SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning, and welcome to today's New York City Council vote for the Committee on Aging.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON HUDSON: [GAVEL] Thank you so much. Good morning, and welcome to today's Aging Committee vote. I'm Crystal Hudson, Committee Chair, and my pronouns are she/her.

Today, we'll be hearing and voting on
Resolution Number 986, sponsored by myself,
recognizing today, August 14th, 2025, as the 90th
anniversary of Social Security, and commemorating
August 14th annually as Social Security Day in the
City of New York. Social Security, yay, woo! Social
Security, established in 1935 under President
Franklin D. Roosevelt has served as a cornerstone of
economic stability in the United States, offering

earned benefits to retired workers, individuals with 2 3 disabilities, and surviving family members. Funded 4 through payroll taxes, the program has provided 5 uninterrupted payments for nearly 90 years, regardless of economic or political challenges, and 6 7 remains a vital source of income for millions. As of 2025, nearly 69 million Americans, 52 million of whom 8 are retired, receive Social Security benefits, totaling 1.6 trillion annually. In New York City, 10 11 about 1.3 million residents rely on Social Security, 12 with more than 40 percent using those payments to 13 meet basic needs. With the population of Americans aged 65 and older expected to increase significantly 14 15 by 2035, the program's role as a stabilizing force 16 will only grow. Despite this increase, the Trump 17 Administration is actively dismantling the 18 infrastructure in place that supports older adults. 19 In recent months, the federal government has made 20 policy changes that make these benefits harder to 21 access, from closing offices and removing language 2.2 access services, to limiting direct deposit 2.3 information changes and eliminating the federal office tasked with supporting older adults. And 24 Trump's recent budget bill cut funding for food 25

assistance and healthcare coverage, jeopardizing
programs that support older adults and making their
Social Security checks even more crucial in their
ability to make ends meet on a fixed income. By
passing this Resolution, the Council will show it
stands not only with older adults, most immediately
affected by the Trump Administration's attempts to
cut our nation's safety net, but with all Americans
who have paid into Social Security and have the right
to age with confidence and peace of mind. This
Resolution recognizes this historic and ongoing
impact of the Social Security program and
commemorates August 14, the date the Social Security
Act was signed into law, as Social Security Day here
in New York City.

Thank you to AARP, especially Beth Finkel and Kevin Jones, for leading the charge in protecting older adults and vital resources like Social Security.

I urge my Colleagues to vote aye on this important legislation.

And finally, I'd like to thank the Aging Committee Staff, Christopher Pepe, Chloë Rivera, and Saiyemul Hamid for their work on today's vote. And I
