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Today the committee convenes to vote on proposed Intro 2253-A; it's sponsored by Speaker Johnson; a Local Law in relation to micro-distribution centers for distributing goods via sustainable modes of transportation.

Proposed Int. No. 2277-A is sponsored Council Member Keith Powers; a Local Law in relation to truck loading zones.

Proposed Int. No. 2279-A, is sponsored by Council Member Antonio Reynoso, a Local Law in relation to expanding loading zones.

And, proposed Int. No. 2422-A, is sponsored by myself; a local law in relation to parking meters.

The committee heard previous version of Proposed Intro No. 2253-A, 2277-A, 2279-A at a hearing on May 5, 2021.

In addition, a previous version of Proposed Intro 2422-A was heard by the committee in a joint hearing with The Committee on Oversight and Investigations on October 26, 2021.

Every year 365 million tons of cargo enter,
leave, or pass-through New York City, of which 89
percent is carried by a truck. An estimation for the
future predicts that there will be massive increases

in total tonnage entering, leaving, or passing
through New York City of upwards of by 68 percent to
fulliary safer and more efficient in terms of how
trucks deliver and unload packages, and also how they

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navigate the streets.

Proposed Int. No. 2253-A and 2277-A, and 2279-A, look to implement such regulations that would both help this industry and protect New Yorkers.

Proposed Intro 2253-A, DOT to issue request for expressions of interest from entities interested in facilitating, operating, or using micro-distribution centers, and to seek feedback on potential challenges and opportunities. A report will be required to the Council and the Mayor as to how the City can encourage and facilitate micro-distribution centers; as well as DOT to establish a micro-distribution center pilots program.

Proposed Intro 2277-A would require that all permits of 180 days or more for a street segment with a truck loading zone carry a stipulation that such zone may not be occupied or obstructed. The proposed bill would also give DOT power to revoke a permit or

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refuse to renew a permit for non-compliance if the applicant does not maintain a temporary loading zone; prohibit the use of city-wide parking placards in certain spaces in Manhattan; codify new and existing regulations for truck loading zones and commercial parking meter areas; allow DOT to authorize cargo bicycles or other sustainable modes to use loading zones and to create reduced rates for zero emission vehicles.

Finally Proposed Intro 2279-A would require the DOT to create a public methodology for determining where loading zones are necessary to enhance safety and reduce traffic congestion with DOT creating at least five loading zones annually in certain neighborhoods if there are fewer than 500 total new loading zones; create city-wide annually for the first three years following the effective date of the bill; DOT would also be required to report on its progress by January 2023.

Ultimately, these bills lead to ease congestion, increase safety, and improve the delivery efficiency of trucks through, and among other things, implementing a regulation and creating microdistribution centers, new trucking loading zones,

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2 sustainable modes of using loading zones, and
3 important reporting.

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In addition to these proposed bills regarding the trucking and (INAUDIBLE 00:06:10) today we will vote on Proposed Intro 2422-A as sponsored by myself.

This important legislation would authorize the use of pay by plate parking meters throughout the city in addition to pay and display parking meters. Pay by plate parking meters would allow a person to enter the vehicle's license plate at a parking meter to register payment for parking. This method would allow for the tracking of payments by the vehicle's license plate rather than paper receipts. This bill provide for a more robust, easy, and effective of paying for parking throughout New York City while ensuring that those who are enforcing such parking regulations do so correction and efficiently.

All of these bills seek to improve the quality of life in the city as well as ensuring that the trucking and (INAUDIBLE 00:7:12) industry is able to effectively move and unload items throughout the five boroughs safely.

In addition, transitioning to a pay-by-plate parking meter system, would increase efficiency in

3	with a number of other cities who are implanting such
4	technologies including Portland, Hoboken, and San
5	Francisco among others.
