Summary of Legislation: This legislation requires the mayor to designate an agency or office to provide centralized support to residents displaced by qualifying events. Such centralized support shall include providing information on available resources, facilitating communication between agencies and displaced residents, responding to requests for assistance, and maintaining the contact information for displaced residents. The designated entity is also required to establish an email address and telephone number to receive communications from and provide appropriate information to residents displaced by qualifying events.

Effective Date: 270 days after enactment
