SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning, and welcome to the New York City Council vote of the Committee on Immigration.

At this time, can everybody please silence your cell phones.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON AVILÉS: [GAVEL] Good morning.

This meeting is being called to order. Good morning,
everyone. I am Council Member Alexa Avilés, Chair of
the Committee on Immigration, and I'd like to begin
by thanking the Committee Colleagues who have joined
us here today, Council Members Brewer, Joseph, Hanif,
and Council Member De La Rosa.

At today's hearing, the Committee will be voting on two Proposed Local Laws and one Resolution, all sponsored by Council Member Carlina Rivera.

Proposed Introductions 84-A and 85-A in relation to workforce and the health surveys of migrants, including recent arrivals and asylum seekers and to repeal such amendments upon the expiration thereof, and Proposed Resolution 340-B, calling on the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services to eliminate filing fees for humanitarian benefit applications and subsequent employment authorization

applications and calling on Congress and the

President to move significant funding to USCIS to

cover the funding lost by eliminating filing fees.

These bills were previously heard during the hearing

with the Committee on Hospitals on April 16, 2024.

At the heart of this Committee's legislative and oversight work is a demand for data on the needs of immigrant newcomers residing in our city. We all know that it is impossible to make policy and conduct oversight without data, and knowing the needs of New York City residents helps policy makers and elected officials tailor the City's programming and service delivery. That is why the Committee on Immigration is voting on Proposed Introductions 84-A and 85-A, which would respectively require the Administration to develop and implement workforce and health surveys of migrants, including those who have recently arrived in New York City and those seeking asylum. These bills would also require the Administration to recommend policies and investments to support the well-being and success of immigrant newcomers. Proposed Introduction 84-A will equip City agencies and the Council with a full picture of the abilities of newly arrived migrant

community members and the impediments they face in accessing jobs, workforce training, and other economic opportunities and potential solutions that would bolster their economic security and upward mobility.

Similarly, Proposed Introduction 85-A will provide City agencies and the Council with a comprehensive view of the needs of immigrant newcomers related to healthcare and long-term care to the impediments migrants face in addressing their health-related needs and potential solutions that would bolster their physical and mental health.

As the Chair of the Committee on

Immigration, I thank Council Member Rivera for

putting forward this legislation, and I look forward

to working with the Administration on a long-term,

forward-thinking approach to welcoming immigrant

newcomers to our neighborhoods and communities.

Finally, the Committee on Immigration will also be voting on Proposed Resolution 340-B.

Even as the Committee on Immigration seeks ways for the City to do better in welcoming newly arrived immigrant community members, the Council has been clear that the federal government must play a leading

role in making it possible for immigrants to build full lives in our cities and provide for their families. Rather than requiring immigrant newcomers to pay exorbitant application fees when many of them are already struggling to make ends meet, the federal government should meaningfully resource USCIS and reassert its commitment to humanitarian forms of immigration relief and protection. I look forward to issuing this clarion call alongside my Council Colleagues, and again, thank Council Member Rivera

I will say impromptu that I'm deeply disappointed in the federal administration and their ban on the pursuit of asylum, which is an international and U.S. agreement to be able to receive people fleeing persecution and violence in their countries, and I hope there will be a change in policy.
