1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 3 2 SERGEANT LOUIS: Mic check, mic check, 3 mic check. This is a mic check on Civil Service and Labor. Today's date is June 11th, 2025, in the 4 5 Chambers, recorded by Walter Louis. 6 SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning. Good 7 morning. Welcome to the New York City Council Vote on 8 the Committee on Civil Service and Labor. At this 9 time, please silence all electronic devices and 10 refrain from approaching the dais. Again, please do 11 not approach the dais. Chair, you may begin. 12 CHAIRPERSON DE LA ROSA: [GAVEL] Good 13 morning. Welcome to today's vote of the Civil Service 14 and Labor Committee. I am Council Member Carmen De La 15 Rosa, Chair of the Committee. 16 Proposed Resolution 66-A, sponsored by Council Member Cabán, strongly condemns the Trump 17 18 administration's ongoing efforts to dismantle federal 19 labor protections, stands in unwavering solidarity 20 with unionization efforts across New York City's 21 workforce, and affirms the fundamental right of all 2.2 workers to organize, bargain collectively, and hold 23 free and fair union elections. 24 This legislation affirms one of the most 25 fundamental rights of our democracy: the right of

1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 4 2 workers to organize, collectively bargain, and do so 3 without fear of retaliation. This resolution comes at 4 a critical moment across New York City and 5 nationwide. Workers are standing up at Amazon warehouses, at Starbucks stores, and in nonprofit and 6 7 government offices, demanding dignity, fair pay, and 8 a voice on the job.

9 But as the momentum grows, we're seeing a 10 dangerous rollback of labor protections from the 11 federal government. Under President Trump's administration, the National Labor Relations Board 12 13 has been paralyzed. Unionized federal workers have 14 been fired by executive order, and long-standing 15 labor rights have come under attack. These actions 16 don't just target unions; they represent a broader effort to weaken public service, silence working 17 18 people, and shift power even further towards 19 corporate interests.

The Council has a responsibility to speak out and stand in solidarity with workers who are organized to make the workplace and our economy more just.

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I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this resolution in solidarity with every worker fighting for their rights.

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17 Today, I am so proud that we are voting on Resolution 66-A, our New York is a Union Town 18 19 Resolution. This resolution is a clear declaration from the City Council. We stand with workers 20 organizing across New York City. And we unequivocally 21 condemned union-busting corporations, as well as the 2.2 23 Trump administration's attacks on the fundamental rights of organized labor. From Starbucks baristas to 24 25 Amazon drivers and warehouse workers, from media and

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1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 6 2 gig workers to government staffers and academic 3 employees, workers in New York are organizing and 4 often winning important victories. They're doing so 5 in the face of aggressive union-busting, employer 6 retaliation, and a federal labor system that's been 7 under assault.

This resolution affirms what so many of 8 9 us know to be true: the right to unionize is not just a workplace issue. It's a matter of justice, of 10 11 democracy, and of dignity. Unions don't just improve wages and working conditions; they give workers a 12 13 voice. They are the instruments of democracy, the 14 agents of justice, of equality and fairness. And when 15 that power is threatened, whether by corporate giants like Amazon and Starbucks or by federal attacks like 16 17 those launched by the Trump administration, this 18 Council and the City have a duty to speak up. We have 19 an obligation to stand up and to act. Resolution 66-A 20 reaffirms that duty. It sends a message to all 21 workers in this city and around the country-We see 2.2 you, we support you, and we have your back. 23 I want to thank the workers and

24 organizers who continue to push forward in the face 25 of enormous pressure, especially our friends at the

1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 7 2 Teamsters, Amazon Labor Union-IBT 1, and Starbucks 3 Workers United. 4 I want to thank my co-sponsors and 5 colleagues who helped bring this resolution to the floor. I would also like to thank Council staff, 6 7 especially Elizabeth Artz, for her work on this resolution. 8 9 Together, we're helping to make clear 10 that New York City is and always will be a union 11 town. Thank you. 12 CHAIRPERSON DE LA ROSA: Thank you so much. We now turn to the Clerk to call the roll. 13 14 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you.
