19 It's unfortunate that we're convening today to defend

20 our institutional prerogative, but after overriding

21 the Mayor's veto to enact this legislation, it's now

clear that this Administration will seek to suspend 2.2

23 most of the requirements of Local Law 42 in court.

24 By passing this resolution, we will reaffirm the

Council's commitment to use all the tools at our

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disposal to end the human rights and safety crisis on Rikers Island. Solitary confinement by any name has proven to cause physical, psychological, and emotional harm and its use has contributed to continued violence and death on Rikers Island. properly enacted, Local Law 42 would end the practice of isolation as punishment. It would limit the Department's ability to use restraints indiscriminately, rid facilities of locked decontamination showers, and require a rationale and fixed duration for emergency lock-ins. Despite misleading rhetoric, the law does not prevent the Department from separating people from the general population who engage in violent behavior. not bar the use of restraints, and it still allows the Department to make distinctions in how people are supervised in custody. The Council stands today by its decision to pass Local Law 42 to advance a new approach to reduce violence and prioritize safety. For those who endured those horrific conditions, we will continue to fight to change the status quo. I urge all my colleagues to vote aye on this

resolution. I now turn to the Clerk to call the roll.
