Welcome 7 to the New York City Council Committee on Civil 8 Service and Labor. 9 Please place your phone on vibrate or silent mode. 10 11 Do not approach the dais. 12 Chair, we are ready to begin. 13 CHAIRPERSON DE LA ROSA: [GAVEL] Good 14 morning and welcome to today's vote of the Civil 15 Service and Labor Committee. I am Council Member 16 Carmen De La Rosa, Chair of the Committee. Proposed 17 Resolution 368-A, sponsored by Council Member Hanif, 18 calls on the United States Congress to reintroduce 19 and pass and the President to sign the Living Wage 20 for Musicians Act. This legislation, which was 21 sponsored by Congress Member Tlaib and Congress 22 Member Bowman last session, aims to create a new 23 streaming royalty that would pay artists a penny per 24 stream, a modest but meaningful step towards 25 addressing the severe underpayment of musicians in

2	the streaming era. Music is not just entertainment.
3	It is labor, it's culture, and it's community. Here
4	in New York City, we are home to over 14,000 working
5	musicians who are integral to the city's identity and
6	economy. And yet, despite generating billions in
7	revenue for streaming platforms, most musicians see
8	just a fraction of that income, often earning less
9	than a livable wage for their work. It takes over
10	800,000 monthly streams to earn the equivalent of a
11	15-dollar-an-hour job. This is not just inequitable,
12	but exploitative of the hard work and creativity put
13	forth by artists across the world. The Living Wage
14	for Musicians Act would begin to correct this
15	imbalance by establishing a new royalty structure
16	that supports working artists and ensures that our
17	creative economy is not built on the backs of
18	underpaid labor. It would also cap monthly per track
19	payouts to prevent only the most streamed artists
20	from capturing the bulk of the benefit, creating a
21	space for a more diverse and sustainable music
22	ecosystem. By passing this Resolution, we send a
23	clear message that New York City stands with artists.
24	I urge my Colleagues to vote yes and join me in
25	calling for fair pay for musicians.
