SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Testing one, two, one, two. Today's date is August 14, 2025. Today's vote is on Committee on Criminal Justice, being recorded in the Chambers by Keith Polite.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning, and welcome to today's New York City Council vote for the Committee on Criminal Justice.

ACTING CHAIRPERSON AYALA: Thank you, and good morning. Welcome to today's Criminal Justice

Committee vote on Proposed Introduction Number 1100-A in relation to supportive housing eligibility for persons who have been involuntarily confined. I also want to recognize my colleagues who are here, Council Members Marte, Stevens, Narcisse, Cabán, and Abreu, and Hanif, who's joining us virtually.

Supportive housing is a form of affordable housing that offers residents access to on-site social services and is considered the most

successful existing model for ending homelessness 2 3 among vulnerable populations. Eligibility for 4 supportive housing is restricted to those considered chronically homeless due to persistent obstacles like 5 serious mental illness or substance use disorders. 6 7 Currently, the definition for chronically homeless used to determine eligibility for supportive housing 8 includes those who have been residing in an institutional facility, including jail or prison, but 10 11 only if they were incarcerated for less than 90 days. The loss of chronic homeless status due to 12 13 incarceration of 90 days or more is a serious issue for New York City residents in jail and prison. 33 14 15 percent of people entering City jails are unhoused at 16 the time of admission, and over 20 percent of people 17 in custody have a serious mental illness that causes 18 serious functional impairment. The average length of 19 stay in City jails was 105 days in 2023, and people 20 with mental illness typically remain in jail more than twice as long as individuals who do not have a 21 2.2 mental illness. Access to supportive housing could 2.3 help many of these residents to gain stability and avoid future incarceration. Proposed Introduction 24 Number 1100-A would require the Human Service 25
