Please silent all electronic devices at 9 this time. 10 11 Chair, we are ready to begin. 12 CHAIRPERSON MENIN: [GAVEL] Good morning, 13 and welcome to today's Consumer and Worker Protection 14 Committee vote on Proposed Intro. 991-C in relation 15 to licensing hotels. I'm Council Member Julie Menin, Chair of the Committee, and first of all I want to 16 17 recognize my Colleagues who are here, Council Member 18 Ossé, Council Member Abreu, Council Member Krishnan, 19 Council Member Brewer, Majority Leader Farías. 20 I am absolutely thrilled that today New 21 York City is going to be joining other cities across 2.2 the country such as Chicago and Denver and Boston, 23 Washington D.C., Las Vegas, to just name a few in 24 licensing hotels. Licensing is a critical tool that 25 the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection uses

1 COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AND WORKER PROTECTION 3 to regulate over 45,000 businesses in our city such 2 as pedicabs, tour guides, sightseeing buses, and car 3 4 dealerships and over 40 different industries. While the hotel industry is such an important economic 5 driver and the majority of hotels are great places to 6 7 stay, there is absolutely need for regulation within 8 this industry. As mentioned by the New York Times, 9 oversight over the hotel industry has essentially been laissez-faire. Hotels that host criminals can be 10 11 difficult to shut down, and we frankly saw this firsthand in Kew Gardens in Queens with the notorious 12 13 Umbrella Hotel, which ended up being the first murder 14 in the year 2021, and we saw that the City really 15 struggled to shut that bad actor down. No longer will 16 that occur when there is licensing of hotels. 17 The Safe Hotels Act will ensure 18 protections for communities as well as for guests and 19 for workers. The bill specifically requires hotels to 20 maintain cleanliness of every quest room, equip core 21 employees with panic buttons, and provide human trafficking recognition training. The Safe Hotels Act 2.2 23 prohibits subcontracting in hotels, which will ensure that the hotel is held accountable for what occurs on 24

hotel premises, rather than shifting responsibility

This will 3 result in safer experiences for guests and workers and improved quality of service for guests and 4 tourists who visit our great city. With this bill, we 5 are finally going to address the myriad quality-of-6 7 life issues that result from bad actor hotels. Hotelrelated complaints to DCWP have doubled in the last 8 9 four years. In addition, there have been over 14,000 criminal complaints to the NYPD originating from 10 11 hotels and motels over the last five years alone. In addition, there have been 39 murders at hotels. My 12 13 bill is very clear on the new standards going forward 14 for hotels, and that is why HTC, the Hotel 15 Association of New York, the New York Labor Council, 32BJ, DC37, NYSNA, the PBA, and the five District 16 17 Attorneys, and the New York Attorney General have all 18 supported this bill. In addition to 40 of my 19 colleagues, we have a bipartisan supermajority of 20 support on this bill. I first of all want to thank HTC for 21 their incredible leadership in support of this bill. 2.2 23 I want to thank the numerous hotel owners, operators, stakeholders, HANAC, and others who've given us 24

valuable feedback to craft this bill, and I want to
