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Year 2025 as well as the Home Preservation and Debt
Resolution Reform Act.

Introduction 962, sponsored by Council

Member Justin Brannan, advances the resolution and
enforcement of property tax collection and
preservation of housing for certain properties
throughout comprehensive reform of the City's process
to collect unpaid property taxes and payments. It
shifts the focus from debt collection to debt
resolution with multiple off-ramps and strong
protections for at-risk homeowners to maintain their
assets and housing stability and safeguards for
tenants in affected large buildings. It also
establishes a process to advance alternatives to the
City's use of securitized trust with a clear mandate
and timeline.

Now let's move on to the Fiscal Year 2025
City Budget. First, I'd like to take a moment to
acknowledge and thank a few people from the Council
for their work throughout this process. I want to
thank our Finance Chair, Council Member Justin
Brannan, whose strong leadership was pivotal to the
progress that this Council achieved in its fight for
investments and restorations. I also want to express

I also want to thank the Office of General Counsel 10 Staff for their work on the Counsel side of the 11 12 budget, Francesca Dellavecchia, Alycia Vassell, and 13 the entire Public Integrity Unit, Pearl Moore, and 14 the attorneys of the Office of the General Counsel, 15 and Jonathan Ettricks of the Legislative Documents 16 Unit. Last but not least, I want to thank Members of 17 my Senior Staff, Jeremy John, Faiza Ali, Mandela 18 Jones, Danielle Castaldi-Mika, Megan Lynch, Jay Koh, 19 Danielle Porcaro, and every Division and Staff Member of the City Council, including all Council Members' 20 21 Staff, we thank you all.

In my State of the City, I said let's get back to basics. New Yorkers need an effective government so that all of us and future generations can build their legacies in our great city. That

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continued to be our North Star for this budget, to build a strong and stable foundation for our City and all New Yorkers. Our Council Finance Division and its economists correctly guided us with accurate data regarding what to expect in terms of our economic outlook and forecasting revenues. We were clear about the challenges and that we have the resources to invest in New Yorkers and protect what they rely on. The families and people of this city need affordable housing and early childhood education to remain here. Our students need support to continue recovering from historic learning loss from the pandemic, and we must prioritize resources for mental healthcare, community safety, cultural institutions, libraries, parks, senior services, and so many other vital programs. Skyrocketing housing costs and the lack of affordable housing also guided our work to secure investments for more affordable housing development and home ownership opportunities with the leadership of Chairs Riley, Salamanca, Sanchez, and Banks, along with many other Members. We are immensely proud of the work accomplished by this Council to restore funding for these priorities, and at the same time we know there is so much more that our cities and communities need.

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It is imperative for our city's future that the
budget process moves away from restoring and towards
strengthening and building.

Early childhood education has been a priority for this Council. We know how critical it is to children's development and to New Yorkers' abilities to raise their families here. Two hundred and ninety-three million dollars added for early childhood education between the Executive Budget and now, including a comprehensive plan that the Council prioritized to fund more seats to ensure all families waiting for a seat can get one. In this budget, we took on a unique role as a legislature to more actively get involved in fixing the administration of our early childhood education system because its continuing operational problems are undermining its ability to reliably serve our children and families. We recognize this was both a fight for funding and one to save and strengthen these critical programs from challenges that cannot be allowed to persist. Right now, we have fewer applications than budgeted seats. We also have vacant seats despite many families being unable to obtain one. This is a problem that we must address because this system is

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too important to fail our families. Our comprehensive approach includes funding for more seats to meet the immediate needs of the families who didn't get a seat after applying for the coming year. It also adds preschool special education seats to ensure that hundreds of children with disabilities who remained on waiting lists can finally access their legally required seats. We also put forward strong reforms, including funding for a revived outreach effort to ensure families know about their options, converting even more seats to full day, full year, to meet the needs of working families and establishing a working group with the Council, Mayor's Office, DOE, and OMB that will meet every other week to confront the system's challenges on a granular level. For us, this agreement is the foundation for stabilizing and strengthening the system so we can achieve a real universal system of 3K based on utilization. We have the capacity to secure a seat for every child. We must get this right to help families remain in this city and help them succeed.

We know our students are still struggling to recover from historic levels of learning loss and disruptions caused by the pandemic. We worked

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together to add and restore over 711 million dollars in funding for education in the Executive Budget and now including for school-based social workers, school psychologists and family workers, community schools, the Learning to Work program, literacy instruction and dyslexia programming, shelter-based community coordinators, and restorative justice among other critical programs. Students will receive these services without interruption, which has always been a goal for this Council. I want to thank all the Members who helped us get here, especially those who rolled up their sleeves to get into the details with us, Education Chair Joseph and Children and Youth Chair Stevens. Their leadership was pivotal to safeguarding our children's futures and uplifting working families across our city. I also want to thank Council Member Jen Gutiérrez for her leadership in these efforts. We also restored investments to CUNY, our systems engine of opportunity so New Yorkers have continued access to educational and economic opportunities. Thank you to Higher Education Chair Dinowitz for your commitment to CUNY.

We're at a pivotal moment where smart investments in housing today can bring about a more

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affordable future. The record high levels of homelessness and evictions compounded by the high cost of housing underscores the urgency of building and sustaining homes for the people of our city. In this budget, we secured 2 billion dollars in additional funding in the Capital Plan over the next two years for affordable housing production, home ownership opportunities, and public housing thanks to Chairs Riley, Salamanca, Sanchez, and Banks along with many other Members.

We're also proud to have secured baselined funding for CityFHEPS of over 500 million dollars for the very first time. These are the types of investments that New Yorkers need to live in our city and raise their families here.

We fought hard to secure restorations and baseline funding of 53 million dollars for our cultural institutions and 58.3 million dollars for libraries thanks to the leadership of Chair Rivera and the Members of this Council who stood beside her and behind her in fighting for this funding.

I'm also proud that we were able to restore and add over 23 million dollars in funding for our parks thanks to Parks and Recreation Chair

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2 Krishnan and Members who understood the value of 3 protecting these precious resources.

We cannot forget about our elders who are the jewels of our communities. Our older adults need access to senior centers, home-delivered meals, and other vital programs to live and age with dignity, and we're proud to have restored and added nearly 17 million dollars for programs that allow our older adults to lead healthy and connected lives. Thank you to our Aging Chair, Chair Crystal Hudson, for leading us to honor our older adults by securing more of what they deserve.

expanding access to it remains a priority for this council. We secured an additional 10.7 million dollars in baselined funds for Fair Fares. Through our hard work, more low-income New Yorkers will now have affordable access to public transit by expanding Fair Fares eligibility. I thank Transportation and Infrastructure Chair Brooks-Powers for her efforts to continue expanding and strengthening this crucial program.

We also secured important investments for justice-involved supportive housing, alternatives to

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incarceration, trauma recovery centers, and funding to save smaller mental health clubhouses that face the risk of closure. The Council has consistently championed community-based safety programs that make neighborhoods safer and mental health resources to prevent people from slipping into crisis, and we will continue to invest in these proven solutions. I thank Mental Health Disabilities and Addictions Chair Lee and Criminal Justice Chair Nurse for your leadership to advance a holistic vision of health and safety that is rooted in evidence-based solutions.

The health of New Yorkers has always been our priority, and we were proud to fully restore funding to HIV/AIDS services and commit tens of millions more in the Capital Plan for a new trauma center in the Rockaways.

To help make sure no one goes hungry, we were proud to restore funding for community food connection and food insecurity services throughout our entire city. I thank Deputy Speaker Ayala, Health Chair Schulman, and Hospitals Chair Narcisse for prioritizing the health of New Yorkers and, of course, our Majority Whip who pushed for the trauma center on the Rockaway Peninsula.

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I'm also proud of the investments we secured to support our City's oversight bodies and those that protect the civil rights and safety of New Yorkers, including the CCRB, CCHR, DOI, and EEPC. We could not have done this without the leadership of Oversight and Investigations Chair Brewer and Civil and Human Rights Chair Williams.

There are so many parts of this budget that the Council fought hard to restore. Whether it was Council Member Shaun Abreu fighting for community composting and litter basket services or Council Members Ung and Won fighting for language access and interpreter programs to build a more inclusive city.

well, which is why every year the Council has prioritized adding new units of appropriation to the structure of the budget that reflect actual agency programs and functions. This year, through our negotiations, we secured the creation of 11 new units of appropriation, including a breakdown on spending for training within the Department of Correction, the Department of Instructional and Information

Technology within the Department of Education, and the Chief of Department and Detective Bureau within

the NYPD. We will also align four existing units of appropriation.

Finally, our budget includes a record 65 terms and conditions, which will disclose spending on issues critical to the Council, including on early childhood education, carter cases, the NYPD's deployment of its Strategic Response Group, unlicensed cannabis summonses and fines, and DYCD's Crisis Management Systems programs.

Throughout this process, we've been in conversation with our constituents and advocates in our communities to deliver a budget that truly reflects the needs of New Yorkers. Every single win was hard fought on behalf of our neighbors and all New Yorkers. As I will continue to say, as we move forward, we must shift from a focus on restoring to one of strengthening programs and services that we know New Yorkers need and deserve.

Thank you very much, Colleagues. I now turn it over to our Majority Leader.

General Orders, and I'd like to recognize Council

COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Thank you, Majority Leader. Since 1996, New York City has privatized the collection of property tax and other debt by relying on a complex web of trust, servicers, and Wall Street companies through a system called the tax lien sale. It has been the primary enforcement tool to collect property tax arrears, but it has also been a tool of displacement. Advocates for years have demanded the City abandon or transform the lien sale into a fairer system that centers compliance and preservation. Today's bill, Intro. 962, is the latest result, but not the end of this work and, to be clear, this bill is not perfect. It does not abolish the tax lien sale, it does not provide enough protections for tenants, and it does not categorically exempt certain properties from the lien sale, but this bill is miles away from where we were. What this bill does is provide many off-ramps to small homeowners, primarily black, brown, senior, and low-income homeowners, so they can stay in their homes and in compliance. It creates what many advocates have asked for, including

deeply concerned about the effects of budget

participation in our city's growing cultural

movement. These hard-fought budget wins would not

have been possible without my Colleagues, leadership

Introduction 962. As I have in the past, I'm voting

no on the lien sale bill. I believe fundamentally

it's bad public policy for the City to offload its

debt to third parties to collect and, recognizing

that we have to have structures in place to require

that people pay their taxes, there are a lot of

better ways to do it than this. This bill

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unquestionably improves how the lien sale had been conducted in the past. It unquestionably improves the process by which people get themselves on the lien sale list or off the lien sale list, but where we are right now is the City does not have the authority to sell liens, and we're passing a bill that allows the City to have this authority. The people who are most affected by this fundamentally are people who can't pay their taxes, not people who don't want to pay their taxes, because everybody doesn't want to pay taxes. We're talking about people who find themselves in a place where they can't make that payment, and then at the end of the process, they have interest put on and interest put on, and it's a senior who didn't get a bill or lost a bill and maybe doesn't have a child who's checking their mail, and the burden will later come to the point where that person's house is going to get taken, and it's going to be us who voted for the City to have that authority to do it. I don't want to look people in the eye and say I'm the one who's responsible for voting for this, and I think there are measures that we can put in place that would enable us to better make sure that, A, people do pay their debts, and, B,

We are also seeing a 23-milliondollar cut to Parks which will result in less frequent trash pickup, a lower level of landscape maintenance, and even more limited access to bathrooms. We restored 1.1 million dollars in cuts to older adult centers, added 4.75 million dollars for home-delivered meal reimbursements to provide an extra dollar per meal to providers, and secured 1 million dollars in funding for estate planning and legal services to combat deed theft and other issues commonly facing older adults. That Office will not only protect consumers by disclosing the price of every single medical procedure at every single hospital, but equally importantly, it will save the City potentially 2 billion dollars a year by finally harnessing our City's purchasing power to drive down skyrocketing healthcare costs, and I hope that that money in future years will be able to be utilized for education, affordable housing, and other urgent needs.
