| 20 | and troubling disparity in access to student         |
| 21 | journalism opportunities across our city's high      |
| 22 | schools.   |
| 23 | A 2022 report by Baruch College found                |
| 24 | that only 27 percent of non-charter public high      |
| 25 | schools in New York have a student newspaper. The    |

2 disparity becomes even more pronounced when taking into account socioeconomic status among the 100 non-3 4 charter public high schools with the highest poverty 5 rate; a mere 7 percent have a student newspaper. Compare this to 62 percent of the 50 non-charter high 6 7 schools with the lowest poverty rate, and 100 percent of our specialized high schools, all of which have 8 9 student newspapers.

These statistics are not just numbers. 10 11 They reflect a deeper issue of inequity in access to 12 opportunities that can profoundly shape a student's 13 educational experience and future prospects. Lack of a student newspaper stripped many students, 14 15 particularly black and brown students, of the 16 opportunity to express their ideas, showcase their 17 creativity, and develop critical thinking skills. 18 Student journalism is essential for fostering a more 19 representative pipeline of professional journalists 20 who reflect the diversity of our city. By calling on 21 New York City public schools to support a student 2.2 newspaper at every high school, we are taking a 23 critical step toward ensuring that all of our students have the opportunity to contribute to a 24 future where democratic freedoms are protected, 25
