CHAIRPERSON MENIN: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone. I'm Council Member Jennifer Gutiérrez, Chair of the Committee of Technology.

at improving accessibility to City services. I also want to acknowledge the ASL and CART services are available for this hearing. Intro. 138-A, sponsored by Council Member Brooks-Powers, in relation to public service announcements in American Sign Language for persons who are deaf or hard of hearing on advertising structures. And Intro. 646-A,

sponsored by Council Member Riley, in relation to
reporting on the implementation of Next Generation 9
1-1, or NextGen. This Committee heard both bills on
November 25, 2024, and received and evaluated
testimonies from the Administration and advocates.
The testimonies enriched our understanding of the
issues at hand. Approximately 44.1 million people,
around 13.4 percent of the U.S. population,
experience some form of disability. In New York City
alone, nearly 1 million residents self-identify as
having a disability. In today's digital age,
accessibility encompasses both physical and digital
realms. It means ensuring that every individual can
fully engage with the City's resources, information,
and services. This commitment to accessibility
includes individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing,
and deaf plus. I also want to acknowledge the deaf
and hard of hearing advocates present with us today
and recognize their invaluable contributions to this
legislation.

I also would like to thank the Committee Staff, Policy Analyst Erik Brown, Leg Council Irene Byhovsky, and my Chief-of-Staff and Senior Advisor Anya Lehr for their hard work on those bills. I'd

I will now turn it over to Council Member Brooks-Powers, the sponsor of Intro. 138-A, for her statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you, and good morning. I'd like to start by thanking you, Chair Gutiérrez, for your leadership in advancing this important legislation through the Committee on Technology. I am proud that the Council is moving forward today with Intro. 138, a crucial step to ensure that our deaf and hard of hearing neighbors are fully included in the City's communication and public safety infrastructure. Every New Yorker, regardless of ability, must have equal access to vital public information and emergency services. While progress has been made, too many members of the deaf and hard of hearing community remain unaware of essential resources like text to 9-1-1 and video relay services. This bill ensures that these services are prominently promoted through public service announcements on LinkNYC kiosks, using American Sign Language and captions to make the information truly

3	in our public messaging, we are making our city
4	safer, more connected, and more equitable. I am
5	deeply grateful to the deaf and hard of hearing
6	community and the many advocates who have worked

8	meaningful step forward toward a more inclusive city.
