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Before we begin, I am going to acknowledge someone who is very special who is here with us today -- someone who was elected in 1999, and served through 2005 as the Manhattan Borough President.

Colleagues, let's give a warm welcome to C. Virginia Fields.

[APPLAUSE]

SPEAKER ADAMS: Before we begin, I would like to address yesterday's Supreme Court decision to strike down affirmative action in our institutions of higher education. For decades, affirmative action has empowered educational institutions to address a long legacy of systemic inequities that have prevented Black people, and people of color more broadly, from accessing equitable opportunities. This decision is a loss for civil rights and the longstanding struggle for justice and equality, but certainly is another example of an intentional and long term campaign to rollback civil rights realizing success at the Supreme Court. It will undermine racial diversity and inclusivity in the classrooms of our institutions of higher education which benefit all students.

Despite the implications made by conservative members

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of the court, racial inequities persist and permeate
our society in deeply rooted ways. It is critical
for us as a city and country to advance policies that
ensure that everyone, especially those from
traditionally marginalized and underserved

7 communities, have equitable access to opportunity.

And today, on the last day of Pride Month, this Supreme Court issued a ruling that undermines equal protections for LGBTQIA+ individuals. It is a terrifying setback in progress and protections for the LGBTQIA+ community who continue to experience existential and physical attacks on their identity, safety, and well-being. This decision effectively grants businesses the right to discriminate. It is an alarming trend and a continuation of the rollback of our collective rights, put in motion by far-right extremists on the Supreme Court. We firmly denounce the Supreme Court's decision today, and we will continue the work of a Council to safeguard and expand rights for all LGBTQIA+ New Yorkers.

Today, we are voting on several items related to the adoption of the City Budget for Fiscal Year 2024.

And I want to start by thanking our Finance Chair, Council Member Justin Brannan.

I also want to thank all of the members of the Budget Negotiating Team for your dedication in this process as well.

I also want to extend our deepest gratitude to the entire Finance Division, led by my Deputy Chief of Staff and Chief Financial Officer, Tanisha Edwards.

SPEAKER ADAMS: And the Director of the Finance Division, Richard Lee.

SPEAKER ADAMS: None of the progress we have made on this budget would have been possible without you and your long days and nights of work. And, I thank you for the bottom of my heart.

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We are also thankful for the work of our Legislative Documents Unit led by Jonathan Ettricks.

[APPLAUSE]

SPEAKER ADAMS: And we, of course, always thank our legislative staff led by Jeff Baker and Andrea Vazquez.

[APPLAUSE]

SPEAKER ADAMS: And, now, I want to take a moment to recognize, one again, someone who has been critical to the Council's operations for over two For 23 years Ray Majewski, the Council's Chief Economist, has exemplified the best in public service. His precise economic forecasts have allowed the Council to maintain financial stability during periods of economic uncertainty. Ray has played a tremendous role in formulating and shaping the last 23 budgets in the city of New York. Ray's work has improved the lives of millions of his fellow New Yorkers, and has made it possible for so many to build their lives in our city. His legacy will live on for generations and generations to come as someone who has brought heart, wisdom, and insight every day to his profession to strengthen our communities. Majewski, Ray, we thank you immensely for you service

to our city, and you wish you much success and happiness in your most deserved retirement, my friend.

[APPLAUSE]

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SPEAKER ADAMS: Today we are voting on several items related to the adoption of the City Budget for Fiscal Year 2024. The Council's focus in this budget has to been to protect the essential services that the people of this city rely on. As the first women majority and "the men who get it" council in our city's history, we have a responsibility to shift the deeply engrained dynamics of our city that have historically left women and communities of color behind. The inequalities that undermine our communities and city must be addressed, and resolving them was the focus of our budget vision and priorities.

Since the start of this process, the Council held a distinct vison for the budget even as we understood approaching challenges. There are budget gaps in our outyears that we must confront. Yet, as I said yesterday, how we approach these challenges matters to New Yorkers. As a result of the proposed budgets presented to us that contain cuts in just about every

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area, that only grew deeper throughout this process, the Council was left with a responsibility and tasked with fighting for restorations to the harmful cuts across the entire budget.

Through what I would characterize as incredibly difficult negotiations, we worked to bridge the distance between us and the Administration fighting to restore investments and essential services that our families, communities, and city need. The budget before us is the result of these labored efforts.

This council took seriously our task to negotiate the best and most achievable outcomes that deliver results for New Yorkers. It was our responsibility to shape a negotiation, a negotiated budget, as responsible stewards of our city. There are real potential economic and financial implications of a delayed budget that risks harming the very people we seek to protect with our investments. We understand that if we don't achieve a negotiated budget by the legal deadline, it could negatively impact our bond rating and capital budget.

Advancing a non-negotiated budget could also put everything that we have gained in this fight at risk. It could jeopardize the funding restorations we

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fought so hard to attain, as well as the important funding for critical programs that this council's foresight helps to deliver.

We sought to avoid these outcomes by driving hard negotiations that would meet the budget deadline while preserving as many of the investments that New Yorkers count on. These negotiations were uniquely challenging because of how much they focused on restoring cuts out their outset.

We left it all on the fields for New Yorkers, because we know the immense need through the City and the lives at stake. We approach these negotiations aiming to claw back every proposed cut that this council prioritized restoring. Everything we secured was a hard fought victory and must not be overlooked.

Because of our efforts, there are many priorities that we successfully advanced in this budget. This council negotiated to restore \$36.2 million in funding that our public libraries would have totally lost, effecting weekend and other services that serve New Yorkers of all ages. We avoided this outcome thanks to you and all New Yorkers raising their voices to protect this precious public resources.

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2 And as a city that depends on the valuable labor 3 of nonprofit workers, it is imperative that we fairly 4 compensate the human services workforce, the majority 5 of whom are underpaid women of color, with a multiyear pay increase. Securing pay increases for 6 7 these workers is a matter of gender, racial, and 8 economic justice. We are proud to have secured a new baselined \$40 million, on top of \$60 million from last year, for a total of \$100 million in this year's 10 11 budget for these workers. We also secured an additional \$50 million starting next fiscal year for 12 a total of \$150 million in baselined funds for each 13 14 year moving forward. We know this is still far from 15 what is needed to truly provide these workers with 16 the wages they deserve. And we remain committed to 17 fighting to achieve true parity.

equitable economic opportunity for New Yorkers, and they were a major funding priority for us as well.

The \$32.4 million restored to this budget for our public institutions of higher education will help avoid the bulk of programmatic cuts they faced.

We also secured \$46 million to support legal service providers and their staff in helping low-

income New Yorkers avoid evictions and other destabilizing outcomes. With rising economic instability and evictions, the City's Right to Counsel program and other legal services, championed by the Council, must be sustained. The frontline workers delivering these services need more dedicated resources and the permanent baselined \$30 million is an important start towards increasing support for them. As a council, remain committed to pursuing solutions that match the scale of this crisis.

Early childhood education is key to long term cognitive development and gives working parents the opportunity to advance in their careers. Yet, the prohibitive costs of childcare put this out of reach for so many New Yorkers. The Council worked hard to secure \$16 million to support Promise NYC, providing more childcare assistance to undocumented and low income-families. The baselined \$15 million for our shared vision with early childhood education providers to repair 3-K by converting extended year seats will help our city begin to effectively meet extraordinary demands across the City. And because a holistic education requires support inside and

This council's contributions are responsible for individual school budgets receiving additional funding from added weights to the Fair Student Funding Formula and continued federal funding to protect against enrollment losses.

We made significant progress on many priorities for New Yorkers, but we also acknowledge that there are unfulfilled goals that still remain *missing* from this budget. These remain priorities for this council, and we will fight to ensure they are recognized by our city.

Let me be perfectly clear, the investments secured in this budget do not, do not, represent the completion of our work. Critical programs in our communities require far more recourses, and we refuse

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to turn our backs on the investments that were not able to be secured in this budget. There is more that must be done on every front, and we are fully committed to the important work ahead. We will continue to fight for these investments, because we cannot afford to withhold what is proven to help New Yorkers advance in health, safety, and opportunity.

Looking ahead, we are more than clear about challenges that we must confront. The City faces the loss of over \$10 billion in one-time COVID relief funding. We also have significantly increased costs from cost shifts of approximately \$500 million from the state and other economic and fiscal realities facing our city, state, and country that could significantly affect the New Yorkers we represent. The Council will continue to advocate for our city to take a different approach to proactively address these challenges. Our vision remains one where we work together across all levels of government to address the urgent needs of New Yorkers.

While the Council's focus there was to restore cuts to essential services, our City must shift away from this harmful budgeting approach. We must move forward through the lens of expanding what New

2 | Yorkers need, not on what they can do without.

said, [* paraphrased] if a knife is in your back 9 inches and pull it out 6 inches, you're still fatally wounded.

so, we need to understand that those restorations, even the \$36 million to the libraries, is on top of the cuts from last year. So, libraries are struggling. And we can appreciate the restorations, but we have the power. We have the power to check this mayor. We have the power to tell him, "No, this budget is unacceptable." So, he will be lauded for having these restorations, there were \$3 billion worth of cuts, and there are only, \$2 to \$3 million worth of restorations.

So, on that I will vote no on M 141 and accompanying Resolutions; I vote no on M 142 and the accompanying Resolution; no on M 143 and the accompanying Resolution, and one of those no votes are against the Capital Budget, which they are not even talking to you about -- \$169 billion for ten years, and only \$2.5 billion for NYCHA. NYCHA needs \$40 billion to be right.

And I also want to disclose that BRICK [phonetic] is funded by the budget, and my son is an employee of that entity.

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But, this budget is wrong. The bible says [* paraphrased] Where ones treasure is, so is their heart. This is a heartless mayor.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHER: No one is thrilled about this budget. At the beginning of this process, we were faced with draconian cuts across the board. And this council has fought like hell to push back on those cuts. And I am proud of Speaker Adams, the Budget Negotiation Team, the Leader Team, and everyone in this council who has been fighting the past weeks and months. And we were able to beat back significant cuts to this budget -- \$107 billion budget, the biggest budget in the history of the City. The budget was \$77 billion in 2014; \$92 billion in 2020. But, it still contains painful cuts that none of us are celebrating. We restored funding to the libraries, meals to seniors, Sanitation, and we made historic investments in right to counsel, expanding fair fares; there's a cost of living adjustment; new money for early childhood education

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so that working families can more easily enroll their children in 3-K. And next year's budget is predicted to be tough. There are significant budget gaps predicted for next year. If the tax receipts break our way, it might not be so bad. If they break the other way, it could be very bad. But, I know that this council will continue fighting to prioritize the people in New York who are most vulnerable, who are hurting the most right now. And that is what we have done in this budget.

Uhm, NYCHA obviously needs a lot more money, but their vacancies need to be fixed. In one development, in my district, as we sit here today, there are forty vacancies. All apartments need to be fixed.

I want to thank the libraries, CUNY obviously needs more funding, but it's a start.

Same thing meals for seniors. And Parks, we still want to fight for 1%, but getting the small amount for the staff is always important.

So, I vote aye. And look forward for the months ahead to continuing to fight for the people who need the support the most.

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COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: From the moment the Preliminary Budget was released, we knew this would be a difficult cycle. We knew the City faced emergent fiscal challenges from the asylum seeker crisis to the reduction in available federal funding post pandemic. But, this council has always been clear about our approach to this budget. fiscally responsible when we invest in New Yorkers and essential programs and services we rely on every day. We create a virtuous cycle of equitable economic growth that supports and uplifts everyone, especially the most vulnerable in our city. That is why this council fought to restore the Mayor's cuts to critical services -- to our libraries, our schools, our seniors, and so much more -- to CUNY, and to NYCHA. We worked to expand funding for 3-K, and to secure a pay raise for nonprofit employees who work tirelessly and selflessly to fill gaps in services in each of our communities. And we negotiated an annual addition of \$20 million to the

Fair Fares program, a meaningful increase in the level of funding to help hundreds of thousands more low-income New Yorkers get where they need to go.

This budget is an imperfect result of negotiation. And we understand there is still much more work to be done. Fair Fares is an example. We will continue to fight to expand eligibility thresholds to include more residents in need who benefit from this program. But, the budget reflects the efforts of this council to deliver for the people of New York.

I want to extend my thanks to Speaker Adrienne Adams, for her steadfast leadership throughout this budget cycle; our Finance Chair, Council Member Brannan, for his tireless advocacy on and off the dais; I want to thank the Speaker's Chief of Staff, Jeremy John; First Deputy Chief of Staff, Faiza Ali; and the entire Finance team, as well as Tanisha Edwards; and, of course, Queens' own Richard Lee; as well as all of the folks in the background that we never hear about [TIMER CHIMES], but who are doing the work.

I just want to make my disclosure as well. And, so, I am disclosing on the record of the Council

you to Speaker Adams and her team, Finance Chair

Brannan and his team, all of Council Finance, the

Progressive Caucus, Women's Caucus, LGBTQIA+ Caucus,

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and the Black, Latino, and Asian Caucus. Thank you as well as to Comptroller Lander, Public Advocate
Williams, and the many, many, organizations who have boldly fought for a budget based on care, not cuts.

Standing here today, I cannot help but recall the confusion, the litigation, and the backlash that followed last year's budget vote. In the midst of that whirlwind, I joined several colleagues in outlining a way to avoid the same result this year: Release of the budget documents for consideration by members of the public, press, and council at least seventy-two hours before vote. And Mayor Adams has not met that minimum standard this year. So, I have not had nearly the time I'd need to adequately scrutinize the budget I am called to vote on.

To the best of my understanding, in it the mayor succeeded in defunding the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, in the midst of an urgent need citywide mental health crisis, by about \$150 million; defunding Small Business Services at a time when shops are shutting down left and right because of unaffordable rents by a stunning nearly thirty-five percent; defunding the Department of Transportation, after a year when traffic violence has claimed a

record number of District 22 lives by over \$30
million; defunding CUNY; housing and constructive
agencies, oversight agencies; labor protection

5 agencies, and the list goes on.

And all of this defunding to spite the fact that the already bloated Police Budget is skyrocketing this year by over a billion dollars.

This budget will inflict further hardships on working class New Yorkers who are already suffering from inflation and relentless bill hikes from Con Edison, and the Mayor's handpicked Rent Guidelines Board. [TIMER CHIMES]

I am going to wrap up...

But, not only that, but as he has shown over the fiscal year, the mayor is happy to kick dirt in the face of this entire process by ramming through unpopular, harmful budget modifications that undermine public safety and public health, for which he doesn't even require council approval. So, any restoration of funds we managed to win in these budget negotiations, he might easily reverse later in the year while continuing to abet the NYPD's scandalous abuse of overtime.

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today have made me feel proud to be a member of this body. Constituent

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Services staffers across our city can attest to this reality, when we are forced to scrape together resources to feed constituents who have had their public assistance shut off, or rescue tenants in ever-dilapidated NYCHA elevators. While there are wins in this budget, because of the efforts of this council this is only the first step. We cannot guarantee that this mayor will not attempt to impose further cuts down the line.

I want to remind our colleagues that our power is derived from the people we serve. And this council has its work cut out for us. We must continue to push back to ensure that working people across our city can feel the fights we have fought on their behalf. They deserve a budget that fully addresses their needs and safeguard their ability to thrive in our city -- I'm wrapping up -- a budget that centers all New Yorkers, our children and families, our newly arrived migrant neighbors, our city's workforce -including our human service workers, those inflicted by mental illness and substance abuse, those returning home from incarceration. This budget falls short of delivering for these vulnerable populations, and it did not have to come to this.

It includes many victories that we should all be proud of, including and especially victories of the issue and the topic of 3-K and Pre-K early childbirth programs. programs make a tremendous difference in the lives of our children, and I am talking about our youngest children, our youngest students, as young as three and four years old. These programs also make a big difference in the lives of our parents, including and especially, new parents. I am proud that we are expanding 3-K and Pre-K programs, creating nearly 2,000 new seats for full day and year-round 3-K and Pre-K programs. These programs are life changing, and we need to make sure that they are truly, but truly accessible for all, including and especially low income families. We need to make sure that child is left behind, and assure that every child, regardless of the zip code they live in, has access to these life changing programs. Expansion of 3-K and Pre-K will help archive that, it is an investment

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2 in our youngest students, an investment that we 3 should all be proud of.

So, I proudly vote aye on all, and thank you so much. And congratulations to everyone, including our speaker, and everyone fought so that we could achieve everything that we achieved, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: In negotiating this budget, Speaker Adams has had an impossible task.

Instead of starting from a place of opportunity, she was forced to push back against cut after cut proposed by this mayor. I want to thank her for standing strong and for fighting like hell for our centuries old institutions like our libraries, and restoring cuts made to CUNY programs. These are engines of opportunities that this mayor would have crippled if given the chance. I am deeply proud of the victories this council achieved. Meaningful steps to rethink our childcare infrastructure,

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including Promise NYC, capital funding for desperately needed affordable housing, and expanding Fair Fares. But, my community is drowning. We are drowning in displacement, in evictions, in food insecurity, and in childcare costs. And this budget leaves the City gasping for air. Thousands of nonprofit social service workers, predominantly women of color, flooded our streets asking humbly to be lifted up out of poverty wages. This budget denied them the salary increases they are entitled to, while somehow managing to provide six years of backpay for the NYPD -- and windfall that no other essential City employees will receive. This mayor's priorities are clear, from budget cuts to social service agencies, to giving less and expecting more. The mayor is placing the burden of the City' success on the backs of the people on the frontlines without providing them the resources they deserve. These people are my constituents and my neighbors, and I cannot sign my name onto a budget that allows them to fail.

The mayor's budget fails our schools, our parents, our tenants, our unhoused, our seniors, and it frames our economy of care as a question up for debate rather than a requirement for our success. As

the forces of gentrification intensity and the cost of living continue to rise, the working class and the working poor are increasingly being pushed out of the neighborhoods they've built. As a community organizer, I will use every tool at my disposal to fight back against the forces that would erase my communities. And that includes voting no on a budget that does not gar far enough to meet our needs.

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I look forward to working with my colleagues on real structural change that reimagines what it looks like to serve New Yorkers.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: I vote no, I do so with deep appreciation for Speaker Adams and the entire Budget Negotiation Team which secured significant restorations to the Mayor's proposed cuts for critical agencies and programs, including libraries and Promise NYC. I proudly stood with them and many of my colleagues as we fought back against austerity, and united to deliver what working New Yorkers deserve. However, the austerity that the mayor forced through is too destructive for me to endorse. From cradle to college the mayor has insisted on slashing our educational system. The promise of universal 3-K was scheduled to be fully realized this year, but this budget caused many families in my

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district to have their 3-K applications rejected.

Despite strong efforts to hold our public schools harmless, this budget is requiring schools to excess critical staff with deeper cuts still on the table for the fall.

This budget also applies significant cuts to CUNY, the economic driver that has allowed students, especially students of color like me, to become our city's next generation of leaders.

This austerity is also reflected in the mayor's shortsighted refusal to allocate any new legal services funding for the over 80,000 asylum seekers our city has welcomed. This refusal will limit the ability of our newest neighbors to get work authorization, leaving them dependent on a strained shelter system. The mayor loves to talk about how we are in a crisis, yet with the budget and veto of the CityFHEPS package, he has been unwilling to take the urgent steps needed to get us out of said crisis.

While this budget administers cuts across the board, the already bloated NYPD budget is increasing by a staggering \$1.85 billion, effectively boosting police spending by seventeen percent. We are giving

the police a blank check while starving the social services that keep our communities safe.

As co-chair of the Progressive Caucus, chair of the Immigration Committee, and council member for the 39th district, I cannot approve this budget. My community sent me here to fight for a New York that provides [TIMER CHIMES] a worldclass public education to young people, lives up to our values as a sanctuary city, and prioritizes care over cages. In order to best represent them, I must vote no on M 141, M 142, and the accompanying resolutions, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Today's budget adoption is a testament to the Council's will to serve as a counterweight to a mayor wholly unconcerned with the material well-being of New Yorkers. From the Preliminary Budget to the Executive Budget, Mayor Adams was firm in his position to starve the programs most important to vulnerable New Yorkers. administration made concerted efforts to slash hundreds of millions of dollars from the programs our communities rely on most, from libraries to meals for older adults. However, this council, under the leadership of Speaker Adams, held firm. Speaker Adams secured critical wins while negotiating with an unreliable and ideologically divergent administration. An accomplishment that would not

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have been possible without the tireless advocacy of so many partners, providers, and our own neighbors. This budget, while not wholly sufficient, fully restores funding for our city's library systems, maintains investments in our cultural institutions, expands funding for the MTA's Fair Fares program, baselines funding for the City's Right to Counsel program, secures millions to bolster the City's crisis management system, and entirely restores funding for CUNY among other wins.

And as chair of the Council's Committee on Aging,
I am heartened by the restoration of funding for
older adult services, clawing back many of the cuts
this administration made. With the most progressive
city council in city's history, and the invaluable
work of grassroots organizations, it is clear we are
making inroads in reforming broken systems that need
deeper investment.

The NYPD still has too much money. Period.

Thought we cannot control the agency's outrageous overtime spending, and have no role in negotiation with The Police Benevolent Association, we held the line on the elements we do control, like the Operating Budget, which has not increased.

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If it wasn't already apparent, this budget made clear that the Council does not have a willing forthright partner in this administration. Mayor Adams' concessions are neither generous nor willing. They are council and community wins, and they are affirm to continue building a city that leads with principals of care, compassion, and believe that New Yorkers deserve the services to which they are entitled, not an analysis of what they can do without.

I am disclosing on the record of the council proceedings that the Museum of the City of New York is funded in the [TIMER CHIMES] budget we are adopting, and my spouse is associated that entity.

budget negotiations due to restoring many of the cuts proposed in the mayor's Executive Budget. We were large successful in pushing back against some of the most [INAUDIBLE] components. Through the budgets, we were able to get \$4 billion in capital for affordable housing, our NYCHA repairs, CUNY, libraries, mental health continuum, community schools, Promise NYC, immigrants, family engagement, art education, shelter-based coordinators for foster youth, Work,

When it came to ensuring that we put our New York
City as our priority, early childhood was not left
behind. We were able to convert seats, school year
extended seats as well.

But, let me be clear, the mayor and his administration continue to slash budgets for vital services like housing and mental health while protecting and expanding the NYPD's bloated budget. Continuing down this path will strip care and services from most the vulnerable New Yorkers.

The budget is the single most important piece of legislation every year. It is negotiated between the mayor and the council. It sends paychecks to nurses, teachers, and lifeguards. It fills sinkholes and paves streets. It brings textbooks to schools, and picture books to libraries. And this year's budget was a win by our council against the mayor's bleak vision for our city.

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This year's budget addresses our city's challenges head on. For the first time ever, we will provide full year, fulltime, free early childhood care to thousands of working parents. We will spend \$4 billion to build new affordable housing. And for our New York City Parks Department, we won new parks workers and lifeguards, and we restored the positions for urban park rangers.

And as a former housing attorney, I am proud that we in the city council led the charge to finally fund a true right to counsel for New Yorkers who are facing eviction or unjust criminal prosecution. We will give a record \$41 million to our housing lawyers and public defenders to guarantee New Yorkers' right to an attorney. This is a historic investment. And, let me be clear, one that I know personally, how historic it is, because we have not seen such an investment in legal services in years past. These are wins.

We also fought and won against the mayor's cuts to so many institutions that working families of New York City depend on. There will be no cuts to our libraries. No cuts to school budgets. No cuts to 3-K, or CUNY programs.

This council will not let our city fail our families. We pulled this budget away...

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COUNCIL MEMBER KRISHNAN: May I conclude?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead... [CROSS-TALK]

We pulled this budget away from the mayor's austerity, and towards the abundant New York City that our council believes in. But, there is still much work to do in the years ahead. We need at least one percent of the budget for Parks. We need to pay our City and nonprofit workers what they are worth. We need to put people in homes and make sure they can stay there. And we cannot keep throwing good money after bad -- more money towards NYPD and corrections already bloated budgets has not made us more safe in our communities, it never will. We need to build a safe, fair, flourishing city for all. That is the work ahead.

And, so, having stood with the activists on the steps of City Hall, having fought alongside my Colleagues in the Council every single step of the way, to make critical investments and reverse dire cuts, I now proudly stand with my colleagues to vote yes on this budget.

And we often talk as a council about supporting and funding the folks who work in the gaps between city services. These nonprofit workers who I am talking about are our everyday heroes. When there are cuts to city agencies and programming, they are the ones stepping up to the plate and shouldering that weight.

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So, am very proud that as a council we fought hard to secure the \$40 million in baselined salary enhancements for the nonprofit workers, and an additional \$50 million for the next fiscal year. that is all is build upon the \$68 million that was baselined for salary enhancements we secured last year -- which is three consecutive years of incremental wins that this council has delivered for our nonprofit workers. This is a workforce that has been neglected and undervalued for many years. is a lot of lost time and ground to make up, and one or two budget cycles alone will not do the trick. But, these numbers are a testament to the long term commitment of this council and its leadership when it comes to supporting our nonprofit workers and continuing the fight for true COLAS in their contracts with the City.

I want to thank Speaker Adams and Chair Brannan for their leadership. I also want to thank those who I know in this council have been fighting extremely hard, including Council Member Brewer, as well as Council Member Stevens. And thank you for allowing me to contribute to these efforts and discussions these past few months.

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And with that, I proudly vote yes on this budget, which also comes with my commitment to continuing this fight to make sure that our nonprofit workers get the COLAS that they deserve.

Good afternoon, colleagues, I just want to begin by remembering a New York City Legend Carl Stubbs.

[SNAPPING]

COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Carl Stubbs was an activist and freedom fighter with VOCAL-NY. In May of this year, he finally secured an apartment for himself after constantly fighting for others. And unfortunately, Carl passed away today after a battle with pancreatic cancer. And I want to remember him as we vote for this budget. There are thousands of people like Carl who need help, and as I vote today, I am thinking about this budget may or may not have met his needs.

I want to thank Speaker Adams for leading the Council in what we all know is an incredibly difficult budget negotiation. I want to thank council Finance staff, thank you for folks who answered my calls. Thank you to all of my constituents for reaching out and sharing your concerns.

I am truly grateful that we got the restorations of critical programs. But, as the speaker said

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yesterday at the handshake, this is budget is a restorative budget. The mayor has created an environment that is combative and deeply concerning.

This budget is the result of the mayor cultivating a

agenda. New Yorkers should be alarmed that we were

14 evicted and displaced this year.

It is abundantly clear that these proposed cuts were a shallow, thinly veiled negotiating tactic as opposed to practices in good or collaborative governance. And I am really hopeful that it is clear that this is going to be a very long fight for the next couple of years.

It is alarming that the mayor [TIMER CHIMES] is cutting \$17 million to reentry programs that help individuals find housing, stay off drugs, and get jobs, while not adequately funding the mental health components we need like hospital-based mobile

treatment teams, more respite centers, or OPCs. We again see the over emphasis on traditional policing reflected in the NYPD receiving retroactive pay raises that go back six years, while sixty percent of our human service providers, who carry out lifesaving services, are forced to rely on public assistance. These human service providers are public safety workers, who carry out essential survival services, and we need to affirm their value in their paychecks.

I am saying no to how this mayor is governing and his approach to the City Budget.

We are not fighting against just this year's cuts, but a considerable gutting of public capacity and CBO capacity to not just do the bare minimum, but help New Yorkers thrive. New Yorkers need more.

And, with that, I vote nay on M 141, M 142, and the accompanying resolutions, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: I would like to disclose on the record that my son is an adjunct lecturer at CUNY of which we are voting on today under transparency.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you.

Council Member Ossé?

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COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: This is the most important decision made by the city government each year. At our hands is the world's largest municipal budget, funding vital services for nine million people. This is a \$100 billion that can be used to heal. \$100 billion that can set the globe's greatest city on a path toward recovery and prosperity or maintain a status quo. And this city council has been given an impossible task. Everyone in this room has been forced to spend a year performing the hardest part of this job -- to be a check and a balance to the mayor.

At every turn, the mayor has tried to bleed our city dry to serve his truth constituents: Corporate interest and the carceral state. When this body should have been devoting our energy to serving neighbors, we have been forced instead to defend them

against an executive who is on a campaign of fearmongering and division.

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This mayor has decided to rule instead of lead, slashing the sources of true public safety in my community, like education and social services, than insisting history's largest police budget is the only way to clean up his mess. He has negotiated in bad faith, stripping tens of millions of dollars from starving agencies, then expecting us to praise him for returning what he stole. But, Malcolm X said, "If you stick a knife in my back 9 inches and pull it out 6 inches, there's no progress". I will not thank this mayor for those six inches. I will continue to fight to pull that knife out of New York's back and heal its wounds.

I want to thank Speaker Adams for her clear-eyed leadership, waging a defensive fight for all New Yorkers. I want to thank the Budget Negotiation Team for playing the best they could with the hand they were dealt when the mayor had already rigged the deck and bought the table.

This council has outdone itself in shielding New York from the mayor's worse impulses, and you have made your constituents proud.

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I vote to say that a city full of cops but short on housing, a city that fills Rikers but gambles with preschools, is a city beneath the dignity of its people. Our rallying cry is not to restore the cuts, but to reimagine what New York can be [TIMER CHIMES] reinvest our resources to get there, and renew the relationship between government and citizens.

The budget passing today is strategic, letting us live to fight another day while securing some very real wins for our people. But, the greatest city in the world deserves the best. New Yorkers and the people of Bed-Stuy and Crown Heights deserve not just to survive but to thrive.

I vote no, and I most especially vote no on M 141, M 142, and all accompanying resolutions, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER PALADINO: I am proud that this budget keeps the NYPD whole, even as we have difficult budget due to the revenue difficulties and the migrant crisis. I disagree with some of my

colleagues in Council, we need our police, and they
need they be funded.

I vote aye on all except for M 169, Resolution 713, Resolution 703, and Resolution 704, thank you.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you.

Council Member Restler?

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COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: I would like to disclose on the record that the Mercantile Library

Association, also known as the Center for Fiction, and the Brooklyn Heights Association are funded in this budget, and my mom serves on the board of both organizations, so thanks to your service to those groups, Mom.

I want to begin by thanking my staff, especially my brilliant Policy Budget Legislation Director,

Molly Haley, Chief Mariana Alexander, and everyone who worked on this. The great team at Council

Finance, BMT, Chair Brannan, and especially the speaker for courageously and consistently fighting back and securing many crucial restorations in the face of the mayor's disastrous budget proposals.

We all know that our city is in crisis. And instead of the mayor forging forward with a bold vision for New York, he has insisted on a budget that

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harms our communities and fails to create the opportunities that New Yorkers need. Families are struggling to get by. We have a record 100,000 people in our shelter system and a humanitarian crisis at Rikers. Rather than propose a budget with strategic investments that meet the needs of our constituents, meets the challenges of this moment, the mayor has made disastrous cuts.

This council has been clear-eyed that the mayor's approach is wrong, and I am again grateful to our leadership for preventing the worst cuts from taking effect, especially for our libraries and CUNY.

And I am proud to have organized a number of priorities that have been incorporated into this budget with Chair Rivera and Kevin Riley pushing for increased funding for supervised release, will mean few people on Rikers Island. Along with Chair Avilés, pushing for restoration of the NYCHA Vacancy Readiness funding will mean more people are out of shelters and into permanent housing. And I am proud that many of the priorities that we pushed for in the Progressive Caucus have been partially incorporated into this budget. But partial restorations will not make enough of a difference. Half lopes are not

Some of the areas that are particularly unacceptable that I want to highlight today [TIMER CHIMES] are supportive housing, where we have cut HPD's funding by \$14.7 million; HRA where we cut staff by 2,000 people at The Department of Social Services, where we have huge waiting lists for supportive housing and vacant units. There is not one penny for justice involved supportive housing. Supportive housing is the solution to homelessness and yet we cut it. DHS's budget is cut. We cut a billion dollars from 3-K. Funding for our individual neighborhood schools will be lower than the year before.

We could have done better. And that is why I am voting no on M 141 and M 142 and the accompanying resolutions, and aye on all the rest, thank you.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member Richardson Jordon?

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDSON JORDAN: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

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COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDSON JORDAN: I wish to be
associated with the comments made by Council Member
Restler, Council Member Ossé, Council Member Nurse,
Council Member Marte, Council Member Hanif, Council
Member Gutiérrez, Council Member De La Rosa, Council
Member Cabán, and last, but mostly, Council Member
Barron.

I think what we are all saying today is that this city deserves more, that we have a social responsibility to do more. And if we are going to talk about hypocritical, it is hypocritical to be public servants, and not serve the public. That fact that "it could be worse" is going to be little consolation to those who are in most desperate need.

I most definitely vote no. No on M 141, 142, M $\,$ 143 and accompanying resolutions.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you.

Thank you, Madam Speaker, for your leadership and your work to pass this budget. The Fiscal Year 2024 Budget builds on work this council has done to preserve and expand education, youth employment opportunities, arts and culture, senior meals, address housing needs, including for NYCHA families, support important public spaces and institutions and more.

The mayor's Executive Budget proposed irresponsible cuts to many vital city services, and our negotiations reversed some, while making key investments to move our city forward.

The administration's refusal to fully acknowledge the significance of outside expertise, especially within places like our jail system, is a move to eliminate outside scrutiny. One budget will not

increase for supervised release, which will keep people off of Rikers and connect them with the mental health and social services they need to avoid recidivism, as well as resources for alternatives to incarceration, and to support restoration of cuts to the Board of Correction, who provide a critical role in overseeing jail operations.

It is up to us to continue fighting back against proposed cuts by the mayor, and continuing work alongside colleagues, advocates, neighbors, and our talented staff, here at the Council, to build a more fair, compassionate and healthy city.

With that, I vote aye, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER SALAMANCA: Permission to explain

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: The way we get to safety, to recovery, to progress, is by investing in our people, investing in the development of who we are as a people -- our education, the care of our children, stability in our homes, our enrichment. And the budget that we are passing today falls short, not because this council, our speaker, and our leadership didn't make clear our priorities, but because we have a mayor intent on austerity, harboring false notions of how we get to safety, and who invited a harsh

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process. Nevertheless, our speaker and this council clawed significant wins on behalf of New Yorkers in all of our communities. This budget finally makes available \$4 billion in capital for the construction of supportive and affordable housing this year. will continue our oversight to achieve the headcount we need to actually spend these funds, but finally they are there. We will also continue to fight to ensure this \$4 billion becomes and stays an annual commitment. This budget also helps to keep the most vulnerable New Yorkers within their homes with an expanded funding for Right to Counsel. It achieves some cost of living adjustment gains for human service workers, expands Fair Fares, restores funding in our libraries, and CUNY, takes steps to correct design flaws of the original universal 3-K, and it funds Promise NYC.

I just want to make very clear, in the context of this budget, that there should be no mistake made, this council will shortly also be passing our CityFHEPS legislative package, which will expand housing stability for New Yorkers in their homes via expanded vouchers. All of this happening together, and I just want to and shoutout the leadership of the

COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member Schulman?

UNKNOWN: Did she vote?

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: This was not an easy budget. First, federal stimulus funds that have padded the New York City Budget for the past two cycles is mostly gone now.

Second, we had over \$1 billion in unexpected costs to take care of the migrants coming to our city, with little help from New York State or the federal government.

But, even with these and other challenges, we are passing a budget with significant investments for education, health care, libraries, housing, older adults -- where I want to make a special mention about Meals On Wheels, which is a lifeline for many of the seniors in my district and the quality life in our neighborhoods.

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I want to give a shoutout to Speaker Adams, you know, Kermit the Frog said it is not easy being green, it is not easy being speaker.

Speaker Adams took it upon herself , you know, we are all thanking her, but I want to thank her specifically, she took it upon herself to go up to Washington, with members of the Council, to get more money for us for the migrants that we have coming in. And she succeeded in getting over \$130 million, which affects this budget. So, I wanted to point that out, because without that, we wouldn't have some of the wins that we have today.

With that, there is still a lot work... There is clearly a lot of work to be done. I look forward to working with Speaker Adams and my colleagues to continue the fight to make New York City more equitable and just, because it is very important for us to work on the investments that didn't make it into this budget.

With that, I am disclosing on the record of the council proceedings that Office of the Mayor of the city of New York is funded in the budget we are adopting, and my brother in an employee of that entity.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: I would like to start off by thanking Speaker Adrienne Adams, her team; the entire Finance Division; the Finance Chair, Justin Brannan; and thank you for the leadership and commitment for fighting for all New Yorkers.

I would like to acknowledge the complexity of the decisions we were faced with throughout this year's budget process. And that is essential, because going through this budget, we all knew that we were going to have to make hard decisions. One of the things

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we all advocate for.

that I am most disappointed by is that we were unable to deliver a real COLA for the human service sector. The human service workers are essential, and yet they are the second lowest paid industry in New York, with a workforce that is overwhelmingly women and people of color. The #JUSTPAY Campaign highlighted the need to invest in their workforce, and this budget does not deliver for them. What is worse than not giving them a real COLA, is that it is not on par with the other workforce and industries throughout New York City. It sets them back, and will make it even harder for them to hire and retain staff and their programs — that we all need in our communities, and

Although this council fought as hard as we could, we were unable to deliver, so I apologize to the nonprofit sector for that. However, we will continue our fight, and we will get equity for the human services sector.

Despite my extreme disappointment in some of the outcomes of this budget, we did get some wins that I am proud of like the investment and Work, Learn & Grow, restoring food services for seniors, and expanded 3-K for our youngest New Yorkers.

Thus, in spite of my disappointment, I am committed to continuing to fight for District 16 and the residents of all of New York. And with that, I vote aye.

And I also have some disclosures: I disclose on the record that the city of New York is funded in this budget we are adopting, and my daughter is a student in that entity, and Columbia Presbyterian is funded in the budget we are adopting, and my daughter is an employer of that entity, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER WON: I just want to thank Speaker
Adams as well as the entire Finance team, the
[INAUDIBLE] colleagues, and my council colleagues at
large, because since the Executive Budget was
released, we have stood united, and we have fought
hard, and I want to give special thanks to even my

colleagues holding the line. Because we are in agreement that this is a restorative budget, and this is not where we wanted to be. But, we fought hard, and we were able to fully restore funding for adult literacy and \$13.2 million, as well as \$4 billion in housing for affordable housing and NYCHA, for libraries, arts and culture, and so much more, because we continued to fight.

But, the fight is not over. As we have spent the last year, we know that we will continue to fight this upcoming year, because the budget is not a static document, but it is fluid, and it is a yearlong process where we will have to continue to do the work legislatively as well as budgetarily to make sure that we are restoring even more funding. And because of these commitments that I have to my district, I am going to be voting aye to make sure that am continuing to deliver, especially for my NYCHAs, as well as my nonprofits to offset costs, especially if I know that there is going to be harm done, to ensure that every single dollar for my district is committed to.

The mayoral administration continues to prioritize policing and other carceral systems over

COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: So, I would like to start by commending the speaker for her fight and her incredible grace under unedging pressure and an impossible task; my colleagues and Council staff who worked tirelessly on this budget, I am thankful to all of you for fighting on behalf of New Yorkers.

And I understand that this is not an easy body of work.

This vote is not a reflection of that hard work.

I vote no on this mayor's austerity budget that guts services and calls it a win. I vote no on an expense budget and a capital budget, in particular, that I did not have an opportunity to review since I received it walking into this chamber today.

While the Council has proudly won restorations for important programs like libraries and CUNY, these programs should have never been on the chopping block to begin with. At a time when New Yorkers are facing inflation, out of control costs, and the worst

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affordability crisis in decades, this mayor has recklessly cut programs and services. This budget maintains deep staffing cuts to those agencies we need the most, while not making any significant investments in low income housing, mental health, social services, or education. As the Chair of Public Housing, I cannot ignore the \$338 million in rental arrears that are on the table, without relief it means 77,000 families may face eviction in the midst of a housing and shelter crisis. We are going

to need that \$46 million that pays for lawyers.

Instead of lifting us up, this mayor chooses to use fear tactics and scarcity arguments to move forward his priorities like privatizing the health care of our city's retirees or blaming asylum seekers. Ask yourself, what is missing from this budget and why. We will soon find out. Apparently, the mayor cannot find money to provide school aids with a living wage, pay parity for EMS workers, or more school social workers or guidance counselors or capital funding for new classrooms [TIMER CHIMES], which is desperately being cut. But he finds money for the nearly \$1 billion in police overtime, misconduct settlements, and an even or bloated NYPD

Island Youth Soccer League, uh, both of my children,

John and Joe, are players; and we are funding the

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Great Kills Little League, which my son Joe wasn't very good at, didn't want to play, but John is excelling, and hopefully... hopefully he sticks with it.

We have talked a lot about what this budget cuts, uh, and what the mayor failed to deliver on. And yet many of us, almost all of us, have not mentioned the \$1.4 billion that is now going towards covering the migrant crisis. And with respect to what the mayor said yesterday, uh, when he was asked, "What is the offramp to this problem?", it is clear that there is no answer. And we are facing budget gaps, uh, not just next year, but in the years ahead. And that is going to only get worse if this crisis doesn't end. So, I would urge all of my colleagues whether it be, uh, the council members here, the speaker, but also the mayor, and the comptroller, and the governor, it is time to drop the check on the White House. Joe Biden finishes his ice cream and the bill comes, we have to be the ones to drop the check on there. Because this is \$1.4 billon that could have been used on the services that we are talking about that many of whom, uhm, many of which were not able to be funded. To give a comparable, \$1.4 billion is almost

three times the general operating fund of the city of Buffalo. The second largest city in our state. We can run it almost three times on what we are spending on this federal problem. The federal government is not asking us to run other federal agencies, so why

should we be responsible for running the immigration and customs enforcement agencies.

So, I will be voting aye on all, with the exception of M 169 and accompanying resolution 713, 703, and 704. And I do want to thank, uh, all of the staff who worked many, many late hours and put a tremendous amount of work in completing everything from the tedium of doing the budget, to doing the negotiation with the mayor. So, congratulations and thank you all.

This is a man, I know that not all of you know him, I was at the service, I was at the shiva, this is a man who really changed New York. He was incredibly willing to give ideas and share ideas, and he reached out to everyone. So, we have lost a great, and I just want to make sure you don't forget it, thank you very much.
