CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: [GAVEL] Good
morning. I am Council Member Lynn Schulman, Chair of
the New York City Council's Committee on Health.

Thank all of you for joining us at today's Committee
vote where we will be voting on the following
introductions: Intros 628-A and 629-A, both sponsored
by the Public Advocate; Intro. 998-A, sponsored by
Council Member Powers; Intros 1041-A and 1042-A, both
sponsored by Council Member Sanchez; and Intro. 1056A, sponsored by Council Member Hudson; and the
following resolution, Proposed Resolution 563-B,
sponsored by Council Member Sanchez.

Before we begin, I would like to recognize the following Council Members that are present. Feliz, Menin, Ariola, Narcisse, De La Rosa,

2 Marmorato, Sanchez, and Marte, and Council Member 3 Gennaro, virtually.

The legislation the Committee on Health is voting on today covers a number of very important topics, and I am proud that this Committee is tackling these issues head on. First, we will be voting on legislation relating to healthcare for LGBTQIA plus and TGNCNBI folks in our city. Introduction 628-A and 629-A, both sponsored by the Public Advocate, will require signage at City hospitals to inform patients on both the rights of and services available to transgender patients and for DOHMH to report on the training providers receive regarding medical care for transgender and gender non-conforming people.

Introduction 1056-A, sponsored by Council Member Hudson, will require DOHMH in collaboration with DOE and community-based organizations to conduct annual LGBTQIA plus competency trainings for public school medical personnel. This Committee and the Council is committed to defending our vibrant LGBTQIA plus community. We will ensure that the City remains a beacon for those who need gender-affirming care and we will not allow the attacks on transgender

communities nationwide to scare us away from our
values.

We will also vote on Introduction 988-A, sponsored by Council Member Powers. This would codify the City's Cooling Center Program and require the Commissioner of the New York City Office of Emergency Management to designate the locations of cooling centers when there is a heat-related emergency. The bill also includes regulations relating to the number of cooling centers and the locations of cooling centers. As climate change continues to accelerate and worsen, it is imperative that we create spaces for those who are at increased risk of health complications due to extreme heat. No New Yorker's health should be put unduly in danger when the City has the capability to act.

Finally, we will vote on a package of legislation relating to childcare. This includes Introductions 1041-A and 1042-A and proposed Resolution 563-B by Council Member Sanchez. Following the tragic death of Nicholas Feliz-Dominici at a childcare facility in the Bronx, it became clear that the city's growing opioid crisis has continued to worsen and that regulations surrounding child daycare

facilities.

I want to conclude by thanking all the bill sponsors for their hard work and leadership. I also want to thank my Staff as well as the Committee Staff for their preparation for this vote.

Council Member Sanchez, do you want to make a brief statement?

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Yeah. Thank you, Chair.

Nearly two years have passed since the heartbreaking loss of one-year-old Nicholas Feliz-Dominici, a radiant, joyful child whose life was stolen by fentanyl exposure in a licensed daycare. Nicholas should be here today. His parents, Zoila and Otoniel, did everything right. They placed their trust in a system meant to protect their son, but depraved criminals exploited its weakness and their

family's world was shattered. The depth of their pain
is unimaginable. And today, we honor Nicholas' memory
through action. Intros 1041 and 1042, shaped by his
family's courage, will help keep other children safe.
1041 will inform parents of their rights in daycare
facilities, and 1042 will require public reporting on
inspector training, strengthening oversight and
transparency. Because there is more to do, we're also
passing Resolutions 563 of 2024, which calls on the
State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign
A3899 and S6225 by Assemblymembers George Alvarez and
Senator Gustavo Rivera, my counterparts at the State
level, to further strengthen inspections, improve
training, and enhance transparency. Thank you, Chair
Schulman. Thanks to Speaker Adams. And also, of
course, the prosecutors, whose work has already
secured over 100 years of prison time for those
responsible. Nicholas' light will never fade. In his
memory and in solidarity with his family, we will
keep working until every child is safe and no parent
has to bear this kind of pain. Thank you.
