Introduction 1122-A, sponsored by Council member Jennifer Gutiérrez, would require the Office of Technology and Innovation to develop and publish on its website an internet master plan for the City to improve access to broadband internet in homes throughout the City. We thank our staff members Irene Byhovsky and Erik Brown.

Introduction 928-B, sponsored by Council Member Sandy Nurse, would require the Department of Transportation, in consultation with the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Department of Environmental Protection, and the Mayor's Office of Climate and Environmental Justice, to conduct a pilot project on the use of cool pavement. Thank you to our staff member, Mark Chen.

Next Introduction 925-A, sponsored by

Council Member Farah Louis, would require biennial
inspections of steam radiators located in apartments
where a child under six lives. If an inspection
reveals a defect or damage to a steam radiator, the
building owner would be required to correct it within
14 days. Any condition considered hazardous to life
or safety would require the building owner to remove
the steam radiator from service within 24 hours of
the inspection and repair or replace the steam
radiator within seven days.

I want to take a moment, colleagues, to acknowledge the Kuravsky family, who are here with us today, seated right here. They lost their baby boy

two years ago from injuries from a malfunctioning steam radiator. And as I said earlier, my heart is with you. Our hearts are with you. Binyomin Zachariah should still be here with us today. But I do thank you for your courage and commitment to ensuring the safety of countless New Yorkers, particularly the children. We thank our staff members Rachel Conte, Austin Malone, William Eck, Jose Conde, and Dirk Spencer.

Introduction 1208-A, also sponsored by

Council Member Gutiérrez, would require the

Commissioner of Social Services and the Commissioner

of Housing Preservation and Development to issue a

biannual report on the availability of air

conditioning in a homeless shelters. Thank you to our

staff members, Aminta Kilawan and Penina Rosenberg.

Introduction 1232-A, sponsored by Council Member Chris Banks, would require the Human Services Administration to make available as a part of the application for emergency assistance grants for rental assistance, processes by which applicants may authorize HRA to send a text or an e-mail notification to the applicant or the building owner or a managing agent designated by the building owner

upon the approval of the application. We thank our staff members, Aminta Kilawan and Alejandro Carvajal (phonetic).

Introduction 1372, sponsored by Deputy
Speaker Diana Ayala, would require that the rent
contribution for CityFHEPS recipients not exceed 30%
of the household's total monthly income, regardless
of whether the household receives public assistance
or has earned income. We thank our staff members,
Christina Yellamaty, Aminta Kilawan, Penina
Rosenberg, and Justin Campos.

Next, we'll vote on two bills that build on our efforts to improve wage transparency and pay equity in our city:

Introduction 982-A, sponsored by Council member Tiffany Cabán, would require private employers with more than 200 employees working in the city to submit a pay data report to an agency designated by the Mayor to improve wage transparency.

Introduction 984-A, sponsored by Majority
Leader Amanda Farías, would require a designated
agency, in coordination with the Commission on Gender
Equity and other relevant agencies, to conduct an
annual pay equity study on private employers with 200

or more employees. The study would use the pay data submitted by employers to evaluate whether there are disparities in compensation based on gender, race, or ethnicity. We thank our staff members, Sarah Swaine and Rachel Cordero.

Introduction 1390-A, sponsored by Council Member Lynn Schulman, would amend New York City's cooling tower testing requirements by requiring building owners to test for the presence of microbes at least every month during periods of the year when cooling towers are in use. This bill is being passed after the City experienced its worst Legionnaires outbreak in a decade this summer, which resulted in seven deaths and 90 people hospitalized. Thank you to our staff members, Christopher Pepe and Sara Liss.

Lastly, we'll vote on several pieces of legislation that will reform the City's nonprofit contracting and payment processes. For too long, the City has failed to pay nonprofit organizations with City contracts to deliver services in a timely manner. These long-standing issues have resulted in service interruptions, organizations accruing debt, layoffs, and even organizations shutting down altogether. In my State of the City Address this

year, I announced a series of proposals to improve this process and support the stability of nonprofit organizations. I'm proud of these major reforms that will help nonprofits focus on delivering the services that New Yorkers rely on them for.

Introduction 1249-A, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, would require all Human Services agencies to submit annual reports on contract registration during the previous fiscal year. An agency would be required to submit a corrective action plan if it registered 250 or more contracts or contracts valued at over \$25 million in the previous fiscal year, and more than half of its contracts or contract value were registered 90 days or more after their start dates. We thank our staff members Alex Paulenoff and Rachel Cordero.

Introduction 1248-B, sponsored by myself, would establish an Office of Contract Services, the head of which would be the director of Contract Services, who would serve as the City Chief Procurement Officer. The office would have the authority to coordinate citywide procurement activities for mayoral agencies, including reviewing contract guidelines, conducting pre-audit and post-

audit reviews of contracts, and providing training and technical assistance on procurement matters.

Introductions 1247-B, sponsored by myself and Council member Julie Won, would require immediate advance payment of 50% of the value of a nonprofit's contract with the City as an advance upon registration by the Comptroller. The bill excludes emergency contracts, specific contracts processed by the Department of Homeless Services for Temporary Housing Assistance, and any contracts processed by the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice and residential foster care and emergency domestic violence contracts. We thank our staff members, Alex Paulenoff, Rachel Cordero, and Nicholas Connell.

DEPUTY SPEAKER AYALA: Thank you, Speaker Adams. We will now move into the Discussion of General Orders, and we will be calling on Council Member Louis, followed by Council Member Cabán and Council Member Banks.

COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Thank you, Madam

Deputy Speaker. Good afternoon, colleagues. Today,

the Council has the opportunity to pass legislation

1 that will save lives and ensure that no family 2 3 endures a preventable tragedy in their home. It is beyond time for our city to stop turning a blind eye 4 5 to the crisis of steam radiators. The devastating tragedies and significant life-changing injuries 6 7 caused by steam radiators remind us that no family, like the Kuravsky family from Brooklyn, or Alex 8 Pacheco, and the Ambrose sisters from the Bronx, 10 should ever have to face such pain because of

unexpected or unsafe heating systems.

Introduction 925 mandates the inspection and repair of steam radiators in apartments and buildings across our city. This is a vital measure to protect our most vulnerable—children—and strengthen housing safety and to hold landlords accountable. The City already requires inspections of lead paint and window guards for apartment buildings, so it is beyond time for steam radiators to be included in the Housing Maintenance Code. With numerous incidents of radiator explosions and malfunctions spanning all the way back to the 1930s, it is time to implement inspections of this harmful risk in our aging housing stock. I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of Introduction 925, as it is our duty and obligation

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 28 to protect all New York residents, no matter where they live.

I want to thank the Kuravsky family for their steadfast advocacy, the Committee Counsel,

Austin Malone, and my staff, Daniel Heredia, for their hard work on this legislation. Thank you.

DEPUTY SPEAKER AYALA: Council Member Cabán?

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you.

Injustice persists when it's allowed to hide in the shadows. And with our pay equity package, we're pulling back the curtain. Yesterday was Latina Equal Pay Day, marking how far into the year Latino workers must work to earn what white non-Hispanic men made last year.

Nationally, Latinas earned just .57¢ on the dollar. So the Cabán-Farías Pay Equity Package directly tackles these inequities. By requiring large employers to report pay data and mandating vigorous analysis, we're giving policymakers the tools to close wage gaps at their root.

I'm deeply grateful to Majority Leader
Amanda Farías. Pal Her (phonetic), New York, Legal

And I'm grateful today to be supporting the passage of Baby Binyomin's Law, because every New Yorker should be safe in their home. To Binyomin's family, to Alex and Bessie, thank you again for turning your son's legacy into safety for every child in New York. You have done a very heroic thing.

Our job as Council is to protect New Yorkers, and today we are doing just that. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER BANKS: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader.

I'm happy to speak in support of my bill, Introduction 1232, which requires the Human Resource Administration to send an automated text or e-mail notification for an application for the emergency assistance grant program, related rental assistance, is approved. These notifications would go to both the tenant and the building owner or management agent, providing key details such as the approved grant amount, estimated issuance, the date, and the payment method.

In my district, HRA-related issues make up a large number of these cases that my office handles. Time and time again, we've seen both tenants and property managers left in the dark, unsure if aid has been approved or when payment is coming. This bill addresses the communication gap, ensuring that no family loses their home simply because no one knew help was already on the way.

I thank my colleagues for their support and urge them to support Introduction 1232. I also want to thank my staff for their dedication in helping to bring this across the finish line. Today, we're also passing Introduction

1265, which will begin to address some of the deep

frustrations that New Yorkers have with Housing

Connect, the City's affordable housing lottery

platform. Citywide, our housing lottery receives just

about 670 applications for every single unit of

housing listed, and just one lease is issued for

every 1,000 applications that are submitted.

Every day in my district, we serve dozens of these applicants, our neighbors who are desperate to find an apartment. But the technology that our city uses to get people into affordable housing has made it harder, not easier, for New Yorkers to find an apartment that meets their needs. Applicants today are inundated with too much information, like housing that they're not eligible for; they're given false

I would also like to express my support and congratulations to Council Member Louis and my condolences to your family for passing this important, important legislation. Thank you.

Today, we are correcting yet another costly mistake of Mayor Eric Adams—the Internet Master Plan developed by lots of experts, advocates, and celebrated globally, was unceremoniously abandoned by the Adams administration. But in its place, we got a short-term program with no vision, no permanence, and no accountability. We lost four years of potential progress and spent over \$100 million without delivering permanent solutions. Intro 1208 requires the City to report twice a year on the availability and functionality of AC in shelters, to notify council members of those outages and conduct a one-time assessment of the cost to make sure that every shelter can keep residents safe. This is about dignified housing. It's about communication. And I'm really proud to be passing this bill. And it's the first step towards ensuring that every New Yorker in a shelter is protected from extreme heat. Thank you.

opportunity. We all serve the same city, and good
rules should be built on a broad consensus, not speed
or convenience.

Most importantly, a number of the votes that will decide this matter today are from members who won't even be here in January. With all respect,

Unrelated, I'm introducing a bill today about outdoor dining. I like outdoor dining a lot, uh, I hope you all do, too. Unfortunately, we've seen the number of restaurants that participate in outdoor dining has declined quite precipitously in the last few years. We were at nearly 8,000 during the pandemic, and today, we're at well under 1,500. And so we're introducing legislation to bring this program back as a year-round initiative. We make it easier for businesses to participate. We expand the frontage that businesses can take advantage of. And a variety of other reforms to simplify, improve, and most of all increase participation in outdoor dining. I'm grateful to the folks who are co-prime sponsoring this legislation with me today, and hope that this is

something that we can push into law in the months to come. Thank you so much.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: Good afternoon, colleagues. Today, I'm proud to introduce two pieces of legislation that reflect our commitment to transparency, safety, and equality across New York City:

The first bill is 1423, requiring the Department of Transportation to provide a public inventory of all city-owned retaining walls under its jurisdiction. Retaining walls are a critical part of our city's infrastructure. When there is neglect or poor maintenance, the result can be dangerous for families and communities. By requiring the DOT to track and share this information publicly, we're ensuring that our residents have the right to know the conditions of the space they live near and that the maintenance isn't just reactive, but proactive.

The second piece of legislation, 1424,

I'm introducing alongside my colleagues in the Hood

Caucus, Council Member Riley, and Council Member

Williams. This bill will prohibit the denial of

criminal victim services to individuals based on the perceived notion of a gang affiliation. Far too often, victims of violence, particularly young Black and brown men, and their families are denied care, support, or counseling because of how they're labeled. But trauma doesn't discriminate, and neither should our services. We can't claim to value public safety while deciding who deserves healing from our City. I urge my colleagues to sign on to both pieces of legislation as we continue to reimagine public safety in our city and protect our communities, who

often are pushed into the margins. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER ZHUANG: Thank you. I'm proud to introduce Introduction 1425 Safer Parks for NYC. Every day, probably a lot of my colleagues also get complaints from constituents. Actually, in my district, I see weapons in my district parks, mopeds running around in the parks, and even dirt bikes almost hitting seniors and children. I speak to the local precinct almost every single day. And fortunately, I'm able to get some patrolling in my parks. But what shocked me the most was that this

summer, only four Park Enforcement Patrol Officers covered all of Brooklyn. PEP Officers are peace officers. They don't carry weapons, but they are there to prevent crime. Did you know they also oversee the free programs in our parks? As far as we know, we don't have enough PEP and Park Rangers to cover all of our parks—probably not even enough for half our parks. This bill will require the Parks Department to give us quarterly updates on how many PEP Officers and Rangers are on the staff, where they are assigned to, and why. This kind of information is the information our City Council needs to make better choices for our communities. Thank you to Council Member Shekar Krishnan for cosponsoring this bill. And I also want to thank local DC 37 workers who are here today, and also the Vice President of Local 983, Ralph Baselice, and the President of Local 983, Joe Puleo, Senior Legislative Counsel Kristoffer Sartori, Policy Director of my team, Katelynn Ulrich, and all the constituents who rallied to support this bill. And I urge my colleagues to sign onto this bill. Thank you.
