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SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning and welcome to today's New York City Council hearing for the Committee on Health. At this time, we ask you to silence all cell phones and electronic devices to minimize disruptions throughout the hearing. Thank you for your cooperation. Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: [gavel] Good morning everyone. I am Council Member Lynn Schulman, Chair of the New York City Council's Committee on Thank you to my colleagues for joining us at Health. today's vote on Proposed Introduction 435-A by Council Member Pierina Sanchez in relation to expanding availability of rapid testing for sexually transmitted infections. I am joined by Council Members Narcisse, De La Rosa, Ariola, Marmorato, Yeger. Today, we are voting on legislation requiring -- and Council Member Feliz. Today, we are voting on legislation requiring the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to make no-cost and lowcost rapid testing services for sexually transmitted infections, or STIs, more widely available throughout New York City. While traditional STI testing results

results so that they can take quick action to obtain

2	care and necessary treatment. DOHMH currently offers
3	rapid STI testing five days a week at its Chelsea and
4	Fort Green Express Clinics. Anyone who is 12 or
5	older can receive services at any clinic regardless
6	of immigration status. Parental consent is not
7	necessary. Proposed Introduction 435-A represents
8	the next step in our continuing efforts to expand
9	access to fast and accurate STI and HIV testing,
10	ensuing that such testing is available to more New
11	Yorkers. Under this legislation, DOHMH will be
12	required to open two additional rapid testing
13	facilities, the first by 2026 and the second by 2027.
14	With recent data showing an increase in STI rates in
15	New York City over the past several years, it is more
16	important than ever that the City take action to
17	promote safe sex practices and expand access to rapid
18	STI testing. As Chair of the Health Committee and
19	someone's who healthcare advocacy was formed during
20	the heights of the HIV and AIDS movement, I am
21	extremely proud of our efforts to not only restore
22	\$5.3 million for HIV and AIDS services providers in
23	New York City in the FY25 budget, but to baseline
24	this funding to ensure our city's lasting commitment
25	to caring for New Yorkers living with HIV and AIDS.

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However, there is still work to be done. New HIV				
infections in New York City have plateaued after				
significant year over year decreases prior to the				
COVID-19 pandemic. As we reaffirm our commitment to				
compassionate and comprehensive care for people				
living with HIV and AIDS, we must also invest				
significantly in public education, outreach and				
testing to continually lower the rates of new				
infection. Thank you to my staff and to the Health				
Committee staff for their work, and I will now ask				
Council Member Sanchez to give a brief statement.				

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Thank you so much Council Member Schulman, and the first thing I want to do is shout out our SYEP intern class of 2024 sitting in the back and some over there because there's a lot of them.

CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: And I have my Simon [sic] Reisenthal [sic] and Forest Hills High School interns over there.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Very excited to have them in here today. Thank you so much for your leadership, Council Member Schulman, and to members of the LGBTQ+ Caucus, the Women's Caucus, BLAC Progressive Caucus. We all did this together working

2	with advocates for over a year to try to have this
3	bill passed, and of course, want to thank the
4	Committee staff for [inaudible] Suture [sp?], Sarah
5	Liste [sp?], Andrea Vasquez [sp?], and Jeff Baker for
6	all your support. As the Chair mentioned, since
7	COVID-19 began, racial inequities in sexually
8	transmitted infection rates have skyrocketed, most
9	harshly impacted New Yorkers at the intersection of
10	Black, Latino, low-income, and LGBTQ+ communities.
11	In New York City, Black and African-American people
12	and Latinx people make up over 80 percent of new HIV
13	infections in 2022. The Bronx, in particular,
14	suffers from the highest rate of HIV infection and
15	death across New York State's 62 counties, the
16	highest rate of chlamydia infection, and the second
17	highest rate of gonorrhea in the five boroughs. It
18	is not reflected in the kind of access to services
19	that we have. And nationally, we have seen Hispanic
20	and Latinx people see a 17 percent increase in HIV
21	infection rates in recent years. But study after
22	study from the CDC, Centers for Disease Control and
23	Prevention, shows us that there's actually less
24	sexual risk behavior among Black and Latino
25	Americans. Nationally, we are less likely to have

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2	unprotected sex. It is white people, actually, who
3	are having more unprotected sex. So these horrific
4	inequities are only about access, access to
5	education, access to testing, prevention, treatment,
6	and care, and that is why Intro 435 is so important.
7	It represents major investment in expanding access to
8	rapid STI testing with a dedicated focus on
9	communities that are most impacted and struggling the
10	most. And with that I will conclude, because this is
11	a committee hearing and I'm just very excited. So,
12	thank you SYEP interns for being here and thank you,
13	Chairs.
14	CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: Thank you. I also
15	want to acknowledge we've been joined virtually by
16	Council Members Gennaro and Menin. I'll now turn it
17	over to the Clerk to call the roll.

18	leadership very well. So, thank you. Second, I want						
19	to say thank you to my colleague Sanchez, because as						
20	a registered nurse, you know that's what I said,						
21	when you hire 34 women to work for you, this is what						
22	you get. Even the nurse don't get it, but the other						
23	women will get it. Sorry, guys, I love you. But as						
24	a registered nurse and advocate to public health, I'm						

so excited and proud to be here today to celebrate.

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2	This is the passage of Intro 435. It's a
3	celebration. And you heard the statistic, the
4	numbers don't like to you. This legislation is
5	certainly a significant step forward in expanding
6	access to everyone, and to address the inequities in
7	New York City where else we should be doing that.
8	Chair Schulman, I thank you, and of course, aye.
9	COUNCIL CLERK: Ariola?
