CHAIRPERSON HUDSON: Thank you so much.

Good morning, and welcome to today's Aging Committee

Vote. I am Crystal Hudson, Committee Chair, and my

pronouns are she/her.

Today we will be voting on an important bill and stop on The City Council's Mental Health Road Map, an initiative led by Speaker Adrienne Adams and Council Member Linda Lee to address the growing mental health challenges facing New Yorkers in the wake of the pandemic.

As a part of that effort, last month we convened a joint hearing with the Committee on Mental Health, Disabilities, and Addiction to examine both mental health and older New Yorkers, and my legislation, Introduction 1257.

The bill received broad support, along with helpful feedback to make it more operationally

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effective.

Proposed Introduction Number 1257-A, a

Local Law in relation to a study and report on the

provision of agency services to older adults with

certain neurological and mental health conditions,

would require the Department of Health and Mental

Hygiene to identify the 10 most common neurological

conditions and the 10 most common mental health

conditions among older adults and share that

information with the New York City Department for the

Aging.

The DFTA Commissioner, together with relevant City agencies and community groups, would then study and issue a one-time report on how agencies are currently serving this population and what improvements are needed. The report must also outline specific actions each agency will take in response to the findings.

Neurological conditions, like Parkinson's or stroke, and mental health conditions, such as depression, anxiety, and dementia, are often

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2 underrecognized in older populations, leading to 3 missed opportunities for care and support.

This legislation helps ensure a coordinated, multi-agency response rather than fragmented services delivery. It also emphasizes the importance of training, staffing, and outreach to ensure services are equitable and responsive to real-world needs.

As New York City's Aging population continues to grow, so too will the prevalence of these conditions. This bill is a critical stop on the Mental Health Road Map. It not only addresses current service gaps, but also supports the Council's broader aging in place agenda, reinforcing a more holistic, dignified vision for elder care in our city. This bill holds personal significance for me. After nearly a decade of serving as my mother's primary caregiver while she lived with Alzheimer's disease, I began advocating for older adults, which ultimately led me to the City Council. I am proud of the work this Committee and the Council have accomplished together with advocates and providers championing the needs of older New Yorkers and tackling the city's mental health crisis with evidence-based solutions.
