone. I'm Council Member Crystal Hudson, Chair of the Committee on Aging, and my pronouns are she/her.

Today, the Committee will consider

Proposed Resolution No. 852-A, sponsored by Council

Member Shekhar Krishnan, calling on the United States

Congress and the President of the United States to

take steps to protect Social Security.

We are joined today by Council Members Banks, Lee, and Schulman.

Nearly 9 out of 10 individuals age 65 and older nationally receive Social Security benefits as of December 31st, 2024. In New York City, about 1.3 million residents rely on Social Security, with more than 40 percent using those payments to meet basic needs. Social Security benefits are among the most essential safety net benefits for our city's older adults. After decades in the workforce, retirees and older New Yorkers must be able to count on receiving their Social Security income so that they can live

with dignity. However, earlier this year, the Social Security Administration announced in a press release that it was undergoing staffing reductions at the direction of President Trump and Elon Musk. And in alignment with executive orders from the White House, the Social Security Administration set a staffing target of 50,000 employees, down from the thencurrent level of approximately 57,000 employees. The White House also directed the General Services Administration, or GSA, to terminate leases on approximately 7,500 federal offices, including SSA offices.

Instead of dismantling Social Security and making it harder for older adults to receive their benefits, President Trump and Congress should focus their energy on strengthening Social Security and ensuring that benefits are efficiently dispersed to retirees. Proposed Resolution 852A calls for just that by urging federal officials to secure long-term funding for the Social Security to ensure that the Social Security Administration can continue providing benefits without disruption to the millions of Americans and the 1.3 million New Yorkers who rely on

Zhuang.
