4 continue the Rules of the Council for 2010 to
5 2013 are carried by a vote of 51 in the
6 affirmative, zero in the negative, zero
7 abstentions. I will now open the floor for
8 nominations for Speaker. I recognize Council
9 Member Torres.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Thank you
11 very much, Mr. Clerk. My colleagues, today is
12 a very special day. We gather today because we
13 have been honored by the people to represent
14 them here at City Hall, and in turn, we are
15 here today to select who among us will lead our
16 legislative body. I rise today to nominate
17 someone who has the vision and the record to be
18 a great leader of our body, someone who has
19 never hesitated to speak truth to power,
20 someone who has been able to forge consensus,
21 to build bridges across communities, and has
22 unique ability to bring people together.
23 Melissa Mark-Viverito is someone who has the
24 strength of character, the wisdom of

2 experience, and the principled values to be our
3 voice here in the City Council.

4 [applause]

5 COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Melissa is a
6 smart woman and a hard worker. She served as
7 the primary sponsor of key legislation that has
8 been signed into law, covering topics including
9 tenant rights, building inspections, local
10 representation on Parks Conservancy Boards, and
11 the publication of statistics on domestic
12 violence and hate crimes. Melissa has always
13 been a voice for the voiceless. In the City
14 Council, Melissa has worked to advance an
15 agenda focused on issues affecting working
16 class and low-income families, people of color,
17 youth, seniors and immigrant communities.
18 Ladies and gentleman, this is a historic
19 moment, a historic moment. Today, we will be
20 electing the first Latino Speaker of the City
21 Council.

22 [applause]

23 COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: It is an
24 incredible achievement for the nearly 30
25 percent of New Yorkers that make up the Latino

2 community to have for the first time a city-
3 wide elected official. I urge my fellow
4 members to stand with me and give our Madam
5 Speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito, our undivided
6 support to move forward and conduct the
7 business of the people of our great city. I
8 pledge my support to Melissa, and as a proud
9 member of the Bronx delegation and as a proud
10 member of this City Council. I am honored to
11 nominate you for the Office of the Speaker of
12 the Council of the City New York, pursuant to
13 Section 44 of the New York City Charter for the
14 term commencing January 1st, 2014 and
15 terminating December 31st, 2017.

16 Congratulations.

18 CLERK MCSWEENEY: I now recognize
19 Council Member Barron.

20 [applause]

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you.
22 Thank you. I first say that I give honor to
23 God who's the head of my life. Secondly, to all
24 of my colleagues here on the floor and
25 colleagues of government who are seated on the

2 side, I want to say I give recognition to you
3 in your positions. And I stand to say that I
4 enthusiastically second the nomination of
5 Council Member Melissa Mark-Viverito to be our
6 Speaker. We have been elected as has been said
7 already to be the voice of the people. We're
8 here to make sure that their concerns are
9 addressed through the budget, through the
10 systems that we put in place, and through the
11 laws that we enact. We bring a variety of
12 talents. We bring a broad swath of ages, of
13 experiences, of life interests, of being in
14 legislation and being in business, and being in
15 the community. We bring all of that to this
16 body to represent our diverse communities. We
17 are in very challenging times. We have a
18 compressed economic system. We have high
19 unemployment, which is double in black and
20 Latino communities. We have increased
21 homelessness over the last number of years. We
22 have an inadequate education system that is not
23 preparing our children to go forth and to
24 function in our society. We have housing that's
25 unaffordable to low wage earners and middle

2 class workers, but with all of challenges come
3 opportunities, and here today we have an
4 opportunity to select a speaker that will lead
5 us as we go forth to address the needs of our
6 community, to address a justice system that we
7 know has much injustice in it and to correct
8 those injustices, and to make settlements and
9 to go forward and to make sure that people are
10 made whole, to have an economic system of
11 development in our communities that is
12 balanced. We have to realize that our
13 responsibilities to our communities, and as
14 this budget process will be upon us in the next
15 few weeks, we must make sure that we pass a
16 budget that reflects what we say we are about,
17 and we believe that in Melissa Mark-Viverito,
18 we will have that kind of acknowledgement and
19 address the needs of our community and make
20 sure that we have systems and programs in place
21 that move all of us forward, and as a
22 collective, I invite all of my colleagues to
23 join in nominating and voting for Melissa Mark-
24 Viverito. Thank you.

25 [applause]

2 CLERK MCSWEENEY: I now recognize
3 Council Member Dromm.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you
5 very much, Mr. Clerk. It is my great pleasure
6 to rise today to also second the nomination of
7 my great friend and colleague, Melissa Mark-
8 Viverito, as the next Speaker of the New York
9 City Council. I am honored to have this
10 opportunity to create history in the city of
11 New York. Over the last six years I have
12 gotten to know Melissa, and she has proven to
13 be a wonderful friend, colleague and mentor.
14 She is the most progressive elected official I
15 know. Melissa is someone whose activism is
16 both passionate and pragmatic. Her independence
17 is admirable. Her understanding of issues
18 regarding prejudice and discrimination are
19 innate, and her support for equal rights for
20 the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender
21 community is unparalleled. I have been in the
22 room with Melissa when she advocated for an
23 issue that many thought was impossible to
24 promote. I have witnessed her go up against
25 powerful forces to do the noble thing. This was

2 particularly true when she advocated for the
3 ICE on Rikers legislation when the former Mayor
4 and Speaker were opposed to it originally. She
5 is a profile in courage. She is a fighter for
6 our immigrant communities. She is a Latina. We
7 live in a democracy and the majority of our
8 colleagues have formed a coalition behind
9 Melissa Mark-Viverito to be the next Speaker.
10 Now is the time for us to unite and to get busy
11 with the business of government. Let's move
12 this city forward by voting for Melissa Mark-
13 Viverito as the next Speaker of the New York
14 City Council. Thank you.

15 [applause]

16 CLERK MCSWEENEY: I now recognize
17 Council Member Cornegy.

18 [laughter]

19 COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Testing,
20 testing, testing. Thank you very much, Mr.
21 Clerk. My colleagues, I stand tall and proud
22 today to second the motion as well for Council
23 Member Melissa Mark-Viverito to be nominated
24 for the office of Speaker of the City Council.
25 Melissa Mark-Viverito is a dedicated,

2 principled, and inclusive leader. In many
3 ways, Melissa's career has been building up to
4 this very moment. From her time as a labor
5 organizer to a Community Board member to being
6 elected as the first Latino to represent
7 Spanish Harlem to her time as Chair of the
8 Parks Committee and finally, as Co-Chair of the
9 Progressive Caucus. Melissa's always shown a
10 unique ability to bring people together toward
11 a common purpose. Melissa will be
12 representative of the people. She'll be a
13 champion of the underdog. Melissa has a long
14 track record of collaborating with her
15 colleagues to get results. I look forward to
16 working with her to serve underprivileged at
17 risk youth, senior citizens, and small business
18 owners ensuring their voices are heard,
19 respected and acted on. As we look at a city
20 that is becoming increasingly majority minority
21 it's become increasingly important and
22 incredibly important to have the new City
23 Council's leadership be reflective and
24 representative of that shift. However, my
25 support for Council Member Mark-Viverito is not

2 solely because she's a woman or a Latina. It's
3 because she's demonstrated a grasp of the
4 issues and challenges of the least represented
5 and underserved communities like parts of the
6 36th District that I represent. Before my
7 election this year I had the pleasure of
8 serving as a legislative policy analyst here at
9 the New York City Council. I know from my
10 experience as a staff member that Melissa Mark-
11 Viverito has the respect and the confidence of
12 the entire institution. There are many
13 challenges ahead, but I'm confident with
14 Melissa Mark-Viverito as our next Speaker.
15 She'll unite the City Council around common
16 ground and she'll help transform our body into
17 an effective, productive and strong institution
18 to better serve the people of not only by
19 district, but the city of New York.

20 [applause]

21 CLERK MCSWEENEY: I recognize Council
22 Member Ferreras.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER FERRERAS: Thank you,
24 Mr. Clerk. It is with immense pride that I
25 stand before my colleagues to second the

2 nomination of Melissa Mark-Viverito to the next
3 Speaker of the City Council. Melissa Mark-
4 Viverito's vision for the new Council is to
5 make sure that prosperity shared more equally.
6 New York City is calling for a more progressive
7 government, a government that will address
8 growing problems like unemployment, income
9 inequality and wage stagnation. Melissa has a
10 plan to create good jobs, expand opportunities
11 and keep all New Yorkers safe. Melissa Mark-
12 Viverito is a leader for improving the way that
13 the City Council conducts business. She's a
14 passionate advocate for reform to bring
15 transparency, hold city government more
16 accountable and give our membership a greater
17 say in decision making. We owe it to the
18 people to elect a strong independent and
19 principle woman to lead us in making decisions
20 that affect New Yorkers lives. We stand here
21 today with a historic opportunity to elect the
22 first Latino and person of color as Speaker. I
23 urge all my colleagues to vote for Melissa
24 because she is smart and a Latina, because she
25 is accomplished and a Latina, because she's

2 qualified and a Latina. It's moments like
3 right now that make me think back to when I was
4 a young girl growing up in Corona looking for
5 role models and looking for inspiration. With
6 our vote today we can send a positive message
7 to every young girl that regardless of where
8 you come from, so they can know that anything
9 is possible in our great city. Thank you.

10 [applause]

11 CLERK MCSWEENEY: I now call on
12 Council Member Garodnick.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Thank you
14 very much, Mr. Clerk. Over a year ago I
15 offered myself as a candidate to be the speaker
16 of this City Council, because I believed that I
17 could offer progressive leadership and
18 independence to a body to which I am deeply
19 committed. In the intervening months I have
20 enjoyed spending time in the Districts of many
21 of my colleagues, getting to know your
22 concerns, the concerns of your constituents and
23 your own visions for the future. I thank you
24 for the opportunity to do that. It made me a
25 better public servant and it certainly deepened

2 my affection for this great city, and you
3 should know I did it with the support of my
4 family, my wife Zoe, our two little boys Asher
5 [phonetic] and Devin [phonetic]. I know Zoe was
6 sitting in the front over there. Devin started
7 to cry. I think she escaped at least for the
8 moment. My dad who is here, David Garodnick.
9 My mom, who I believe is watching this from New
10 York Presbyterian Hospital, and Mom, Dad, I
11 love you both. Mom, I hope you're feeling
12 better soon. My friend Ander Urlick [phonetic]
13 and so many others. Today, that process comes
14 to a conclusion, and in the spirit of
15 strengthening the Council which animated my
16 candidacy from the start, I want to formally
17 concede to the next Speaker of the City
18 Council, my colleague Melissa Mark-Viverito.

19 [applause]

20 COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Thank
21 you, and I just want to say that I look forward
22 to working with Speaker Mark-Viverito and to
23 helping her ensure that we can deliver a sound
24 and responsible government for all New Yorkers,
25 one that is fair, one that is reasoned, and one

2 that serves as a respectful and strong counter
3 balance to the Mayor, and one where we
4 ourselves are balanced and respectful of all
5 ideologies, and a Council where members have
6 the room to succeed and deliver for their
7 constituents. As for Melissa, she is a smart
8 and committed public servant, and we have
9 worked extremely well together over the years
10 from immigrant's rights to tenant's rights to
11 environmental protections. And of course, I
12 look forward to supporting her work during the
13 course of this term. I also want my colleagues
14 to know that it is not lost on me that this
15 became a tense and grueling process for many of
16 us. Please know that I will do my part to
17 resolve any riffs that this process may have
18 caused among us, and I'm here to take any steps
19 necessary to help us move forward together, but
20 today, we say to our new Speaker,
21 congratulations.

24 CLERK MCSWEENEY: At this time, I
25 call on Council Member Mark-Viverito.

2 [applause]

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO: I'd
4 like to accept the nomination and ask for a
5 roll call.

6 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. At
7 this time I would like to ask if there are any
8 other nominations. Hearing none, I now close
9 the nominations and I will now take a roll call
10 vote. Please indicate your selection by
11 stating the last name of the candidate, and
12 there is only one candidate, Melissa Mark-
13 Viverito. So please call her by name. Council
14 Member Arroyo?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER ARROYO: Mark-
16 Viverito.

17 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Barron?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Melissa Mark-
19 Viverito.

20 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Cabrera?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: Melissa
22 Mark-Viverito.

23 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Chin?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Can I have a
25 minute to explain my vote?

2 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: First, I would
4 like to thank all the candidate for the Speaker
5 candidate and for this City Council, and I also
6 want to say thank you to Dan. I want to say
7 that I respect you, Dan, tremendously, and I
8 greatly appreciate your support this past year,
9 and I enjoy working with you and I look forward
10 to working with you over the next four years.
11 And I think you are a smart, capable, caring
12 leader, and I'm so glad that it all worked out.
13 And I know Melissa in the City Council and I
14 know she will be a great Speaker. New York City
15 is a progressive city, a city that voted loudly
16 and clearly for progressive future. I think
17 Melissa will be a true partner as we work
18 together to ensure that every New Yorker can
19 build a better life here. And from a personal
20 note, as a woman of color, I am so excited to
21 be passing my vote to elect the first woman of
22 color and a Latina to the City Council Speaker.
23 So I'm passing my vote for Melissa Mark-
24 Viverito. Thank you.

4 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Eugene?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER EUGENE: Can I
6 explain my vote, please?

7 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER EUGENE: Thank you
9 very much. I didn't have any intent to speak,
10 but I feel compelled to do that. As--first of
11 all, let me commend and thank Daniel for doing
12 the right thing for the City Council and for
13 New York City. And I think this is a very good
14 example how all of us should behave, come
15 together to do the business of the city of New
16 York. As the first Haitian American elected to
17 the City Council, I feel proud to be part of
18 the history and to vote for the first Latina
19 Speaker of the City Council, Melissa Mark-
20 Viverito. Thank you.

22 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Ferreras?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER FERRERAS: Melissa
24 Mark-Viverito.

25 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Garodnick?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Mark-
3 Viverito.

4 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Gentile?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Melissa
6 Mark-Viverito.

7 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Gibson?

8 COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Melissa
9 Mark-Viverito.

10 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Greenfield?

11 COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Melissa
12 Mark-Viverito.

13 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Ignizio?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: MMV.

15 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Johnson?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER JOHNSON: Mr. Clerk,
17 may I explain my vote?

18 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER JOHNSON: Mr. Clerk,
20 I had no intention of speaking as well today,
21 but I think it's a tremendous occasion and I
22 rise to whole heartedly support Melissa Mark-
23 Viverito to be our next Speaker. I want to take
24 a moment to acknowledge what was said earlier,
25 which was a spirited contest, one of the most

2 open and I believe transparent processes that
3 has ever occurred in the race for New York City
4 Speaker, and Dan Garodnick is a friend, an
5 abled, principled, smart, progressive elected
6 official who has shown his medal and has been,
7 I believe, a star in the New York City Council.
8 So I appreciate what Dan said, and my hope is
9 that under Speaker Mark-Viverito's very capable
10 and talented leadership that this body will
11 come together, get to work, fight and work on
12 behalf of every day average New Yorkers who are
13 trying to make ends meet. As one of six openly
14 LGBT members of the New York City Council, as
15 someone whose father was a teamster and who
16 grew up in public housing, I proudly cast my
17 vote today to Melissa Mark-Viverito who has
18 fought on behalf of those who have been
19 disadvantaged and without a voice in city
20 government. So I stand today to support her and
21 to thank Dan for all of his work that he has
22 done, and I look forward to working with both
23 of them in the City Council. Thank you.

24 [applause]

25 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Kallos?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: May I explain
3 my vote?

4 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I'd like to
6 acknowledge a long time friend, colleague, now
7 colleague, mentor, Dan Garodnick. You're a
8 model public servant and you're dedicated to
9 the greater good and think your actions today
10 speak loud and clear. Thank you. The New York
11 Times has said that the next Speaker will be
12 judged by her independence, the ability to
13 reform Council rules, to introduce transparency
14 and accountability. Melissa Mark-Viverito is
15 far and away one of the Council's most
16 independent. I have worked with her in the
17 caucus that she founded on drafting rules
18 reforms and was elected on a platform of
19 transparency and accountability that I am sure
20 we can deliver together. I am proud to cast my
21 vote for Melissa Mark-Viverito.

22 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. King?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER KING: Melissa Mark-
24 Viverito

25 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Koo?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Mr. Clerk, can I
3 explain my vote?

4 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: My fellow
6 colleagues, today we are very happy here to
7 congratulate Melissa Mark-Viverito to be our
8 next Speaker. This is a historic moment,
9 historic day, first Latina, the first woman of
10 color to be our next Speaker. When we did the
11 pledge--no, when we did the oath of office
12 today, when we hold up our right hand and if
13 you look at this right hand, we have five
14 fingers. Each finger belong, represents one of
15 the boroughs. Each finger had to work
16 together. The hand, if you chop off one finger
17 or two fingers, it won't be a cohesive body.
18 So, my saying is from now on, we have to work
19 together as a cohesive body. New York City is
20 one of the greatest city in the whole world,
21 financial center of the whole world. So we have
22 to do things right. In order for us to strive
23 and continue to be the greatest city in the
24 world. So, I hope we will work together from
25 today on. We forget our past; we work together

2 with full cooperation. And this morning, when
3 I left my home I told my wife, I say, "Honey,
4 from now on, we have to start more progressive
5 soup [phonetic]." Thank you. This is true.
6 Thank you. So my vote is to Melissa Mark-
7 Viverito. Thank you.

8 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you.
9 Koslowtiz?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Melissa
11 Mark-Viverito.

12 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Lancman?

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LANCMAN: Mark-
14 Viverito.

15 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Lander?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Request
17 permission to explain my vote?

18 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: With deep
20 admiration and congratulations to my friend and
21 our new leader who I know will be a smart,
22 fair, inclusive and transformative Speaker of
23 this Council. With very real gratitude to our
24 friend Dan Garodnick for helping to bring this
25 body together in the best spirit of unity and

2 service, with a hearty welcome to our new
3 colleagues, whose passion to serve their
4 districts is already very clear, making some of
5 us look old and slow, with resolute optimism
6 that under her leadership we will build a more
7 transparent, effective, responsive City Council
8 that enables all of us to represent and serve
9 our constituents and to create a more just
10 vibrant and compassionate New York City, I
11 proudly cast my vote for Melissa Mark-Viverito
12 as the next Speaker of this New York City
13 Council.

14 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Levin?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Melissa Mark-
16 Viverito.

17 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Levine?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: At which
19 moment to explain my vote? [off mic]

20 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Okay, thank
22 you. I'm new at this. [speaking Spanish]
23 Melissa Mark-Viverito. I do speak English as
24 well, and I want to say this moment demands a
25 fierce determination to advance an agenda of

2 social and economic justice. This is the
3 philosophy I hold, that I know the vast
4 majority of you hold, and I know for sure
5 Council Member Mark-Viverito holds. It's why
6 I'm proud to support you to be our Speaker.

7 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Maisel?

8 COUNCIL MEMBER MAISEL: Melissa
9 Mark-Viverito.

10 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Mark-Viverito?

11 COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO:
12 Melissa Mark-Viverito.

13 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Matteo?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Mark-
15 Viverito.

16 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Mealy?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Mark-
18 Viverito.

19 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Menchaca?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: May I have
21 a few minutes to explain my vote?

22 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

23 UNKNOWN: A few minutes?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Seconds. I
25 dedicate my vote to the working families, to

2 immigrants, to LBGT community, and to those who
3 are still recovering from super-storm Sandy.
4 [speaking Spanish]. I vote for Melissa Mark-
5 Viverito. Thank you.

6 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Mendez?

7 COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Permission
8 to explain my vote?

9 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: I turned it
11 off. Thank you. I'm going to do the Robert
12 Jackson. Colleagues, I rise just 'cause. I
13 think I've been in a unique position as opposed
14 to all of my colleagues, because I knew Melissa
15 and Dan before any of us served in the City
16 Council. We were friends and we were involved
17 in struggles. Dan and I working for our
18 communities that now border what is now our
19 districts, Kips Bay, Gramercy Park, parts of
20 Murray Hill, and Melissa and I became good
21 friends in our struggle to stop the naval
22 occupation of Vieques, Puerto Rico, and then
23 we've been involved in many struggles since. I
24 am very happy we are coming together as a body
25

2 today, [speaking Spanish]. I vote for Melissa
3 Mark-Viverito. Thank you.

4 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Miller?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: Mr. Clerk,
6 one moment.

7 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: Okay. On
9 behalf of the people of the 27th district and
10 the working families throughout the City of New
11 York, I cast my vote for my good friend and
12 more than competent leader, Melissa Mark-
13 Viverito. And to Dan, I'd like to say thank
14 you for bringing the body together. Thank you
15 for your efforts of coming out and the support
16 that you have given myself and the other new
17 members, and I'm sure that we will collectively
18 do Yoman's work. Thank you. Melissa Mark-
19 Viverito.

20 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Palma?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: Mark-
22 Viverito.

23 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Reynoso?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: Sir Clerk,
25 can I get a moment to explain my vote?

2 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: [speaking
4 Spanish] Melissa Mark-Viverito. Gracias.

5 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you.

6 Richards?

7 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Melissa
8 Mark-Viverito.

9 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Rodriguez?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: May I
11 explain my vote?

12 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: First of
14 all, I would like to dedicate my vote to the 70
15 percent of New Yorkers who in the last general
16 election say that there's two New York, and
17 that we have the responsibility to close that
18 gap, that we need to provide middle class and
19 working class the opportunity to excel, that
20 every children should start their first line
21 running a marathon to know what it is, to get
22 quality education. I would like to thank Dan
23 for his leadership and his years in services,
24 but I also would like to dedicate this day to
25 Ritchie Peres [phonetic], who also was a great

2 champion, some that believed that Latino should
3 have a place in this city. There's a lot that
4 we have to do. We as New Yorkers, I am so proud
5 to say that since they year--since my 18 years
6 or so I've been living in this city and from
7 that day on, I've been getting a lot of
8 opportunity, but I never thought that one day I
9 would see someone who came from another
10 country, Puerto Rico, who knows what it is to
11 be an immigrant, who not necessarily afraid
12 it's an issue undocumented people, but she
13 embrace it at her own cost. So [speaking
14 Spanish]. Today we can say that New York City
15 will have two more progressive leaders in our
16 history, in our Mayor Bill de Blasio and our
17 Speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito. I'd also like
18 to say thank you to Seria [sp?] for believing
19 this effort and all 31 member who will stick
20 together and the 20 Council Member who join us
21 today saying we are one body that and from now
22 on we'll be moving, closing this gap between
23 the one percent and the 99 percent. Long live
24 the Wall Street Occupy Movement.

25 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Rose?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: I'd like to
3 explain my vote.

4 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: I'd just like
6 to say to Dan Garodnick that you are really a
7 class act, and so gracious.

8 [applause]

9 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: And I can't
10 thank you enough for bringing this body
11 together. This could have had a very different
12 outcome this morning, and it's your leadership
13 that brought us to this point today. I want to
14 say to my friend Melissa, expectations are very
15 high of first and I know that to whom much is
16 given much is required, and I know that you are
17 more than capable to do this job, will handle
18 it well, and hit the ground running, and I want
19 to say women rock. And I cast my vote for
20 Melissa Mark-Viverito.

21 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you.

22 Rosenthal?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: May I
24 have a moment to speak?

25 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Melissa,
3 as you know I represent the upper west side in
4 Manhattan which as you know has a tradition of
5 strong, smart, independent women, and I'm very
6 proud now to hold the seat, and I'm very proud
7 to cast my vote for you in that same tradition
8 of very strong, very smart, very independent
9 women. Thank you very much.

10 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Council
11 Member Torres?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Well, I
13 explained my vote, so Melissa Mark-Viverito.

14 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Treyger?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Permission
16 to explain my vote?

17 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: What we
19 witnessed earlier, Clerk, by the embrace by Dan
20 Garodnick and Melissa Mark-Viverito is further
21 proof that public service and our democracy is
22 not a blood sport. It's an honorable
23 enterprise, and I thank them both for their
24 leadership and the example they just set for
25 our entire body and the City of New York. And

2 only in America can the first Russian speaking
3 member of the City Council help elect the first
4 Latin American woman to the Speaker of the New
5 York City Council. I cast my vote to Melissa
6 Mark-Viverito.

7 [applause]

8 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: [speaking
10 Russian]

11 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Ulrich?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER ULRICH: Melissa
13 Mark-Viverito.

14 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Vacca?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: Melissa Mark-
16 Viverito.

17 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Vallone?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: A brief
19 moment, Mr. Clerk?

20 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: I have to
22 tell you, ladies and gentleman, walking through
23 these doors for the first time with my wife
24 this morning and seeing history be made, a
25 unique perspective I have because the shoes,

2 Madam Speaker, that you're about to fill were
3 first created by my father, the first Speaker.

4 [applause]

5 COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Just God
6 bless everyone. You've made us all very proud.
7 Dad, we love you, and we did it. Madam
8 Speaker, way to go. And Dan, way to go my
9 brother. Thank you. [off mic]

10 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Van
11 Bramer?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: With
13 permission to briefly explain my vote?

14 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So odered.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: First of
16 all, I want to echo all the kind words about
17 Council Member Dan Garodnick who is one of the
18 smartest and one of the finest public servants
19 that I've ever known, and I thank him for
20 everything that he has done today, and
21 everything that he will do in public service. I
22 also want to say I take this voting incredibly
23 seriously because in many ways I feel like I
24 wasn't supposed to be here. I vote for Speaker
25 Melissa Mark-Viverito first and foremost in

2 honor of my mother, and I see Melissa's mother
3 is here, so she knows [applause] the pride, but
4 my mother was a cashier at a supermarket and I
5 was raised by her and my stepfather who was a
6 janitor and a school cleaner, and everything
7 that I do, in everything that my public service
8 career is about is about making lives better
9 and easier for families like mine, families in
10 New York City who struggle to pay the rent, who
11 worry about the welfare of their children, and
12 I am so clear that to the core that is my
13 mission. That is why I ran for office. It is
14 those families that I come from and that I
15 believe in, and it is with my mother in mind
16 who is a strong woman, but who none of the
17 cameras and the press every saw go to work,
18 that I vote for Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito.

19 [applause]

20 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Weprin?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: Permission to
22 explain my vote please, Mr. Clerk?

23 CLERK MCSWEENEY: So ordered.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: Thank you
25 very much. Ladies and gentleman, I want to

2 first congratulate all my colleagues for their
3 re-election and those who are new to
4 congratulate you all. This has been a long few
5 months, I have to say, and I'm really proud to
6 be an elected official and delighted to be a
7 member of this body. As many of you know, as I
8 was running for Speaker to the Council as well,
9 and had the pleasure of meeting will all of you
10 in your districts and with you and learning
11 about you and your family. I was very
12 passionate in what I did, you know, and talked
13 about and the reforms I talked about for this
14 body, I met with all sincerity and that's one
15 thing I'm proud of. Everything I said was the
16 truth and I spoke from my heart. I sang, I
17 danced, whatever it took. And we need to work
18 as a body. I've said that all along. We need to
19 be a united unit working together, liking each
20 other, which we're going to work on, and we are
21 going to like each other, because if we're
22 unified and respect each other we can get
23 things done. One of the things I talked about
24 is we shouldn't be afraid of descent. We
25 shouldn't be afraid of debate, of discussion.

2 There's really nothing wrong with that. That's
3 democracy. [applause] So I was going to make,
4 no matter how the outcome of this went, I was
5 going to make this same speech, maybe
6 emphasizing that debate part more, because even
7 if we were voting for different candidates, I
8 don't think it would make difference, because
9 I'm committed to this body and I'm committed to
10 the hard-working elected officials who are
11 sitting here, who I've gotten to know and I
12 like, and I want to fight for that. And I'm
13 looking forward to working with our new Mayor.
14 We have a lot in common he and I. you know,
15 we're about the same age. We're both outer
16 borough public school parents. He's 6'5", I
17 was born on 06/05, but we have a job to do to
18 work to be--work with him on things that are
19 important to our districts, but also work to
20 oversight of his agencies and to be an
21 independent body and to do our charter mandated
22 job of being the City Council. Let me just
23 finish up, because I want to just first
24 compliment all the other Speaker candidates who
25

2 really all did a wonderful job, and I made a
3 statement--

4 [applause]

5 COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: I made a
6 statement at one point that I was impressed
7 will of them and I could be proud to stand with
8 any of them. I got to single out Dan first,
9 just because the last few weeks have been very
10 tough on a lot of us, but especially tough on
11 Dan. He has been strong. He has been
12 incredibly classy in the way he's handled
13 himself with us, so I want to congratulate him
14 as well. He's a good friend of mine. We've sat
15 together. It's been a little awkward
16 occasionally over the last few months, but it's
17 been great to be his friend, and then lastly,
18 Melissa. Melissa, I have the utmost respect
19 for you. I've said that all along. It's not
20 inconsistent. [speaking Spanish] in any way
21 saying that I respect you. I like you. I look
22 forward to working with you. You are a very
23 smart, strong-willed woman who's going to run a
24 very tight ship and a good ship, including us
25 all, and I know the people around you are going

2 to insist on that, and my commitment is to work
3 with you, and I'm happy we're together today
4 because we need to be unified. We need to be a
5 strong body, because I want to represent my
6 district to the best of my ability and
7 represent this city as an independent council
8 working with our Mayor, but standing up for
9 what we think is right. So congratulations
10 Melissa and all the best.

11 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you.

12 Williams?

13 COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: I was
14 going to vote for myself, but I remember I
15 dropped out a while back. First, I just want
16 to say thank you to Dan Garodnick whom I
17 consider a friend on this Council. It should
18 not be lost the leadership that you showed
19 today. You took this think as far as you
20 should, as someone who's contending, as someone
21 fighting. That is what democracy is about, but
22 to show leadership and said the institution is
23 stronger than any one person, that should not
24 be forgotten after today. And I look forward to
25 continue working on the things as bill moves

2 over. I continue looking forward to working on
3 the things that we've always been working on,
4 and I really appreciate you. When I went into
5 the race a few weeks ago, one of my main things
6 was to make sure that the issue of diversity
7 was not lost. I'm very happy. I want to say
8 thank you to all of us who ran and I'm glad
9 that it was a good selection of qualified
10 people who ran, and I'm happy that diversity
11 question was still discussed. People use to not
12 listen to Council Member Barron when he talked
13 about all the paintings that went in here and
14 the lack of diversity is important to people
15 who are not represented. So that question has
16 always got to be asked, and I know that my
17 mother when I was giving her all the trouble I
18 was giving her did not think I would grow up
19 and be the first Canadian-American Council
20 Member, to not think after all the things that
21 I was going through with Tourette's Syndrome in
22 school that I'd be here fighting for justice
23 issues, but I am in fact here, and I'm proud
24 that I'm able to vote for someone who is going
25 to be first person of color ever elected in

2 this body and be the first Latina to be a
3 leader city-wide. That is very, very amazing,
4 and I'm so proud to do it for my Haitian
5 constituents I say tres bien. I don't speak
6 Spanish, but I know this is muy, muy, muy
7 Bueno. Right? Did I say that right? And now,
8 muy bien. What'd I say? Alright, we're going
9 to work it out. Alright. But I am excited
10 that we have come together today, and I hope we
11 all remember now the hard work of responsible
12 governing that the people who voted us all in
13 are expecting us to do together to hold the
14 Mayor accountable but move forward
15 progressively is now beginning, and I vote for
16 Melissa Mark-Viverito.

17 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. Wills?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER WILLS: I could just
19 take my time. I'm the last person to vote, so
20 this is the only time it benefits me, right?
21 You know, a few months ago we sat here in this
22 same chambers and we had a lot of media reports
23 and things we were debating, the CSA
24 legislation and they said that the Council was
25 torn apart and we would never be unified, we

2 would never vote together on a lot of different
3 things, and once again, it seems like we're
4 proving not only the city, the state, but
5 federal wrong. A lot of media outlets and
6 different things like that, they said we could
7 not come together over our differences. We
8 were a typical legislative body, and today, I
9 think with this unanimous vote, with the
10 leadership of Dan Garodnick bringing the
11 Council together behind MMV, I think that we
12 should have that noted today, and that should
13 be something that should be noted tomorrow in
14 every one of these media outlets, whether it be
15 print or television. So I cast my vote for MMV
16 today. Congratulations Madam Speaker.

17 CLERK MCSWEENEY: Thank you. By a
18 unanimous vote of all 51 members of the New
19 York City Council, the Council Member duly
20 elected as the Speaker of the Council of the
21 City of New York for the term commencing
22 January 1, 2014 and terminating December 31st,
23 2017 is Council Member Melissa Mark-Viverito.

24 [applause]

25 [off mic conversation]

2 SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: We could ask
3 the Council Members to take a seat, please.
4 Pursuant to Section 44 of the New York City
5 Charter and Rule three of the Rules of the
6 Council, I would like to designate my good
7 friend and our former colleague, Public
8 Advocate Letitia James to be acting President
9 Pro-Tempore. The acting President shall chair
10 all stated charter and special meetings.

11 [applause]

12 LETITIA JAMES: It is my honor and
13 my privilege to now recognize my good friend,
14 my sister, the Speaker of this now united body,
15 Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito.

16 [applause]

17 SPEAKER MARK-VIERITO: Before I
18 begin, obviously, I'd like to recognize some of
19 those that are here in the room. I was going to
20 recognize our Public Advocate, but she has
21 assumed the chair. The Comptroller of the City
22 of New York, Scott Stringer, members of
23 Congress, Nydia Valazquez, a dear friend and
24 mentor, [applause] Congress Member Joe Crowley.
25 I'm not sure where he's sitting, [applause]

2 Borough President, Eric Adams of Brooklyn, and
3 I know our Deputy Borough President, former
4 colleague, Diana Reyna. Obviously, we said hi
5 and I was recognized, our former Speaker Peter
6 Vallone. [applause] Former Council Members and
7 colleagues, Eric Dilan, Charles Barron, Lou
8 Fidler, Assemblyman and another fighter who has
9 been a mentor to me, Assemblyman Jose Rivera. I
10 know we have our former Council Member Yuna
11 Clarke [phonetic] that's here as well.

12 [applause] Former Assemblyman and the Brooklyn
13 Democratic County Chair Frank Seddio is here.

14 [applause] And another mentor, someone I've
15 known for many years is the former Bronx
16 Borough President Fernando Ferrer who is here
17 with us. [applause] So, gracias to everybody.
18 Thank you very much, and before I begin, I'd
19 like to say a few words in Spanish. [speaking
20 Spanish] So thank you very much. I'm very
21 honored and truly humbled by this day. I want
22 to thank friends, mentors, supporters, members
23 of the public who have come today and those who
24 are watching online or on TV to witness our
25 democracy in action. I have to acknowledge,

2 obviously, first and foremost, very special
3 guests that are here with me. I have mi familia
4 that's here, mi ma ma [phonetic] from Puerto
5 Rico is visiting, and my older brother Anthony
6 Mark [phonetic] who's there as well.

7 [applause] They provided the foundation and
8 support that have helped me to arrive at this
9 moment and I want to thank them for their
10 constant support and for being here today, and
11 I also know that my father who never got to see
12 me as an elected official would also be
13 extremely proud today. I want to thank every
14 one of my colleagues. Whether you're from the
15 Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens, Staten Island, or
16 Manhattan, we all have the pleasure of serving
17 in the greatest city in the world. I also want
18 to personally thank someone who has
19 demonstrated great courage today is my Council
20 Member and colleague Dan Garodnick. [applause]
21 Dan, we've been colleagues since we were sworn
22 in together in 2006 and personally witnessed
23 your swearing in and I look forward to working
24 with you these next four years. You are an
25 important and strong voice in the Council, and

2 we're lucky to have you in these chambers. I'm
3 proud to say that Council Member Garodnick and
4 I conducted the most transparent Speaker's race
5 in New York City history with countless forums
6 and debates, opening up the process like never
7 before. And while it was difficult at times,
8 that only makes today's show of unity even
9 better. To my colleagues, I pledge you this, I
10 look forward to working hand in hand with you
11 in your districts, communities and
12 neighborhoods. You all have a friend and an
13 ally in the Speaker's office, and my door will
14 always be open. We will work together because
15 that is what New Yorkers expect and that is
16 what New Yorkers deserve. This council will be
17 unified--I'm sorry, my--he wasn't here earlier,
18 but my brother Randy came here as well and I
19 just want to thank him for being here.

20 [applause] We unite for a more equal and just
21 New York where everyone, no matter what borough
22 you are from, what neighborhood you were raised
23 in, or who your parents were has equal
24 opportunities. We will unite to create more
25 affordable housing, improve our educational

2 system and help those who have fallen on hard
3 times. We'll unite to fight to raise the
4 minimum wage for low wage workers at fast food
5 restaurants, car washes and airports.

6 [applause] For our undocumented immigrants who
7 are fighting for a pathway to citizenship, we
8 will unite to keep our economy strong whether
9 you work on the Grand Concourse in the Bronx,
10 Northern Boulevard in Queens, Flatbush Avenue
11 in Brooklyn, Victory Boulevard on Staten Island
12 or on Wall Street. We will unite for our brave
13 first responders at NYPD, FDNY, EMS and
14 Sanitation, our teachers, nurses, and everyone
15 who helps make this magnificent city run. And
16 yes, we will unite to hold the Administration
17 and the Mayor accountable. [applause] This is
18 our vision for this City Council, unity,
19 independence, integrity, transparency and
20 accountability. As many of you know, I came to
21 New York at the age of 18 from Puerto Rico and
22 I have lived here ever since. I have always
23 loved the city. It's the place where my mother
24 and my father were born, the place where I came
25 to visit my grandfather during the summer time,

2 the place where my abuela who was part of the
3 early Puerto Rican migration of the 1920's and
4 30's became active. In many ways, when I came
5 to New York I was following the in footsteps of
6 my maternal grandmother who uprooted herself
7 from Puerto Rico at the age of 18 to come to
8 New York City in search of a better life,
9 something unheard of at the time. Her daughter,
10 my mother, who proudly hails from the Bronx
11 went on to become a leader in Puerto Rico's
12 feminist movement, starting one of the first
13 law firms on the island led by women. So when
14 I came to New York, it was no surprise that I
15 found my home in activism. I have worked for
16 two decades at the grass roots in non-profit
17 organizations, in labor and as a public
18 servant. Today marks the culmination of those
19 years of service. As I stand here as the first
20 Puerto Rican Speaker, as the first Latina
21 Speaker, and the first Speaker to come from the
22 Black, Latino, Asian Caucus, and as the first
23 person of color, I remember my time working
24 with young people at Aspida [phonetic] of New
25 York, a Latino youth leadership development

2 organization. We taught these young people to
3 embrace their heritage and their identity, to
4 dream big and to work hard. I hope that as
5 young Latinas and Latinos are witnessing this
6 moment, they are able to dream that much bigger
7 and are inspired to work that much harder
8 because we have broken through one more
9 barrier. Over the past few months I have laid
10 out for all you my vision for Speakership that
11 is open, inclusive, and transparent, a
12 leadership style that allows all voices to be
13 at the table helping to shape the direction we
14 take as a legislative body, a leadership style
15 that puts the will of the members and the needs
16 of their constituents before the ambitions of a
17 Speaker. Many have stated that giving
18 additional power to individual members will
19 undermine the ability of the Council to
20 function effectively, but I believe that
21 empowering each member will only mean that all
22 of us will take greater ownership over this
23 body and work that much harder to preserve its
24 power and its integrity. This is our vision for
25 the new New York City Council, and once again,

2 a major gracias to all of my colleagues. I look
3 forward to continuing to work with each and
4 every one of you and to serve the great people
5 of the City of New York. Thank you.

13 SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you,
14 and I want to call on Minority Leader, Vinny
15 Ignizio to make some remarks.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Thank you
17 very much. Thank you all, and thank you
18 Speaker Mark-Viverito, or Speaker MMV. On
19 behalf of the Republican delegation, Eric,
20 Steve, and myself we wish you well and we look
21 forward. This is a great institution. I started
22 in this institution in 1997 as a staff member,
23 and I loved it then I love it now, and I think
24 the press and those that are watching can take
25 homage and look at this body and see what a

2 truly great body it is. There are people on
3 both sides who supported Melissa, those who
4 supported Dan, those who supported Jumaane,
5 well, Jumaane supported Jumaane. I'm just
6 kidding. That genuinely--at least it's you
7 standing and Cornegy. Look at me compared to
8 Cornegy. Who are genuinely good people, who
9 gave their word to someone and stuck with it,
10 who believed in a candidate and stuck with
11 them, and that's what true democracy is all
12 about. My colleagues on both sides of this
13 fight weren't fighting. They believed someone
14 would be better juxtaposed to the other person.
15 We had two qualified candidates, and now we
16 have one Speaker, and we all need to come
17 together, lay off what occurred and say we have
18 a job to do, because the people of the City of
19 New York elected us to go before them and say
20 we got your back. We understand there is fraud
21 in the system, and we'll use our oversight
22 power to get it, get to it. And by the way,
23 that doesn't always put you at contention with
24 the Mayor. The mayor wants us to find and root
25 that out as well. Where we disagree with the

2 Mayor, this body will disagree respectfully.
3 Where this delegation disagrees with the
4 majority, this delegation will do it
5 respectfully. We don't need to become some of
6 our other colleagues in other jurisdictions
7 around this country. This is the people's
8 house. This will remain the people's house.
9 This is the laboratory of people who want to
10 see good public policy. We test it out here,
11 and you know what, more often that's not. Good
12 pieces of legislation spread from this New York
13 City Council to the entire nation. And that's
14 thanks to my colleagues right here. There is
15 a lot of work to do, but I could tell you, the
16 Republican Delegation, the more centrist and
17 the more conservative, well you know what, we
18 don't kids sleeping on the streets either. We
19 don't want people in homeless shelters either.
20 We don't want our seniors, our aging
21 populations suffering because they can't pay
22 for their own medicine and they have to choose
23 between medicine and food. So you have a
24 partner in us, Madam Speaker. You all know the
25 Republican delegation in this body has always

2 been one that could work with anyone and will
3 continue to do so, and I am proud to be elected
4 by my great colleagues here, the next minority
5 leader of the City Council. Thank you all very
6 much. Thank you Madam Speaker.

6 would like to note that it does not include a
7 broader coalition of members of the Council
8 that I think probably should be included on the
9 list. So I think we should revisit that
