Jean Corbett Parker is a Branch Specialist at Wachovia Securities and a longtime resident of Harlem, having been raised in West Palm Beach, Florida. Her son LaTraun Parker died, April 28, 2001 outside a nightclub at the corner of Seventh Avenue and 131st Street when an assailant unknown to him placed a gun to the back of his head and squeezed the trigger. At the time of his death, LaTraun Parker was 26 years old.



Jackie Rowe Adams is a native of Harlem, a longstanding employee of the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation, as well as the President of DC 37's Local 299. Ms. Rowe Adams has lost two sons to gun violence. In February 1982, her 17 year old son, Anthony, was murdered outside a bodega at 123rd Street in Harlem by two young men who believed that Anthony had been staring at them. Her son, Tyrone, age 28 at the time was shot to death by a thirteen year old boy outside of his apartment in Baltimore, Maryland.

BACKGROUND

Harlem Mothers S.A.V.E. was formed in 2006 by Jean Corbett-Parker and Jackie Rowe-Adams with the support of New York State Assemblyman, Keith Wright to organize an effort to prevent another mother from experiencing the agony of losing a child to gun violence.

Since that time they have worked tirelessly to embrace community residents and engage local law enforcement agencies, community-based organizations, elected officials and the faith-based community to work hand and hand to rid our neighborhoods of gun violence.

Adams and Parker utilize the power of the media to bring attention to this issue and to take action to find solutions to the proliferation of illegal guns on the streets of New York City. They appear on local radio and television shows challenging youth to put down their guns, parents to take back control of their children, and community leaders to ensure that there are quality social service programs to address the needs of young people.

The mothers of Harlem Mothers S.A.V.E. provide peer-to-peer support to mothers and family members who have lost their love ones to gun violence. Since the inception of this organization they have touched the lives of thousands of New Yorkers in an effort to get illegal guns off the streets and Stop Another Violent End.

MISSION

The mission of Harlem Mothers S.A.V.E. (Stop Another Violent End) is to prolong life among Harlem's youth by preventing gun violence and its social causes and costs. This single issue not-for-profit organization divides its efforts into three areas:

HISTORY OF THE PROBLEM

Violent crimes threaten our communities and rob our society of promising young people and decent citizens at alarming numbers each year. According to recent reports:

- 50,000 Americans a year die as a result of a violent crime (137 per day).
- FBI reports violent crime in large metropolitan areas was on the rise by 6.7% in 2007.
- New York ranks fourth in violent crime behind Texas, Florida and California which ranked first.
- Murder count in Manhattan reflects a 8% increase as of the beginning of November 2008, compared to this time last year reported by NYPD CompStat Unit.
- The number of children and teens killed by guns since 1979 would fill 4,177 public school classrooms of 25 students each.
- More 10- to 19-year-olds die from gunshot wounds than from any other cause except in motor vehicle accidents.
- Black children and teens are more likely to be victims of firearm homicide. White children and teens are more likely to commit suicide.
- Since 1979, gun violence has snuffed out the lives of 104,410 children and teens in America.

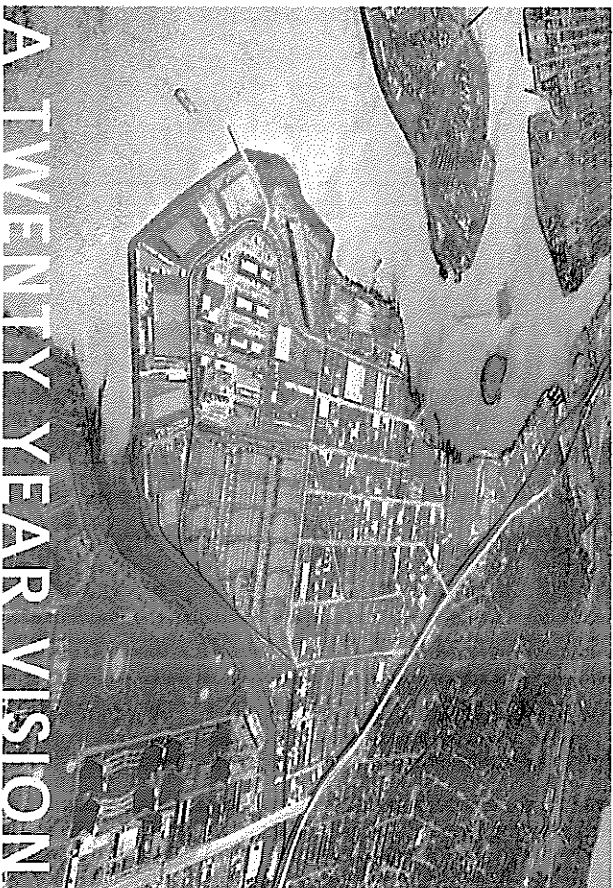

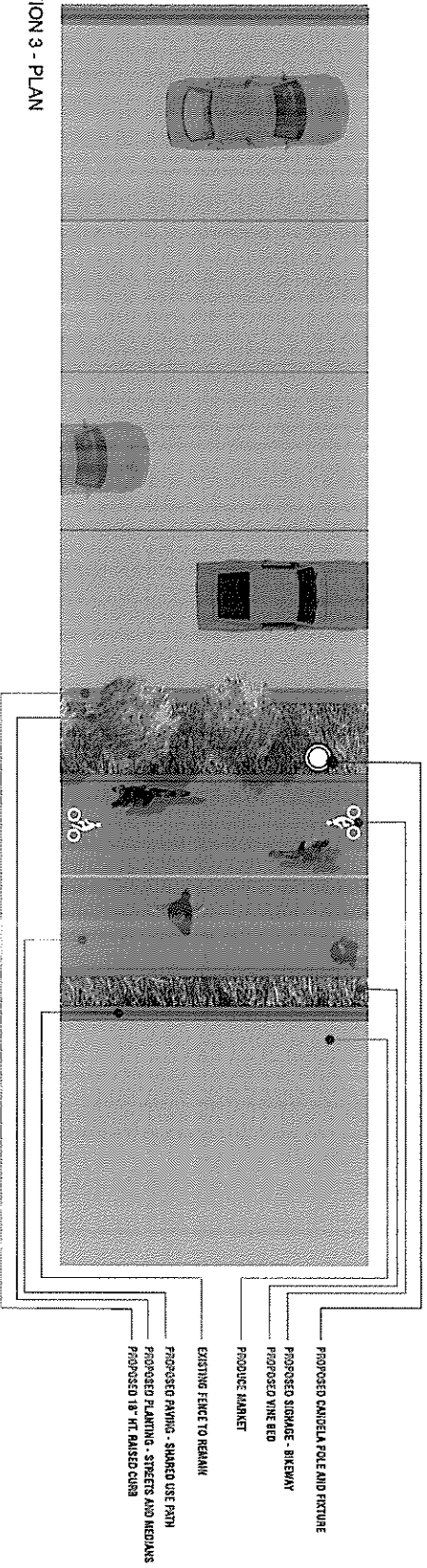


Food Center Drive Current Conditions

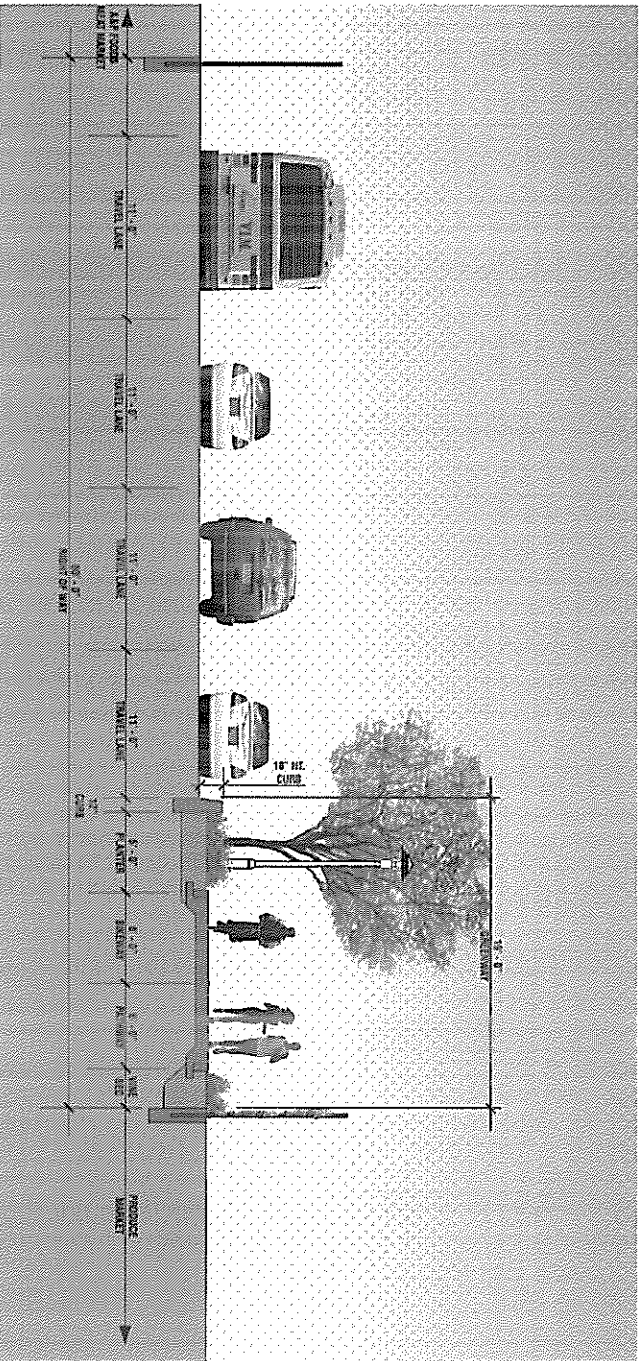


Food Center Drive
