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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Check, mic check on today's Committee on Finance. Today's date is June 30, 2024, in the Chambers. It is recorded by Walter Lewis.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Thank you. Good morning, and welcome to the New York City hybrid vote on the Committee on Finance.

Please silent all electronic devices.

Chair, we're ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON BRANNAN: Thank you, Sergeant.

[GAVEL] Okay, good morning. Happy Sunday, happy
Pride. Welcome to today's Finance Committee meeting
where we'll be adopting the FY25 budget. I'm Council
Member Justin Brannan. I Chair the Committee on
Finance. I want to acknowledge my fellow Committee
Members present this morning. I am joined by Council
Members Amanda Farías, Won, Brooks-Powers, Hanks,
Brewer, Ayala, Louis, Stevens, Williams, Ossé, Carr,
Hudson, Sanchez, and Moya on Zoom, and Powers in the
cheap seats.

Okay, today the Finance Committee will take the necessary actions for the City Council to adopt a 112.4-billion-dollar budget for FY25. To begin, I want to thank Speaker Adams for her fearless

leadership throughout this entire budget process 2 3 which basically began the day after we passed the 4 FY24 budget. The Speaker's commitment to a budget that meets the needs of working people of the City and insisting we have the resources necessary to 6 invest in our neighbors set the tone for all of us 8 through negotiations. I want to thank the Speaker as well for maintaining standards of transparency and inclusivity for all Members throughout this budget. 10 11 We may take it for granted now but that was certainly 12 not always the norm around here. I want to thank the tireless work of the Council's Finance Division. 13 14 Month after month of long hours preparing for 15 hearings, fielding questions from Members and delivering regular briefings, presentations and 16 17 reports went into crafting this budget, and we deeply 18 appreciate the dedication of all the Financial 19 Analysts and Economists who got us to this vote 20 today. A very special thank you to the Finance 21 Division's Leadership Team, Finance Director, Richard 2.2 Lee, Managing Director Jonathan Rosenberg, Deputy 2.3 Directors Emre Edev, Chima Obichere, Paul Simone, Aisha Wright, Chief Economist and Assistant Director 24 Dilara Dimnaku, Assistant Director Elizabeth Hoffman, 25

2 Supervising Economists Paul Sturm, Andrew Wilbur, and 3 William Kyeremateng, and Unit Heads Aliya Ali, Julia Haramis, Jimmy Reyes, Jack Storey, and Florentine 4 Kabore. A big thank you to the Finance Division's Chief Financial Officer and Deputy Chief of Staff 6 7 Tanisha Edwards for her leadership. The budget 8 successes we have achieved today is possible from the dedicated efforts of you and the Staff. Want to make special notice of the Finance Administrative Staff as 10 11 well in the Legislative Documents Unit. They pull 12 everything together through countless emails, 13 updates, corrections and last minute asks up until 14 the minute I walked in the door today. Every vote, 15 every time they're here. I want to thank Vanessa 16 Diaz-Lopez, Maria Pagan, Nicole Anderson, Jonathan Ettricks, Ruthie Delfranco, Jillian Jeffries, Yvette 17 18 Molina, Billy Martin, and Matthew Distefano, the 19 ever-present Sergeant-at-Arms. They keep things 20 orderly and safe on either side of Broadway through 21 our executive hearings, parade season, everything in 2.2 between. Thank you, Carl, Raphael and the entire 2.3 team. Colossal thanks to my fearless co-pilot for the past six months through all the endless hearings and 24 briefings, Committee Counsel, the mighty Mike Twomey. 25

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Give it up for Mike Twomey, guys. Come on. If there's ever any bad news, I make Mike Twomey deliver it.

Last but not least, a special shoutout to my District

Office Staff for holding down the fort during this crazy time. I don't think I've been to my District

Office in about six months and, to my friend and advisor, John Yedden, for dealing with my charming impatience.

This budget represents the Council's focus on shared priorities and our certainty that the revenue was there to undo cuts to essential services for our City's safety and growth. We fought with passion and precision for a budget that delivers for the hardworking New Yorkers who make the city the capital of the world, not only by restoring attempted cuts but by baselining funding to give services stability and reliability in the future. It's just an example of what this Body was able to accomplish. We successfully restored the full 58.3 million dollars for our library systems, 43 million of which is baselined into the future. We secured a full 53 million restoration and 13-million-dollar baseline to our cultural institutions, the heartbeat of our city, 11 million dollars for the Fair Fares program to

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raise the eligibility level and expand this program 2 3 to stop New Yorkers from having to choose between a MetroCard and a meal. The housing crisis is real and 4 driving too many of our neighbors away. To fight 5 this, the Council secured 2 billion dollars in this 6 7 budget in additional capital funding over the next two years for construction of housing that New 8 Yorkers can actually afford. On top of that, we secured nearly 615 million in funding for CityFHEPS, 10 and 540 million of that will be baselined. The 11 12 Council focused on early childhood education in this 13 budget, particularly the danger of expiring stimulus 14 dollars to valued and relied upon programs. The 15 budget includes 112 million dollars to cover expiring 16 federal stimulus money for 3K and pre-K along with 40 17 million for about 5,000 extended day, extended year 18 pre-K seats. We also achieved 74 million to restore 19 school-based social workers, psychologists, and 20 family workers endangered by the stimulus cliff, a full 70-million-dollar restoration for funding of 21 2.2 community schools and more. Our emphasis on 2.3 baselining reflects the Council's attention to the future, preventing future Councils and 24 Administrations from negotiating over what should be

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bedrock funding while New Yorkers hang in the balance. As Speaker Adams said, we need to move away from a budget process centered on restorations and start spending our time on how we strengthen what New Yorkers need to thrive.

Today, we'll also be voting on five legislative items, four Pre-Considered Resolutions relating to interest rates on late payment of property taxes and Introduction 962.

Pursuant to both the Charter and the Administrative Code, every year, the New York City Banking Commission recommends to the City Council interest rates to charge for non-payment of property taxes. For FY25, the Banking Commission recommends the following rates:

For properties with an assessed value of no more than 250,000 dollars, 9 percent.

For properties with an assessed value of no more than 250,000 dollars for which the owner has entered into an installment payment agreement with the Department of Finance for payment of delinquent property taxes, 6 percent.

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Properties with an assessed value of more than 250,000 dollars but less than 450,000 dollars, 15 percent.

Properties with an assessed value of more than 450,000, 18 percent.

The Committee is voting to adopt lower interest rates than the recommended by the Banking Commission, and we're voting as follows:

For properties with an assessed value of no more than 250,000 dollars, 6 percent.

Properties with an assessed value of no more than 250,000 dollars for which the owner has entered into an installment payment agreement, 2.5 percent.

Properties with an assessed value of more than 250,000 dollars but less than 450,000 dollars, 9 percent.

Properties with an assessed value of more than 450,000 dollars, 16 percent.

Remember, these are interest rates related to late payment of property taxes.

The Resolutions we are voting on represent a 1 percent increase from the rates adopted last Fiscal Year, except for the rate for property

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subject to a payment plan, which represents a 0.5

percent increase. The Finance Committee believes this

small increase balances the need to maintain the

effectiveness of interest charges to encourage timely

payments of taxes without creating overly burdensome

7 charges on homeowners.

Finally, Introduction 962, a Local Law sponsored by myself along with Council Members Nurse, Williams, Farías, and Hudson to make significant reforms to the City's process of collecting outstanding property taxes and charges authorized by the Department of Finance to conduct the sale of debt under a new set of comprehensive protections for homeowners and tenants that shifts the focus towards home preservation and resolving debt rather than squarely on tax collection by any means.

Now let's turn to adopting this budget.

Before we get to the vote, I'd like to discuss the specific items that we'll vote on today. All Members received a budget packet from the Committee Counsel that contains all the budget-related legislation that must be voted on by the Committee and, again, by the full Council at the Stated Meeting later today so I'm

One, Resolution approving the FY25 Expense Budget.

Two, Resolution approving the FY25 Contract Budget.

Three, Resolutions approving the FY25 Capital Budget, Reso A, Reso B.

Four, a Resolution approving an Expense Budget Modification to close out FY24 and a Resolution approving a Revenue Budget Modification, which also closes out FY24.

Number six, a resolution approving the proposed FY25 community development program, reallocation of the 50th Year Funds and proposed 51st year program.

Number seven, three property tax resolutions, current base proportion, adjusted base proportion, and the resolution fixing the tax rates are all interlocking Resolutions that together are necessary to adopt the FY25 tax rates.

Number eight, a Transparency Resolution.

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Number nine, four Pre-Considered

Resolutions that set the interest rate for late
payments as we just discussed.

Number 10, Intro. 962.

The other documents in the package which do not require a separate vote are Schedule C and a list of terms and conditions for FY25.

As a reminder to my Colleagues, Schedule C is a schedule of the Expense and Contract Budgets, and the appropriations for the organization listed in Schedule C are funded by the Expense and Contract Budgets. Council Members will have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or not a conflict exists with any of the groups listed in Schedule C or Reso A, which details the designations of capital funds. A separate disclosure form must be completed by the Transparency Resolution. If any Council Member has a potential conflict of interest with any of the organizations included, they have the opportunity to disclose that conflict at the time of their vote. If you've not yet signed those disclosure forms, Staff from the GC's office are here and available to guide you through the process so please contact one of them before you vote.

votes of 17 in the affirmative, zero in the negative,

and no abstentions with the exceptions of the

following items, Resolutions 482, 483, 485, 486, and

487 are adopted with 15 in the affirmative, two in

the negative, and one abstention, and Resolution 488

is adopted with 16 in the affirmative, one in the

negative, and no abstentions. That's a full

Committee.
