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2 CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Okay. Are we 3 ready? Okay.

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5 I am CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Good morning. 6 Jim Gennaro, Chair of the Committee on Environmental 7 Protection and today we will hold a vote on important 8 legislation that will improve transparency and access 9 to water billing records. Questions about water 10 bills are not unusual, however, open access to water 11 meter records had been the norm in New York City for 12 decades through the Department of Finance. Intro 13 2168-A would require the Commissioner of the 14 Department of Environmental Protection to create a 15 searchable online database for water ratepayers and for third parties -- that is anyone who registers and 16 17 pays a periodic subscription fee. These folks can 18 have access to these data if given consent by the 19 owners of one to three family houses. Such 20 information will go out, but not be limited to water 21 meter billing data and balances, consumption and 2.2 usage and technical information about the water 23 meter. This local law would take effect 120 days 24 after it becomes law except that the DEP Commissioner 25 may take such measures as are necessary for

2	implementation of this local law, including the
3	promulgation of rules before such date. Okay. I
4	crossed out a bunch of stuff in the statement that I
5	didn't think I needed to say, so let's jump down to
6	the bottom. Access to these water records had always
7	been available through the Department of Finance
8	records and by passing this bill, it will be once
9	again. Water consulting services and real estate
10	industry advocates have pointed out that open access
11	to water billing data has enabled property owners and
12	their representatives to effectively audit and
13	correct millions of dollars in overcharges and
14	billing mistakes made by DEP. Limiting access to
15	water bill data to owners and authorized delegates
16	which has been done by this administration created
17	significant complications for company who own a large
18	stock of buildings as they would be forced to request
19	access to billing data for their auditors on building
20	by building basis, meaning that a firm with 100
21	buildings would be forced to submit the same form 100
22	times to ensure their auditors have access to their
23	billing data. While the department opposed this
24	bill, it immediately reinstates the access that
25	previously existed in the Department of Finance

2	records for decades. In support of improved
3	transparency, I recommend a yes vote on this
4	legislation. Before I talk about who is here and all
5	that, I would like to thank the great committee staff
6	who has done such great work over the years. Counsel
7	Samara Swanson, policy analyst Nadia Johnson, Ricky
8	Chala, and finance analyst Johnathan Seltzer, and,
9	finally, my legislative director Nabi Cara for all
10	their great work. We are joined here today by
11	members of the committee Levin, Diaz, and Ulrich. I
12	thank them for being here for this vote. I'd like to
13	recognize Council member Brannan to say a few words
14	on his important legislation. I recognize Council
15	member Brannan.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER BRANNAN: Thank you,
17	Chair. I appreciate you shepherding this legislation
18	through. This bill is about making sure that the
19	average New Yorker has the tools they need to fight
20	their water bill and make sure they are being charged
21	properly and to ensure recourse if they are not being
22	charged properly. Every year the city overcharges
23	buildings on their water bill and a lot of it goes
24	unchecked and unnoticed which is wrong. This is
25	money that is back to the taxpayer and we believe

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 6 2 that this bill would make it easier for people to 3 fight their water bills and to get money that is owed 4 to them. We pay more than our fair share in taxes. 5 The city should not be getting an extra penny than 6 what we rightfully owe.

7 CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Thank you, Council member Brannan. I appreciate you bringing this 8 9 legislation forward and working diligently to get us to this good day. Now, I'll ask my fellow members of 10 11 the committee if anyone has something to say about 12 this legislation, I'd be happy to entertain anyone 13 who wants to speak on it. I recognize Council member Ulrich. 14

15 COUNCIL MEMBER ULRICH: Thank you, Chair 16 Gennaro. And thank you for your leadership on this very important issue. I want to thank Council member 17 18 Brannan for introducing this bill. This is a very, 19 very important piece of legislation involving 20 consumer protection and allowing average New Yorkers and then forwarding them the ability to contest their 21 skyrocketing water bills which they have been 2.2 23 experiencing over the past decade. We have to give New Yorkers transparency and information regarding 24 how much water they are using in their homes so that 25

2	they can be billed accordingly. The city used to
3	refund over \$35 million a year back to New Yorkers
4	who were successfully able to contest their water
5	bills with the Water Board and the DEP and by taking
6	the information away from them, they were less
7	successful in being able to fight their water bills.
8	People are hurting right now in the city. We know
9	that due to COVID, due to other financial constraints
10	and the economy and the least that we can do is give
11	people a fighting chance. So I want to thank Council
12	member Brannan because he's doing a wonderful job
13	standing up for every New Yorkers' right to be
14	charged fairly and properly and to made sure that
15	they have the ability to fight City Hall and to get
16	money back if they are owed money back. So, thank
17	you, Chair.
18	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Thank you, Council
19	member Ulrich. Anyone else wishing to be heard on
20	this bill? Seeing none, I call upon the clerk to
21	call the role.
