The Housing Stability and Tenant Protection Act of 2019 was enacted and provides protections for tenants from increases from major capital improvements or MCI increases. Under the Housing Stability and Tenant Protection Act of 2019 if fewer than 35% of the apartments in your building are rent regulated, your landlord cannot receive an increase for a major

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local level can tantalize much larger events particularly encouraging more efficient use of energy. An environmentally informed population is essential to addressing and responding to climate change.
