[GAVEL] Good morning. I am Council Member Crystal

Hudson, Chair of the Committee on Aging, and my

pronouns are she/her.

I'd like to acknowledge that we've been joined by Council Members Mealy, Zhuang, and Banks.

Today, the Committee is voting on my bill, Proposed Introduction number 689-A, a Local Law to codify an existing Cabinet for Older New Yorkers made up of the Commissioners of various City agencies or their designees and Chaired by the Commissioner for the Department for the Aging, or NYC Aging, to facilitate interagency collaboration to improve

2 services for older New Yorkers. The NYC Aging 3 Commissioner would also be required to report on the 4 activity of the Cabinet. Older New Yorkers have many of the same concerns and needs as any other New Yorker, such as affordable housing and accessible 6 7 healthcare, but they may also require extra supports. 8 This means the City must raise awareness among service and programming providers through an intersectional lens. While NYC Aging has the largest 10 11 constituency among all City agencies, it also has the 12 smallest budget, less than half of a percent of the City's total budget. As a result, NYC Aging faces 13 14 challenges in its responsibility to address public 15 policy and service issues for older New Yorkers. In 16 September 2022, given the unique and growing needs of 17 the City's rapidly growing older adult population, 18 the Mayor announced the New York City Cabinet for 19 Older New Yorkers as "an interagency collaborative 20 established to realize and institutionalize an age-21 inclusive New York City through structural, 2.2 legislative, and systemic solutions." I am hopeful 2.3 that it will help to streamline and improve the ways in which the City serves older New Yorkers. Proposed 24 Introduction number 689-A would codify the Cabinet 25
