I want to be right in this thing. Can you look into it again? (Pause) Alright folks, here we go. Good afternoon. Welcome to New York City Council's remote committee hearing on Housing and Buildings. Everyone one, please turn on your video at this time, silence all electronic devices, Chairperson, we're ready to begin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you so much.

(gavel) Good afternoon and thank you for coming.

I'm Council Member Robert Cornegy Chair of the

Committee on Housing and Buildings. We're here

forming a bill that would extend assistance related

to accessory signs. I 2018, a significant increase

in DOB violations related to accessory signs

impacted many small businesses across the city. To

prevent additional businesses from being affected

Local Law 28 of 2019 established a two-year

moratorium on the issuance of accessory sign

violations. But certain businesses that have

already received violations the law also

established a temporary DOB assistance program to

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facilitate the installation of compliant accessory signs, which included a 75% waiver on related permit fees. The Temporary DOB Assistance program established by Local Law 28 of 2019 expired six months after its enactment, and a moratorium of violations expired in 2021. However, due to COVID 19 crisis the installation of compliance signs has been delayed. Further, impacted small businesses are increasingly unable to pay for the installation of compliance signs or withstand the financial burden of a new violation. To address these concerns Proposed Intro Number 2044-A sponsored by Council Member Holden would extend the moratorium and the temporary DOB Assistance Program established by Local Law 2018 of 2019 for another two years. To reduce costs it would also increase the 75% waiver of the permit fees related to installing an accessory sign to 100% waiver. joined today... Austin if you could just see the um, the um roll. we have Council Members Rivera, Chin, Rosenthal,
Grodenchik, Louis Gjonaj, Perkins and Cabrera, and
Council Member Holden. Glad to know him as well.

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COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you. Council Member Holden if you'd like to give us your opening statement now is the time so yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Chair, thank you Council Member Cornegy for being a strong advocate for small businesses and helping move Intro 2044-A across the finish line. As you and my colleagues are aware small businesses are the life blood of our communities and we need to alleviate their burdens whenever possible. Even before the pandemic regulations and fines on small businesses were often burdensome and punitive. COVID 19 has made the matter all the more urgent. As you will recall, prior to Local Law 28 our small businesses were being hit with fines of up to \$20,000 over a sign or owning violation. In my district commercial strips along Jamaica Avenue, Fish Pond Road, Grand Avenue and others were hit particularly hard. With Intro 2044-A we are extending the expired two-year moratorium on sign fee violations for additional, two additional years. We are also extending the temporary Department of Buildings Assistance Program for two years. We, of course, assist business owners in legalizing their signs,

and equally important this bill would waive like
the Chair said 100% of the fees. This the type of
support our small businesses need. I want to thank
all of the co-sponsors of Intro 2044-A and other
members who are supporting this bill. I also want
to thank Speaker Corey Johnson, Jason Goldman and
the staff of the Speaker's Office for their
assistance. Also a big thank you to Chair Cornegy
Housing and Buildings Committee staff especially
Counsel Austin Bradford, and Chris Lappe of the
Legislative Division for their hard work on this
bill. Last, but certainly not least my staff, Chief
of Staff Daniel Kurzyna, Communications Director
Kevin Ryan, and Legislative Director Craig
Kalwanis. Together we're going to provide
immediate relief to businesses across the city. I
strongly encourage all my colleagues to vote age or
Intro 2044-A, and again I want to thank Chair
Cornegy. Back to you.
