Re: Constellation Affordable Homeownership Development in CB3

Brooklyn, New York

Dear Members of the NYC Council,

I write to you today as the Vice Chair of Community Board 3 (CB 3) and resident of Bedford Stuyvesant on the proposed UDAAP and land disposition for the Habitat for Humanity New York City and Westchester County (Habitat) Constellation affordable homeownership development. The project seeks to build 2 new limited-equity, permanently affordable cooperatives for low-income households containing a total of 34 residential homeownership units financed by the NYC Department of Housing Preservation & Development (HPD) at 908-910 Madison St (14 homeownership units) and 1901-1903A Atlantic Ave (20 homeownership units).

These cooperatives are two of eight scattered-site buildings totaling 96 affordable homeownership units to be located on land owned and stewarded by Interboro Community Land Trust. The properties are currently city-owned and were awarded to Habitat in 2017/2018 through a competitive RFP under the New Infill Homeownership Opportunity Program.

The CB3 Housing and Land Use Committee held two review sessions with the applicant and development team, including one pre-ULURP briefing on June 11th and a post-certification hearing on September 10th. On October 6th, After thorough review and deliberation, the committee recommended the board support the project proposal without conditions. The full board narrowly voted not to adopt the committee's recommendations and no motion was made to vote in support with conditions.

The areas of concern noted by board members and meeting attendees focused on depth of affordability and the desire for more family-sized units. The Committee previously reviewed these concerns, recognizing that the development's affordability was already below HPD's Open Door program term sheet and both purchase prices and maintenance charges were conservative, based on projections including inflationary and interest rate environments. It is my belief that the board would have voted in support had one been called with recommendations to pursue deeper affordability and add additional family-sized units.

So while the motion to support did not pass, it is my perspective that this should not be considered a vote in opposition.

The board appreciates efforts by HPD, Habitat for Humanity and Interboro Community Land Trust to bring permanently affordable homeownership opportunities to the district.

We especially appreciate Habitat's efforts to incorporate community input and feedback into their ongoing efforts by establishing a Community Advisory Committee to help guide local hiring efforts, first-time homebuyer outreach and preparation, and direct local marketing. Myself and other CB3 members have joined the committee or are actively providing support to this ongoing effort.

The need for affordable housing – especially affordable homeownership - remains a priority for our community. Members of the community board acknowledged Habitat for their previous homeownership and community preservation efforts in the district. I encourage the Council to support deeper affordability and additional family units where possible and to vote in support of this important homeownership development.
