17	I'm Council Member Brannan. I Chair the
18	Committee on Finance. We've been joined this morning
19	by Council Members Salaam, Ossé, Hudson, Hanks, Carr,
20	Louis, Farías, Powers, Moya on Zoom, and I think
21	 Sanchez is joining us on Zoom shortly.

Today, the Committee will be voting on five items. Resolution 412, Resolution 421, a

Property Tax Pre-Considered Resolution, a Property

Tax Exemption Resolution, a Revenue Budget Mod, and a Transparency Resolution.

Start with Resolution 412, sponsored by

Council Member Nurse, sets the date, time, and place

for a public hearing to consider a local law that

would establish the Cypress Hills-Fulton Business

Improvement District. Local law would be heard on

June 20, 2024, at 10 a.m. right here in the City Hall

Committee Room.

Resolution 421, sponsored by Council

Member Won, sets the date, time, and place for a

public hearing to consider a local law that would

rename the Court Street-Queens Plaza BID into the

Long Island City Business Improvement District,

expand the boundaries of the existing BID to include

the properties generally along Northern Boulevard,

Vernon Boulevard, and to the south and east sides of

Sunnyside Yards, would increase the total amounts

authorized to be expended in the BID annually and for

improvements, and it would amend the district charge

assessment method. Local law would be heard right

here, June 20, 10 a.m. here in the Committee Room.

Next, the Pre-Considered Resolution would set a discount percentage rate for each property tax

payment. Pursuant to both the Charter and the

Administrative Code every year, the New York City

Banking Commission recommends to the City Council

interest rates for early payment and for non-payment

of property taxes. For FY25, the Banking Commission

recommends for early payment of real estate taxes, a

0.5 percent discount. This Resolution would adopt the

Banking Commission's recommended rate.

Next, the Property Tax Exemption

Resolution is a new partial 40-year Article XI for

four buildings in Council Member Hudson's District.

As part of the application, units for all four

buildings will be restricted to 50 percent AMI, and

30 percent of the units will be reserved for formerly

homeless households. Improvements under HPD's Aging

in Place initiative will be completed as well as

facade work and other structural physical needs.

Next, the Revenue Budget Modification would recognize 619 million dollars in new revenues, implementing changes reflected in the April '24 Financial Plan. This revenue will add 619 million dollars to pay for partial PEG restorations in the Department of Cultural Affairs, rental assistance,

foster care payments, pupil transportation, the CUNY

STEM program, and other various initiatives.

Finally, the Transparency Resolution sets forth the new designation and changes in the designation of certain organizations that are receiving local aging and youth discretionary funding and funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. As with all Transparency Resolutions, Council Members have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or not a conflict exists with any of the groups on the attached list. If any Council Member has a potential conflict of interest with any of the organizations listed, they've got the opportunity to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. As a reminder, please disclose any conflicts you may have with the proposed subcontractors used by organizations sponsored by discretionary funding. These disclosures must be made before the subcontractor can be approved. Disclosure forms may be completed and submitted prior to the vote on the Transparency Resolution and may be emailed to Everton Smith, who is also present in the Committee Room today to answer your questions.

163,000 dollars compared to 53,105 dollars for black residents, we need to build and preserve deeply affordable housing at low AMIs so those who built our communities can continue to reside and contribute to them. This project will ensure these units remain affordable for at least the next 40 years, if not longer, and will not displace a single resident. Simply put, we need these types of projects to preserve existing deeply affordable housing, especially for our older adults who live on fixed incomes.

I'd also like to note that my team reviews Article XI tax exemption proposals in our District a bit differently. We held multiple community meetings with residents to ensure they understood what the changes meant, how construction would impact them, and so they could have any questions answered. We then flyered the entire building of nearly 100 units with a packet of information, both English and Spanish, on the proposed changes, and contact information for the developer and our office should they have any further questions. This approach takes a bit more work, but I'm confident that this proposed tax exemption will
