Proposed Intro. Number 1050-A sponsored by Council Member De La Rosa in relation to limiting the amount of personal injury insurance coverage that the Taxi and Limousine Commission may require for licensed vehicles. I will now allow Council Member Joseph to speak on her Introduction.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Good morning, Council Member Brooks-Powers, Chair, and Colleagues of the Council. Today I'm pleased that you Members of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure are voting on Intro. 272 which was introduced in collaboration with Manhattan Board President Mark Levine. Intro. 272 which is part of my Bathroom Bill Initiative Package is a local law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to reporting on previously identified sites for public restrooms in New York City. This bill would amend the citywide bathroom strategy required by Local Law 58 of 2025 which requires part of each public bathroom strategic planning report an update regarding the status of each of the planned capital projects to install public bathrooms as a site

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE identified by Local Law 114 of 2022. Such update would require information about the nature of the project, estimate actual starting and completion date for the project, and super excited about that, and strategy for maintaining sanitary conditions, operations, and locations of the project. Access to clean and safe bathrooms in New York City is not a luxury but a necessary service. By increasing the number of public bathrooms in our city and making them accessible and safe for everyone to use whenever they need at any time of the day, we are telling New Yorkers and visitors that we see them, we hear them, and we value their safety. New Yorkers deserve much better. They deserve clean, safe, accessible bathrooms. And thank you for finally bringing this bill to a vote. Again, thank you for everyone involved, collaboration and hard work on behalf of all New Yorkers to get the bill to the finish line. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Thank you,

Chair, and I want to thank you for your collaboration

and partnership in getting this bill to the finish

line.

Intro. 1050 is long overdue relief for

drivers of the for-hire vehicles in New York City who have shouldered an undue financial burden for far too long. The taxi and limousine industry has helped generations of New Yorkers and immigrants gain financial footing in our city. My District in northern Manhattan along with the Bronx are home to the majority of livery bases in our city, making today's passage particularly important to our constituents. This industry has put students through college and led to the opening of many small businesses, bolstering our economy for decades. My family, like many working-class New York families, includes several hard-working taxi drivers. This industry is vital to the city's economy and identity, and we must do what we can to rebalance the rising cost keeping it running. Since 1998 under former Mayor Rudy Giuliani, for-hire drivers have been burdened with excessive personal injury protection requirements. This mandated coverage far exceeds what

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE is required by State law and has forced drivers to absorb exorbitant insurance costs in an industry already marked by economic uncertainty. If American Transit were to disappear from the insurance market, around 60 percent of our FHV would immediately be off the streets, and over 74,000 drivers would be left without a recourse or work. We could not sit back and do nothing. The long disregard for the crisis has led us to this point, and Intro. 1050 begins to chip away at the decades of stalling on this issue. Lowering the PIP requirement allows other insurers to enter the markets, reduces fraud claims that are attracted by our high insurance requirements, and ultimately will stabilize costs for passengers and lower the cost for drivers. This change and today's compromise on this bill will do little to impact safety while removing duplicative requirements. I thank you for your leadership on this, and I look forward to getting this done today and to my Colleagues for their support. Thank you.
