Good morning, and welcome to the New York City Council vote for the Committee on Rules, Privileges, and Elections.

At this time, everyone please silence your cell phones. At this time, and going forward, no one is to approach the dais. I repeat, no one is to approach the dais.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON POWERS: [GAVEL]

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Good morning, and welcome to the meeting of the Committee on Rules, Privileges, and Elections. I'm Council Member Keith Powers, Chair of the Committee.

Before we begin, I'd like to introduce the other members of this Committee who are present. We are joined by Speaker Adrienne Adams; Council Member Brannan; Council Member Farías; Council Member Ayala; Council Member Hudson; and Council Member Brewer. I also want to acknowledge... And we will be joined, I think, shortly by others.

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I would also like to acknowledge the committee counsel, Jeffrey Campagna, and the committee staff who worked on the appointments that we will hear today: Chief Ethics and Compliance Counsel, Pearl Moore; Director of Investigations, Francesca Dellavecchia; and Deputy Director of Investigations, Alycia Vassell.

Today, we'll be holding a public hearing regarding the New York County Democratic Committee's recommendation of Marc Landis for appointment to the Board of Elections. We will then vote on that matter and the candidates we heard at our April 1st meeting.

By a letter dated March 28, 2025; pursuant to § 3-204 of the New York State Election Law, the secretary of the New York County Democratic Party filed on the Clerk of the Council's recommendation of Marc Landis for appointment as a commissioner of the New York City Board of Elections to serve the remainder of a four-year term that expires on December 31, 2026.

I want to note for the record, it is exceedingly rare that this committee considers candidates recommended by the Democratic or Republican parties for membership of the Board of Elections, and New

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES, AND ELECTIONS 2 York City law provides that members of the Council of 3 each party have the power to appoint their candidates to the board without interference from members or of 4 5 the other political party. That process takes at least 30 days. However, this situation is unique 6 because of the timing of the primary election cycle, 7 in which members of the Board of Elections will 8 decided petition challenges. Because of that, we 9 cannot leave a seat vacant until the Democratic 10 11 conference is able to act. 12 Therefore, pursuant to § 3-204 of the New York 13 State Election Law and 10.60 of the Rules of the Council, I am now opening a public hearing on this 14 15 recommendation. Mr. Landis, you can please join us at 16 the dais? 17 Please raise your right hand to be sworn in. 18 COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Do you affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, in 19 your testimony before this committee and in answer to 20 all council member questions? 21 2.2 MARC LANDIS: I so affirm. 2.3 COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you.

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make a statement.

MARC LANDIS: Thank you. Good morning, Madam

Speaker, Chairman Powers, Council Members. My name is

Marc Landis; it's my privilege to be here before you

today to tell you a bit about myself and seek your

approval to become the next Manhattan Democratic,

Commissioner of the Board of Elections.

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I am a forty-year Democratic Party activist, committed always to expanding voting opportunity. And this is a place where I hope that working with you, and other legislators, that I will be able to continue to build on that kind of work from the inside as opposed to just from the outside. I also know that there's a lot of work ahead in terms of administering elections. The laws change frequently, and I look forward to working with colleagues, both in government, and the volunteers who make up such an important part of the process, to ensure that everybody has all the tools they need and all the resources they need to be able to ensure that we have an open and fair voting system.

And as a long time attorney and also the managing partner of a medium-sized law firm, I bring administrative and managerial experience that I hope will enable me to work with my colleagues at the

Board to find ways in which the board can work most effectively. My litigation before the Board of Elections, of course, will come to an end. I am not a frequent litigator there.

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I am particularly proud of two pro bono matters that I've worked on in the last few years. One, to restore voting rights to a federal prison releasee under the CARES Act to ensure that they would have the same rights as New York State prisoner releasees would do. And I am excited to see that the state is making that information known to prisoners as they are released, and hopefully, we can use some moral suasion on the federal government to do the same over time. And I've worked closely with Common Cause and the Black Institute in looking to challenge the approval of election machines at the state level that don't meet the kinds of tests that we want to see in terms of verifiable voter trails.

I've served as a Democratic Party District Leader for twenty years and now as a member of the Democratic State Committee for the last six years. I also work closely with interfaith organizations to promote democratic, uh, small-d democratic and progressive values, both locally and worldwide.

So, I thank you for your consideration, and I'm

happy to answer any questions you might have for me.

CHAIRPERSON POWERS: Thank you, any questions to begin?

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Not a question, but just to second what I think others know, which is that Marc Landis, many of us have known him for a long time, I am fortunate to work for him, because I am the council member for the district. And I just want to say that he is eminently qualified. And what's particularly great about Marc Landis is he keeps in touch with people. So those of us who are interested in this topic, he will be glad to answer questions and make sure that we know what the issues are at the Board of Elections. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON POWERS: Thank you.

Just a few questions. I noted a sort of unique circumstance by which the timing is, and I think we all feel the urgency to fill a empty seat with election cycle fully underway. Were you... did you... you're a state committee member today. Is that correct?

MARC LANDIS: Yes.

challenges to petitions and other conversations in

the coming weeks. Are you a signer of any petitions

that would be appear at the Board of Elections?

MARC LANDIS: (BACKGROUND NOISE) I'm sorry? Did I

sign any... (CROSS-TALK)

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CHAIRPERSON POWERS: (INAUDIBLE) a witness or a signer of any petitions that would appear at the Board?

MARC LANDIS: I did sign a petition, and I did witness a petition. The only signatories on the petition that I witnessed were my wife and my daughter — who is sitting behind me. So I hope those two signatures will not be challenged by anybody.

CHAIRPERSON POWERS: Got it, I don't think they will be. I think they're... I think they meet the criteria of... And just, how would you handle a potential conflict if there were one or one if you were a witness or a signer or other issue that might come before the Board where there would be a perceived conflict? — Being that we are in the thick of the election cycle and, obviously, you couldn't have been predicted this was going happen, so potentially may have done any of those things.
