SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning, good morning, welcome to the New York City Council Vote for the Committee on Health.

At this time, please silence all electronic devices. And do not approach the dais.

Chair, you may begin.

CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone, I am Council Member Lynn Schulman, Chair of the New York City Council's Committee on Health.

Today we will be voting on two resolutions,
Proposed Resolution 165-B, sponsored by Council
Member Mercedes Narcisse, and Proposed Resolution
822-A, sponsored by myself.

Proposed resolution 822-A calls on the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, S.705/A.2140, also known as the Fair Pricing Act. This legislation addresses a pressing issue, inflated costs of routine outpatient services such as x-rays, MRIs, and immunizations, when performed in hospital

settings, compared to independent clinics or doctor's
offices. This discrepancy often results from
hospitals acquiring outpatient facilities and
imposing higher facility fees, leading to increased
financial burdens for patients. Under this
legislation, payments for routine medical services
would be capped at 150% of Medicare rates regardless
of service location. This site neutral payment policy
aims to eliminate unjustified price variations
ensuring that patients are not overcharged because of
where they receive care. Additionally, the Act
prohibits hidden facility fees and mandates greater
transparency in health care pricing.

Notably, research from the Brown University of Public Health concluded that if the Fair Pricing Act were implemented in 2022, it would have saved New Yorkers approximately \$1 billion, and would have reduced government spending on health care programs, including saving the New York City health benefits program over \$120 million.

Therefore, by adopting this resolution, we advocate for a fairer health care system that prioritizes patients well-being over profit margins.

I urge my fellow committee members to support this initiative reinforcing our commitment to accessible and affordable health care for all New Yorkers.

Before we move to the vote, I will pass the mic to Council Member Narcisse to make a statement on her resolution.

COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: Thank you, Chair. You already gave all the background so thank you for all that.

But what I'm talking about is equity in healthcare. So many of us happen to be, I don't want to say lucky or blessed to be able to have a child without any problem, but some of our neighbors, friends, and families are struggling. And how you explain to them that is something that is your problem when you cannot afford it? And I don't think health care should be about money, it should be a right to everyone. And this is a health care issue, too, for so many that think that everyone should be able to have a baby with no problem. But there are a lot a lot of folks out there that are having difficulty, and it's a very challenging thing when you listen to folks that are, you know, really
