whether there are any permits foreseeably required to

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perform the work specified in a contract. If so, they would need to disclose which permits are required and who's responsible for obtaining them, what actions need to be taken to obtain the permits, and how owners can verify the status of any permits. The bill would also require the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to conduct an outreach and education campaign to raise awareness of these new requirements and would require the Department of Buildings to conduct an outreach and education campaign on the watch list of contractors who have performed work without the required permits.

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Proposed Introduction Number 1308-A,
which I sponsored, would reform many of the City's
business licensing laws to ease the regulatory
burdens for small businesses without, of course,
impacting consumer protection or enforcement. It
would merge the electronic store and the electronic
or home appliance service dealer licenses. Individual
locksmiths and manufacturers of locks, for example,
would no longer need to be licensed. The
fingerprinting requirement would be eliminated for
process servers, dealers, and secondhand goods, as
well as locksmiths. Secondhand clothing dealers and

distributors for general vendors would no longer be required to be licensed, and process servers, industrial laundries, and dealer in secondhand goods would no longer be required to execute a surety bond. This bill would also eliminate fees for replacing lost or destroyed licenses so that, once again, we're making it easier on small businesses.

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Council Member Salaam is unable to be here, but he's asked that I read the following statement on his behalf.

Thank you, Madam Chair, and thank you to the Members of the Committee for allowing me to submit this statement ahead of today's vote. Intro. 1193-A is about protecting New Yorkers, especially homeowners and tenants, from being taken advantage of by contractors who perform work without the proper permits. Too often, families invest their hard-earned savings into home improvements, only to later discover that the work was done illegally, leading to fines, unsafe conditions, or delays when trying to sell their homes. This bill creates a clear responsibility for home improvement contractors to provide written notice outlining which permits are required, who is responsible for obtaining them, and
